The round trip Air will be \$450.00 per person, housing 10 days at \$120.00, all meals will be extra.

## Wm. M. Simmerson, WWI Veteran, Dies

William M. Simmerson, 78, of Bloomington, Wisconsin, died Wednesday evening, February 14, 1973 in Memorial Hospital, Prairie du Chien. Funeral services were held at 11:00 A.M. February 17 at the Fawcett Funeral Home, Winthrop, Iowa. Burial was in Wilson Cemetery, Independence, Iowa.

He enlisted in Company A, 1st Infantry North Dakota National Guard, at Bismarck on July 6, 1917 and was transferred to Headquarters Company 18th Infantry, 1st Division. He was wounded in action May 4, 1918. He served overseas from December 15, 1917 to March 17, 1919 and was discharged at Camp Dodge, Iowa on March 30, 1919 as a Sergeant.

## Guadalcanal, World War II Battle Site, Is Popular Tourist Spot

#### United Press International Honiara, Guadalcanal

The latest "in" spot for the lighttraveling cheap jet set is Guadalcanal where shoes are required at the Mendana Hotel after 6 o'clock.

Men's shorts are acceptable evening attire at the Honiara Yacht Club and the Guadalcanal Club, but only when worn with knee-high stockings. Otherwise, long pants.

This mountainous, 90-mile-longisland, which was the setting for some of the bloodiest and most savage fighting in World War II, has suddenly become a South Seas tourist spot.


Thirty years of far-sighted British colonial administration plus U. N. cooperation has turned Guadalcanal from a stinking, reeking, malaria-saturated hell hole into a tropical resort area of lovely beaches and scenic beauty, complete with air-conditioned luxuries. The dreaded malaria has been almost completely eliminated.

This once-remote island is now an overnight, one-change jet flight from the Midwest on such carriers as American Airlines. It is only hours from Australia and New Zealand, and Air Nauru hopes soon to link Japan directly with Honiara.

Relatives of the allies and Japanese who fought, starved and died here play golf on the sanded greens of what was once Fighter Strip One; sip cold beer on the shaded veranda overlooking Ironbottom Sound, the graveyard of more than a score of warships, or visit friends for poolside parties in the Honiara residential area atop the ridges so fiercely fought for 30 years ago.

Despite the British influence, the drinks are iced — even frapped if the Mendana's ice shaver is working. The service is good to excellent everywhere on the island—depending upon one's knowledge of pidgin. The food is adequate, with emphasis on locally caught sea-

foods. Chinese restaurants in "New Chinatown" on the banks of the Matanikau — once the front line for the dug-in Japanese—give the locals and tourists a superb change of diet.

A new resort has been built at Tambea village near Cape Esperence where the defeated, diseased and emaciated Japanese were evacuated during February 1943 in one of the most daring rescue missions ever carried out.

Tambea itself is unique. Twentyeight miles north of the capital, the Melanesian-styled resort has two bars, beer gardens, cabanas, dining room, store, and 24-hour room service, but is inaccessible when rains flood the various coastal rivers between Honiara and Tambea.

The government has ignored pleas from developers that the rivers be bridged.

A spokesman for the government tourist authority admits that there is no crash program planned to entice either tourists or permanent residents to the Solomons. The secretary, D. Creighton, said that an influx tourists would tax the facilities of the British Solomon Islands Protectorate to look after them, "Something we just can't do under the present limited budget."

Although the government may shun the potentials of tourism, the Solomon Islanders are all for it. A new wing is being built on the Medana Hotel, other resorts are planned, and the locals are looking forward to welcoming visitors—particularly Americans.

The Solomon Islanders still tell stories in their villages of the generous Americans who came to Guadalcanal during the war and brought with them an era of prosperity unheard of before and unequalled since.

The war may have been hell to thousands of soldiers, sailors and marines assigned here, but to the Melanesians it was one long ball. They never ate so well, got paid so much, or found such enjoyment particularly after the Japanese had been driven off the island.

## Pinky Mullen, 97, Is Active, Enjoys Life

PINKY MULLEN, One of the few Spanish - American Veterans still on the membership Rolls of the 164th Infantry Assn., Now 97.

With a smile on his face and that famous Irish twinkle in his eyes, Noble Frederick C. Mullen, sat with his cane across his legs, and reminisced about his long and interesting life. From Janesville, Wis., where he was born in 1875, to Grand Forks in 1968, he has had experiences that are worth telling.

Born on a farm, he was raised in a good, healthy atmosphere. Later his parents moved to the Breckenridge - Wahpeton area where they lived for a short time. After attending high school, Frederick C. (pardon me, the name has always been Pinky) studied law and finally hung out his shingle. Times were different in the law business then, and you were lucky to pick up a small case here and there. At any rate, Pinky decided to get out and in 1896 he "went railroading."

#### **VOLUNTEERED IN '98**

Then came the Spanish-American war and Pinky answered the call to the colors. Not only that, but he "herded" 13 other young hopefuls to North Dakota where they joined up with Company I, 1st North Dakota Volunteer Infantry. He and his buddies were there when Admiral Dewey accomplished his famous battling act and the capture of Manilla. After that Gen. Arthur McArthur decided Pinky's body had taken enough and he was given an honorable discharge with the rank of Waggoner. I had to ask what Waggoner stood for and was told that the Waggoner took charge of

I asked him about his hobbies. "Outside of girls, he said, "they are hunting and fishing." He hunts pheasants (when you can find them), ducks, geese and he likes to shoot a deer running through the brush.

In the summer, you'll find him in Whitefish Bay, on Lake of the Woods in Ontario, just out of Sioux Narrows.

Right now, as this is written, Pinky is getting his gear in shape "to get at 'em again." He will, too, you can bet your Edsel stock on that, because he's been doing just about everything for almost 93 years — and he isn't about to stop now.

At the present time I am flat on my back recovering from an operation. Anyway before this newspaper comes off the press I hope to be up an around taking care of

the details of the 164th Convention.


A very Happy New Year and a well one for you and yours.
