

The State of Affairs


PEN America research found 10,000+ instances of book bans in the 2023-2024 school year—more than **double** the last school year.

ALA's Office of Intellectual Freedom's preliminary 2024 data shows 414 attempts to censor library materials and services between January - August.

Book Bans are off the charts

Library Impact

Legislation and political pressure play a large role in book bans; both through active book removals and creating a chilling effect.

In the 2023-2024 school year, PEN recorded **8,000** book bans in Florida and Iowa, largely because of state laws.

- 1. Limit access to school library databases
- 2. Establish book rating systems
- 3. Mandate challenge policies
- 4. Override collection development
- 5. Expand parental control
- 6. Change definitions of "obscene"
- 7. Limit teaching of "divisive concepts"
- 8. Criminalize librarians and educators

Library Impact

Silent censorship "[refers] to librarian choices to not purchase new materials, to weed ones already available to patrons, or to not sponsor a program for fear of a challenge from the community. This type of unseen censorship potentially limits community access to information about topics to which a vocal minority might object and which a vulnerable minority may need."

Why It Matters

- Books are "windows, mirrors, and sliding glass doors" (coined by Rudine Sims Bishop, 1990)
 - Cultural literacy, empathy
- Authentic, relevant stories encourage more and deeper reading
 - Literacy leads to higher academic achievement
- Books on challenging topics can encourage conversation with parents and other trusted adults


Why It Matters

What Can We Do?

- Know why materials might be targeted
 - Resources: banned books lists from ALA
- Know your policies
- Know the value of the materials being targeted
 - Read reviews
 - Resource: <u>Book Resumes from Unite</u> <u>Against Book Bans</u>




What Can We Do?

- Avoid self-censorship
 - Trust your collection development resources and professional expertise
- Report challenges
 - NDLA Intellectual Freedom Committee, ALA, PEN America, etc.
- Empower your allies
 - Resource: We Need Diverse Books <u>Resources for Parents & Allies</u>, <u>Resources for Teachers</u>

 <u>policies and forms</u>
 - <u>Resources</u>
- EDI Committee: EDI Grant
 - Can be used for training, programming, collection development
