

When the zenith of ones being is achieved and life's pendulum quietly comes to rest as it does and will for us all in time. Then there is in dictation the achievements of each etched in the minds of all who knew the individuals for whom the Battle Flags are reverently folded and life's demands are no more. I'm confident that our 164th Infantry Association Chaplains passing constitutes a loss to our organization that will be felt by many.

ELLIOT C. AANDAHL was elected official 164th Infantry Association at the October reunion in 1978 and passed away 2 April 1982 at Underwood, Mn. The following is reproduced from the Fargo Forum.

The funeral for the Rev. Elliot C. Aandahl, 73, Underwood, Minn., will be at 2 Tuesday in the Bethel Lutheran church at Fergus Falls, Minn. He died Friday. Mr. Aandahl was born June 2, 1908, at Wist, S.D. When he was 2years-old, his missionary parents moved to China, where he grew up and attended school at Kikungshan. He graduated from the Lutheran Brethren Seminary at Grand Forks, N.D. He married Ruth Aarrestad March 1, 1932, at Ferndale, Wash. They were missionaries in China from 1933 to 1947. During World War II, he served with the Marines in North China. From 1949 to 1951 he worked for the U.S. Depart-

ment of State in China, Taiwan and the Philippine Islands. From 1954 to 1977 he lived in Taiwan, where he was the Director of U.S. Aid. He was executive director of the Taiwan Leprosy Mission for nine years. He received the Chinese Medal of Distinction. He retired from the Marine Reserve in 1966. Since his return from Taiwan in 1977, he has been the pastor of the Maine (Minn.) Presbyterian Church. He had published two books, "In Those Days" and "One Crowded Hour." Survivors include his wife; three daughters and a son, Mrs. Fred (Mayling) Valder, Dickinson, N.D.; Mrs. A. Thomas (Lavonne) Marubbio, Fargo; Mrs. Brad (Meris) Farwell, in Hawaii; and Loren, Vancouver, British Columbia; three brothers, Oliver, Vallejo, Calif.; Gorgen, Marysville, Wash.; and Milton, Rowland Heights, Calif.; and nine grandchildren. (Olson, Fergus Falls). Died 2 April 1982.

Also published herein is information on the passing of a member of B Co. 164th Reg. Al J. Schwalier who passed away 15 June 1982 in St. Paul, Mn.

FARGO — Services were held June 18 at St. Mary's Catholic Church, Fargo, for a former North Dakotan, Al J. Schwalier, 58, Akeley, Minn., who died June 15 in St. Paul, Minn. 1982.

He was born March 4, 1924, in New England and grew up in Fargo. He entered the National Guard, served with the 164th Infantry in the Pacific during World War II and married Carrie M. Asplund in 1949. He served with the U.S. Army Reserve in Korea and became a U.S. Air Force recruiter at Fargo in 1960. He retired from the military in 1967 and became a Minnesota district representative for the Boy Scouts of America in 1968. He had been a field representative for the American Automobile Association since 1972.

Survivors include his wife, a son, a daughter, his mother and a brother. (Bismarck Tribune)

PROCLAMATION State of Florida Executive Department Tallahassee

WHEREAS, forty years ago the United States and allied forces in the Pacific launched the first amphibious attack on enemy forces of World War II on the then unknown islands of the British Solomon Islands, Guadalcanal, Tulagi, Gavutu, and Tanambogo, to be known as "The Campaign for Guadalcanal"; and

WHEREAS, the resulting six-month long struggle for the central target, Henderson Field, has now firmly entrenched the name, GUADAL-CANAL, into the pages of world history; and

WHEREAS, many of this State's citizens fought in this campaign on behalf of our great Nation; and

WHEREAS, on the 7th of August 1982 in Winter Haven, Florida, veterans of this campaign from all over the Nation will gather to be joined by the host city of Winter Haven, the Chamber of Commerce, and sponsoring Jaycees to pay homage and honor to the memory and sacrifices of those brave and gallant marines, seamen, soldiers and airmen who gave their lives in stopping the advance of the enemy and led us to final victory in the Pacific; and

WHEREAS, this event, to be known as "THE GUADALCANAL CAM-PAIGN 40th ANNIVERSARY MEMORIAL TRIBUTE," will observe this occasion marking one of the most heroic and illustrious periods of our Nation's proud history:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bob Graham, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Florida, do hereby proclaim August 7, 1982 as

GUADALCANAL 40th ANNIVERSARY MEMORIAL DAY in Florida, and urge all citizens to join in observing this patriotic and memorable occasion.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Florida to be affixed at Tallahassee, the Capital, this 3rd day of March in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighty-two.





News Release Williston, N.D. "E" Co. 164th Inf. Ass'n

May 1982

A rededication of the soldier's monument located at the Railroad Park, Williston, N.D., will have two services commemorating Memorial Day, Monday 31 May 1982. This time in addition to the regularly scheduled service there will be place 4 each Bronze Plaques to Memorialize Veterans since WWI, i.e. to memorialize veterans of all wars. crises, etc. from 1914 to date. This being conducted with pomp execution by members of "E" Co. 164th Inf. Association in conjunction with the local Legion Post, VFW, DAV and "E" Co. of the 164th Inf. Association's financial support. Along with the placing of the plaques the Parade will commence from a point in front of the American Legion Post thence progress to Main Street and turn south to the Depot Railroad Park. Wherein a complete program suitable of the occasion was presented, then on to the cemetery where services are started by poppies being dropped on the assemblage from an airplane at 11:00 AM, the band rendered a fine selection of numbers. The Memorial Day Prayer was given by the Reverend Richard Teidor. Poppy wreath was placed by the American Legion and auxiliary at the base of the monument. The auxiliary members rendered a tribute to the deceased veterans and auxiliary members who have passed away the past year. The Memorial Day address was given by Mr. Richard McKennett of Williston. I have been losing alot of my incoming mail through the Post Office. After many inquiries, I found the reason. It has caused me to send address changes to many places who have been sending correspondence to me. The Post Office has installed computerized sorting machines in many of their distribution centers. Albuquerque, New Mexico, is one of them. The computer is programmed to read the last two lines of the address. If the last line does not have the city, state and zip code, the first class mail will be returned to the sender. All

that needs to be missing is the zip code. The computer then reads the next to last line. If that line does not have a house number and street address or a route number and box number, the first class mail will go back to the sender. All that has to be missing is the route number. All second-class, third-class, and fourth-class mail is sent to trash to be discarded if only one item is missing in the last two lines of the address.

I found out the hard way when I had my first class mail temporarily forwarded for three weeks over the Christmas Holidays. The computer sent only a few first class letters forward. Many letters went back to the sender. Most all second, third and fourth-class mail went to waste. Some magazines were forwarded, rather expensively, at first class rates. They were supposed to be held until I got back. I got no income tax materials including special forms I had ordered.

Some of our magazines are no longer being delivered even though they do not expire until 1983.

The conclusion I have come to is, don't ask for your first class mail to be forwarded on a temporary basis. Have a neighbor pick up your mail and put on the forwarding address. Also make sure the last two lines of your address, show the correct information or you will not get your mail.
