

Chaplain's Corner

This is a memorial service for us 164th Infantry men — a time of remembrance. We ex-servicemen remember the horror of Pearl Harbor, the agony of Guadalcanal, the trauma of Normandy, the ferocity of Iwo Jima, and the costly campaign for Okinawa. We remember today our gallant comrades who paid the supreme sacrifice of their lives that we as a nation might survive and live in freedom.

However, we regret that our memories are so short — we are prone to forget. Let me quote from Guadalcanal Action Recalled, "To those of us who enjoy the almost unbelieveable freedoms, blessings, and opportunities offered by the United States, the tendency among many of us, is to quietly forget those great deeds and painful sacrifices which others have performed and endured to ensure a continuation of our

So we find ourselves in our present dilemma. Our freedoms are again threatened by our indifference and laxity as to our posture of defense. The strength as well as the morale of our armed forces today is deplorable, if not tragic. The indifference of our citizens, often open opposition of our politicians is appalling. Our freedoms, as well as our way of life, are threatened again. We need to revive our memories so that we can take corrective actions, so that we can shore-up our defensive posture while there is time, before catastrophe overtake us. Remember, "Eternal vigilance is the price of freedom".

WHAT WE MUST DO

First, we need to restore our strength. "Be Strong" is the admonition for today from the WORD (2 Timothy 2:1-8) In the light of our weaknesses we need to restore our posture of strength. Only thus can we hope to maintain the peace we so sincerely desire. Peace thru Strength is the slogan for today.

Secondly, there is the matter of Endurance. There is the element of complacency that is plagueing us today, forever chipping away and sapping our strength. We as soldiers, sailors, marines and airmen know how important it is to endure, to hang-in-there as we did in the grim days of Guadalcanal, to sacrifice our very lives if necessary so that we could come out victorous. Even in peace time we must be willing to sacrifice, endure hardship, if we wish to retain our freedoms. "There can be no substitute for victory" General MacArthur admonished us.

Thirdly, there is the necessity of Dedication. The indifference that has gripped our nation and its citizens is appalling. America must awake! We must in the immortal words of Abraham Lincoln, "It is for us the living to rededicate ourselves to the unfinished task before us" so that our freedoms can be preserved, and "that government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth".

To whom it may concern:

Subject: Report on 38th reunion of 164th Inf. Assoc. held at Jamestown Oct. 10-11-12, 1980.

Shortly after the 37th reunion, preliminary plans were started for the 38th reunion to be held in Jamestown. Local former 164 personnel were contacted and asked to attend a kickoff meeting to form the reunion planning committee. Chairmen were appointed for program, finance, registration, transportation, entertainment, publicity, housing, and food. Meetings were held on a monthly basis and during the month before the reunion on a semiweekly basis. We were very fortunate in having Louis Hanson as finance chm. as he set up a very accurate and detailed system of record keeping.

Early in the planning, the committee agreed that a good reunion could not be properly financed from registration income alone. It was decided to offer \$5.00 raffle tickets to all known 164 members that were mailed registration information. This program was quite effective.

Local organizations that have legalized gambling were also contacted for contributions. Their response was a key factor in the financial success of this reunion. The contributing organizations were VFW Post 760, Eagles Aerie, and Knights of Columbus.

A reunion headquarters consisting of registration section and courtesy car coordinating center was set up in a banquet room in the VFW building on the opening morning of the reunion. This headquarters was maintained until the close of the reunion on Sunday. A special outside phone was included in the hq.

The transportation chm. obtained the free use of courtesy cars from the two local dealers, R.M. Stoudt, Inc. and Paul Liechty Used Auto Sales. Volunteer drivers from the VFW, Am. Legion, Eagles, and KC were used and we plan to include them as guests at an appreciation night later. Don Baugh did a fine job as transportation chm.

The staff of the registration committee consisted of Loretta Aippersbach, Betty Smith, Norma Kaiser, Muriel Johnson, and Zelma Remmilong. Roger Smith assisted with preregistration records. A total of 171 men and 100 women were registered.

The local civic center was rented for the reunion banquet and dance. The Eagles club catered the banquet. Dignitaries attending the banquet included Gov. Link, Jamestown mayor Allwyn DeGroot, Bill Dumphy, Pres. of Americal Div. and Graydon Cadwell, Pres. of Quadacanal Campaign Veterans. Other guests included commanders of local veterans organizations. Blaise Johnson of Jamestown was the main speaker. 389 were served at the banquet (including guests and color guards). 164 Assoc. President John Remillong, Chm. Don Hoffman, and James Aippersbach, facilities chm., were in charge.

The memorial services and business meeting was held at the VFW Post 760 clubrooms.

A ladies style show and noon luncheon was held at the Holiday Inn Zelma Remillong and Sully Havelick were in charge. 129 served.

A Sunday breakfast was served at the VFW clubrooms. Bob Havelick was chairman.
