The Chairman called the attention of the Senate members to the following correction in the minutes of November 7, 1963: Paragraph 4 should now read: "Mr. Henderson then moved to amend the amendment by stating that minutes be distributed to department chairmen and the members of the Senate, in either case, upon the request of these individuals. Mr. St. Clair accepted the amendment to the amendment. The amendment was voted upon and carried. The original motion, as amended, was then voted upon and carried." Mr. Curry moved the approval of the minutes as corrected. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried.

4.

Mr. St. Clair moved adoption of the following resolution memorializing Dr. A. E. Mead. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried.

Resolved, that the Faculty of the University of North Dakota has learned with profound sorrow and regret of the untimely death of Dr. A. E. Mead, Commissioner of Higher Education of the State of North Dakota.

Resolved, that this Senate does recognize his devotion to the cause of higher education. He was a man who gave himself completely to the cause in which he believed. He traveled greatly, conferred widely and worked unceasingly for the benefit of higher education. No detail was too trivial, no assignment too great to merit his full attention. No situation or individual was too imposing to deter his efforts. His resoluteness and determination contributed greatly to his accomplishment. We honor him for the man that he was and the goals that he sought.

Resolved, that the Senate does hereby tender its deep sympathy to the members of the family.

Resolved, that the Secretary communicate these resolutions to the family and to the Board of Higher Education.

Mr. Donald H. Ford, Mr. Donald J. Pearce, Mr. Ralph H. Kolstoe, Mr. Myron M. Curry, and Mr. J. Donald Henderson were nominated for membership on the Committee on Committees. It was moved that nominations cease. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried. A ballot was taken and Mr. Curry, Mr. Henderson, Mr. Kolstoe, and Mr. Pearce were declared elected to membership on the Committee on Committees.

Mr. Henry J. Tomasek, Mr. Elwyn B. Robinson, Mr. R. Leo Sprinkle, Mr. Roland G. Severson, and Mr. Charles W. Bullard were nominated for membership on the Administrative Procedures Committee. Mr. Robinson withdrew his nomination. It was moved and seconded that nominations cease. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried. A ballot was taken and Mr. Tomasek, Mr. Severson and Mr. Bullard were declared elected to membership on the Administrative Procedures Committee.

Mr. George C. Wheeler and Mr. John H. Crabb were nominated for membership on the Codification Committee. It was moved that nominations cease. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried. A ballot was taken and Mr. Wheeler was declared elected to the Codification Committee.

6.

Mr. Koenker, Chairman of the Curriculum Committee, moved the approval of the course changes as submitted to the faculty and the modifications, as listed on pages 114-121, of these minutes. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried.

7.

Mr. Robertson moved that the following regulation regarding course changes be adopted:

After a student has registered he cannot change his course without the written consent of the dean of his college. No change in registration involving the entrance into a new course shall be permitted after the two-week period following the beginning of instruction. A student who is permitted to drop a course between the end of the third week and the end of the eighth week must secure the signature of the instructor in the course. A student may not cancel a course after the end of the eighth week of the semester without cause. If a student, for cause, is permitted to drop a course after the first eight weeks in either semester, he may have his registration cancelled if the instructor certifies that the student was doing passable work; otherwise, he is given a failure. If a change is permitted in an academic program, a fee of one dollar will be charged after the first full week of classes.

The motion was seconded.

Mrs. MacKichan moved to amend the motion by striking out all the words and substituting in its stead the following:

After a student has registered he cannot change his course without the written consent of the dean of his college. No change in registration involving the entrance into a new course shall be permitted after the two-week period following the beginning of instruction. A student who is permitted to drop a course between the end of the third week and one week following the second deficiency report must secure the signature of

the instructor in the course. A student may not cancel a course after one week following the second deficiency report of the semester without cause. If a student, for cause, is permitted to drop a course after one week following the second deficiency report in either semester, he may have his registration cancelled if the instructor certifies that the student was doing passable work; otherwise, he is given a failure. If a change is permitted in an academic program, a fee of one dollar will be charged after the first full week of classes.

The motion to amend was seconded, voted upon, and carried. The motion, as amended by the substitute motion, was declared as carried.

8.

Mr. Koenker presented for discussion a proposal to begin classes at 7:30 a.m. for the fall of 1964.

9.

Mr. Robertson moved that classes for the current semester cease at the close of classes on Wednesday, January 15, and that Thursday, January 16, be set aside as a day for review, and that examinations begin on Friday, January 17. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and lost.

Mr. Bullard moved that Friday, January 17, be added to the examination schedule for the present semester. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and lost.

Mr. Kannowski moved that the examination period be extended to include the day of commencement. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

10.

Mr. Robertson moved the adoption of the Academic Calendar for 1964-65 and 1965-66 as listed on page 113 of these minutes. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Dixon moved to amend the motion by starting Christmas vacation at the close of classes on Saturday, December 19, for 1964-65, and on Saturday, December 18, for 1965-66, instead of Tuesday, December 22 for 1964-65, and Tuesday December 21 for 1965-66. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Crabb moved to amend the amendment that the beginning of instruction be changed to September 23 and that the entire schedule, including the amendment, be adjusted accordingly.

Mr. Ford moved to adjourn. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and lost.

Discussion was resumed on the motion to amend the motion by starting Christmas vacation at the close of classes on Saturday, December 19, for 1964-65, and on Saturday, December 18, for 1965-66. The amendment was voted upon and carried.

Mr. St. Clair moved that the Senate adjourn subject to call for a special meeting. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried.

The meeting adjourned at 6:00 p.m.
