Mr. Reiten requested a correction in the minutes of the November meeting to indicate that he was not present. With this correction, the minutes were approved as submitted.

4.

Mr. Pearce read the following communique from the Student Senate:

Student Senate, through its Legislative Information Committee, wishes to request the aid of Faculty Senate and any faculty members in preparing for distribution a pamphlet on the budgetary needs of Higher Education in North Dakota, especially UND.

A work force composed of volunteers from various student organizations will be meeting on Saturday to stuff and address envelopes and any faculty who are willing and able to help will be needed and welcome. Details of time and place will be published in Friday's Student.

5.

Mr. Pearce moved to adopt the following amendment to the Bylaws of the University Senate:

Meetings of the University Senate shall be open to the public, but the Senate reserves the right to go into Executive Session when it deems it necessary. The Senate may also at any meeting invite others to appear before it for special purposes.

The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Mr. Reiten moved the motion be tabled awaiting a ruling from the Attorney General. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. A vote was taken and the motion to table was defeated. A written ballot was taken on the original motion and the motion was defeated.

6.

The Chairman called for the election of members to the following committees: Administrative Procedures Committee, Codification Committee, and Committee on Committees.

Mr. Reiten, Mr. Wheeler, Mr. Reid, and Mr. Bullard were nominated for membership on the Administrative Procedures Committee. It was moved that nominations cease. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried. A ballot was taken and Mr. Reiten, Mr. Reid, and Mr. Bullard were declared elected as members of the Administrative Procedures Committee.

Mr. Walden was nominated for membership to the Codification Committee. It was moved that nominations cease and the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Walden. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

Mr. Pearce, Mr. Naismith, Mr. Stenberg, Mr. Herndon, Mr. Thorson, Mr. Rowe, Mr. Laird, and Mr. Penn were nominated for membership on the Committee on Committees. Mr. Pearce withdrew his nomination. It was moved that nominations cease. The motion was seconded, voted upon, and carried. A ballot was taken and Mr. Naismith, Mr. Stenberg, and Mr. Penn were declared elected as members of the Committee on Committees. There was a tie vote between Mr. Laird and Mr. Rowe. Another ballot was cast and Mr. Laird was declared elected.

7.

Mr. Koenker presented the attached report of the Curriculum Committee recommending new courses and course changes and moved that it be approved for submission to the State Board of Higher Education. The motion was seconded. Mr. Wheeler read the following resolution from the Biology Department Staff:

The Biology Staff wishes to go on record as being willing to study the feasibility of such a program, but objects to participating until such a study has been undertaken.

Mr. Wheeler then moved to amend the report of the Curriculum Committee by deleting the course, Interdepartmental SLA, 101, 102, 201 and 202. The amendment was seconded, voted upon and defeated. Mr. Penn moved to amend the motion by adding that the total report be approved with the understanding that the implementation of Interdepartmental Science not be accomplished until the four departments involved consider the problems and resolve them. The amendment was seconded. Mr. St. Clair moved to amend the amendment by inserting, "the departments involved," instead of, "four departments involved." The amendment to the amendment was accepted by unanimous consent. The amended amendment to the original motion was voted upon and defeated. The Curriculum Committee report was voted upon and approved for submission to the State Board of Higher Education. Mr. Wheeler presented the report of the Honorary Degrees Committee. Mr. Wheeler then moved that the Senate of the University of North Dakota recommend to the President and the State Board of Higher Education that the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws be awarded at the January commencement to the cnadidate presented.* The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

Miss Heyse moved that her recommendation decreasing the University requirement of four semesters of Physical Education to two semesters be placed on the agenda for the February meeting. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.
