The Great Bougainville Artillery Battle (Second Installment)

The last issue of the "News" left the members of K Company ducking their heads as Artillery rounds coming and going passed over their heads. Soon a prime mover came lumbering up the road behind the front line towing a 90 mm Anti-aircraft gun. Soon the weapon was in position on the front line and ready to fire. Looking through the high power scope, the gun commander was able to see the individual Japanese gun positions.

With its flat trajectory and high velocity, the anti-aircraft gun was able to place most of its rounds into the openings of the bunkers with unerring accuracy. The sound of the gun firing preceded the sound of the round exploding by only a brief second or two. Soon all of the Japanese guns were silenced. The gun crew soon prepared the weapon for travel and left the area. Fortunately the Japanese Artillery were not able to shift their fire and silence the anti-aircraft gun. Their mission accomplished, the weapon and crew could leave without receiving any counter-battery fire. Needless to mention, the members of the company were glad to see the weapon leave

29 Aug. 1993

Howdy, This is Application for Membership to the before the front line became a prime target.

The next day K Company was informed that their next mission as part of a Regimental offensive was to occupy the positions held by the Japanese artillery. The Company left the perimeter area on the left flank of the Regimental sector and after traveling by foot for several hours on jungle trails were able to locate and occupy the area lately occupied by a large number of Japanese.

The Japanese were well dug in on both the forward and reverse slope of the ridge. The artillery pieces were in the emplacements on the forward slopes with dugouts on the reverse slope used for personnel protection and ammunition supply. Most of the artillery was still in position. About thirty weapons were counted with a unknown number buried or removed from the area. A considerable amount of unfired ammunition had been left behind by the fleeing Japs. The area showed signs of very recent occupation. How they were able to site in the guns and adjust fire is a mystery as the narrow opening in the emplacements left very little space to adjust fire.

bags and parts of the weapon. The guns were

water. Hundreds of fish-head cans near the spring indicated that meals had been eaten here and that the consumers had hastily departed. The Japanese artillerymen had taken great care to cut fields of fire and logs for emplacements without revealing their presence. Perhaps our intelligence sections had not been alert.

The Regiment successfully cleared the series of ridges from the Torakina River to the perimeter. Thus ended the great Bougainville Artillery battle with a great effort and unknown number of casualties for the Japanese and little effect on the defenders of the Perimeter.

164th Infantry Association.

I served with Easy Company, 2nd Battalion, 164th Infantry from late April 1945 till late Oct. 1945 or perhaps early Nov.

I joined the unit from a Reppo Depo on Leyte. My 19th birthday was the day FDR died (12 Apr. 1945) and it was shortly after that we loaded aboard LCI's and journeyed to Cebu where I joined the Platoon under a SSgt named Jack Kachell. He was from Arizona if I recall correctly. Have often wondered whatever became of him.

I am not from ND but by the time the Division landed in the Philippines a lot of replacements had already joined the 164th from various states.

Last Apr. or May while talking on "Prodigy" with members of the Americal Division, Jay Roth sent me address of William W. Tillotson. We stopped in Bismarck overnight 6/7 Aug. and I called Mr. Tillotson morning of the 7th before shoving off for Ellendale, ND to visit a cousin I had never met

As promised, Mr. Tillotson send me some back issues of "The 164th Infantry News." Believe he sent ALL of 1992 and April 1993. So I am sending you ten bucks for 1992, ten for 1993 and ten for 1994 for a total of 30 bucks.

In reading the News, I see a couple of names I recognize. One is a Captain Walker. It seems to me he was promoted to Major shortly after we arrived in Japan 8 Sep. 1945 and was bumped on points because of the advancement to Major and had to stay longer, like us newcomers. I know for sure he was an outstanding field officer that knew how to talk on field comm to get artillery support in a hurry.

My brother, Leslie C. Huffstutler 37027719, was killed on Guadalcanal on November 25, 1942. Officially he was assigned to Company "E," 164th Infantry, still considered a part of the company the Lt. wrote. But some way or another he was with the Marines on Guadalcanal.

From your organization WERE THERE ANY MEN THAT MAY HAVE BEEN THERE WITH HIM? He is buried in the National Cemetery on the island Honolulu. His headstone reads PFC 164 Inf. American Division World War II.

If anyone can give me any information on the battle of Guadalcanal, I would appreciate hearing from them. As always I have unanswered questions for I never received even his dogtags. Was everything completely destroyed over there?

The annual business meeting of the 164th Inf. Assoc. of the United States was called to order by President Glatt at 10:00 AM 25 Sep 93 at the Radisson Inn, Bismarck, ND.

Officers Present: Ben Glatt, President; Don Robinson, Vice President; Bill Tillotson, Editor; Frank Weisgerber, Sect/Treas

The colors were posted by the North Dakota Army National Guard and the pledge of allegiance was lead by President Glatt.

The minutes of the 1992 business meeting were published in the Dec 92 issue of the 164th News and were approved by voice vote. The financial report was presented by the Sect/Treas. Motion by Don Eichelberger to accept the report as true and correct. Seconded by Elmo Olson.

The following committees were appointed by the President with the Chairman submitting recommendations as follows:

<u>Time & Place:</u> Bernie Wagner, Chairman; Ken Keyes, George Hopkins, Bob Well. The committee recommended that Fargo host the 1995 Reunion as Bismarck was previously selected for the 1994 Reunion. Motion was made to accept and passed by voice vote. 1995 reunion to be in Sept. 95.

<u>Nominations:</u> Gil Shirley, Chairman; Walt Johnsen, Tony Griffin, Ray Sawyer, Jim Hoop. The committee nominated the following people as officers for the year 94: President - Don Robinson; Vice Pres - Milt Kane; Editor - Bill Tillotson; Sect/Treas - Frank Weisgerber.

Nominations were approved by unanimous voice vote.

<u>Auditing:</u> Wally Johnson, Chairman; Pete Grant. After a review of the financial records, the committee found them to be in proper order and recommended they be accepted. Passed by voice vote.

<u>Resolutions:</u> George Christianson. To commend the Reunion committee and the City of Bismarck for a splendid job in making the 1993 a successful Reunion.

The President called for any other old business, there being none, he called for new business.

Jim Fenelon, Chairman of the Memorial committee gave a report on the work done to date, as to research of 164th veterans name, letters to Congressmen, Sect Aspin and General Powell. He also presented his plan or ideas for raising funds for the Memorial cost. More to follow by Jim.

Walt Johnsen gave a report on the design of the Memorial with Doug Burtell giving a report on the drawings or inscriptions on the Memorial.

At the conclusion of this Committee's report, Ray Conlon made a motion that the Association contribute \$25,000 to the Memorial fund. Seconded by John Landowski. Motion passed by voice vote.

Motion by Bill Tillotson that any surplus funds to the Memorial, above the cost of the Memorial, go to the Association Treasury. Motion passed by voice vote.

Motion by Max Straka and seconded by Charles Schlieve that certificate of appreciation be sent to the contributors for the Memorial fund. Motion passed by voice vote.

There being no further business, the President called for adjournment, motion by Bernie Wagner, seconded by Tony Beer. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 11:45 AM 25 Sep 1993.
