

The 25th Annual Reunion of the Fighting 164th Infantry will be held at Valley City, N. Dak., Oct. 13-15.

General Gee, former commander of the 164th, now stationed at the Pentagon, Washington, D. C., will be the principal speaker at the reunion banquet.

While serving with the 164th Infantry, General Gee was awarded a Bronze Star medal. His citation reads:

Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, United States Army.

"For meritorious service in action on Bougainville, Solomon Islands. Lieutenant Colonel Gee, ordered to command a battalion on 24 January 1944, quickly transferred his enthusiasm and leadership in combat to his battalion personnel. During the operations for Hills 250 and 600, skillfully directed the employment of his troops, coordinated supporting fires on enemy targets, and his tireless efforts in the front

Heroes of the 164th Infantry

Lt. Col. Robert K. Hall

Robert Kerr Hall was born at Fargo, N. D. 21 Nov. 1895. He enlisted in Company H, 1st North Dakota Infantry, National Guard, at Jamestown, N. D., 1 Oct. 1915 and was called into federal service 19 June 1916, for service on the Mexican border, where he served until the regiment was released from active service at Fort Snelling, Minn., 14 Feb. 1917. He reverted to his National Guard status but was called into federal service for World War I 26 March 1917, being discharged as corporal 14 Aug. 1917. He was commissioned a 2nd

lieutenant and assigned to 301st Infantry, serving in France. He was discharged 27 Oct. 1919 at Camp Dix, N. J.

Appointed 2nd lieutenant, North
Dakota National Guard, 24 May
States Pacific Fleet.

1924, he was assigned to Company H, 164th Infantry. Promotions came in this order: first lieutenant 10 June 1929, captain 28 Dec. 1934, being ordered into federal service 10 Feb. 1941, promoted to major, and lieutenant colonel. He commanded 3rd battalion, 164th Infantry, on Guadalcanal.

Col. Hall has the distinction of being the first and only officer of the North Dakota National Guard to receive the Navy Cross. The Navy Cross compares with the Distinguished Service Medal awarded by the army, and is second only to the Medal of Honor awarded by the United States. His citation reads as follows:

"For extraordinary heroism in action against an armed enemy on Guadalcanal, British Solomon Islands, during the night of Oct. 24, 1942. Lt. Col. Hall, having been ordered to move his battalion to the relief of a marine battalion which was under attack by numerically superior Japanese forces, had his troops advance by forced march, at night, through rain and over difficult and unfamiliar terrain, to the assigned sector. He preceded the battalion, made a personal reconnaissance under heavy enemy fire and when the battalion arrived his leadership made possible the repulse of continued enemy attacks and the virtual annihilation of a Japanese regiment. His action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service." Authority: Headquarters of the Commander, South Pacific Forces of the United States Pacific Fleet.

Col. Hall was a loyal, honest and trusted friend; a modest and unassuming officer; respected by every member of his command. His early training was that of a machine gun officer and he was an excellent horseman as well. His memory will long be revered by members of the 164th Infantry Association. Col. Hall passed away at the U. S. Naval Hospital, Camp Pendleton, Calif., Jan. 1, 1962. His widow resides at 218 East 20th St., Costa Mesa, Calif.

Frank Richards

Frank Richards enlisted in Company K 1st N. Dak. Infantry, North Dakota National Guard Jan. 10,

1916. He was called into active military service June 19, 1916 and served on the Mexican border. Discharged at Mercedes, Tex. Jan. 24, 1917, he enlisted in the Fifth Battalion CAC TM July, 1918, and served in the AEF during WWI, being discharged Feb. 1, 1919.

Richards was appointed 2nd Lt., 164th Inf., North Dakota National Guard Feb. 14, 1925 and had continuous service until again called to active service Feb. 10, 1941. He served on Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands in WWII and as Battalion and Regimental commander in training camps at Camp Roberts, Calif., and Camp Blanding, Fla. He was relieved from active service March, 1946, and returned to National Guard status.



Heroes of the 164th Infantry

Again called to active duty during the Korean emergency Jan. 16, 1951, Richards served on the Army General Staff at Washington, D. C., and with the National Guard Bureau from May, 1953, to May, 1957. Returned to duty with the North Dakota National Guard, he was promoted to Brigadier General and retired Oct. 15, 1959.

Richards civilian occupation was a teacher of mathematics and administrator in public schools of Dickinson and the Dickinson State College. He resides at 146 West Fourth Street, Dickinson.

Awarded the Bronze Star medal, Richards citation reads: "For performance of meritorious services on Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands, on 5 Nov. 1942, when he displayed efficient leadership, and by his personal courage and exemplary conduct inspired a high degree of morale among officers and men in his battalion, thus contributing to its successful operation against the enemy."

David L. Wise

First Sergeant, Infantry, United States Army

Awarded the Bronze Star Medal

David Wise entered active military service with Company F, 164th Infantry, North Dakota National Guard, Carrington, N. Dak., on 10 February 1941, and was later transferred to Company B with which he served as staff sergeant. He

now resides at Dawson, N. Dak. His citation reads as follows:

"For meritorious service in action at Bougainville, Solomon Islands, 1 April 1944. Under the hazard of darkness and exposed to enemy action, Sergeant Wise, member of a combat patrol, led a forced march of 24 hours over steep, tortuous jungle terrain to evacuate successfully four wounded members of the patrol. By his gallant leadership and personal example he imparted confidence to his group, exhausted by continuous marching and fire fight, and by his efficient guidance, he contributed materially in saving the lives of the seriously wounded."

Anton C. Beer

First Lieutenant, Infantry, United States Army

Awarded the Silver Star Medal

His citation reads as follows: "For gallantry in action on October 25, 1942, at Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands. Lieutenant Beer, accompanied by two enlisted men, proceeded beyond the front lines to render aid and to brink back several wounded marines who were pinned down by strong enemy fire and cut off from their organizations. The deed was performed under heavy enemy fire and without adequate fire protection from their own lines. The three succeeded in loading several of the marines into a vehicle and evacuating them to safety beyond the lines."

Private First Class, Infantry, United States Army Awarded the Bronze Star Medal

Max W. Foerster served with Company D, 164th Infantry, from 25 April 1941 to 3 January 1945, grade of corporal. He was wounded in action on Leyte, P. I., 21 February 1945, for which he was awarded the Purple Heart medal. He now is employed as an investigator with the U. S. Civil Service Commission and has been in that position the



past ten years. He resides at 105 22nd Avenue North, Fargo, N. Dak.

Foerster was awarded the Bronze Star Medal. His citation reads as follows:

"For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Bougainville, Solomon Islands, 7 August 1944."

Col. Paul G. Hedstrom

Lt. Col. Paul G. Hedstrom, 60, passed away at John Moses hospital, Minot, N. Dak., 29 August 1967, after a long illness.

Col. Hedstrom began his military career as a private in Company A,

164th Infantry, North Dakota National Guard, at Bismarck, 1 October 1925. He was appointed second lieutenant 28 December 1934; promoted to first lieutenant 9 October 1940; ordered into active service 10 February 1941 and continued in active service until he retired in 1961.

During active service, he served in the South Pacific, Korea, and in Europe. He was awarded the Bronze Star medal and an Oak Leaf Cluster, the Presidential Unit Citation while serving with the 164th Infantry on Guadalcanal, the Korean Presidential Citation and the United Nations Service medal.

He leaves his wife Mabel and a host of friends and relatives.
