CARL HAUKEDAHL'S REPORT ON SAVO ISLAND

Thinking back to Savo, Captain Mjogdalen and I were the only two from Company C to walk around the island.

A fighter plane had crashed on a mountain and the natives complained about the pilot being left in the cockpit. A group from the Marines was sent over to bury the pilot, but for some reason they did not do this, so a squad from Company C was sent up there to take care of this. I do not remember who was in this detail.

I met a Mr. Leif Schroeder on Savo. He said he was born in Narvik, Norway and his parents emigrated to Australia. He later went to the Solomons where he had been for thirty-five years at that time.

I had an outline on a map of Savo produced from an aerial photo. Captain Mjogdalen and I walked around the island. At each village we went through, a bunch of natives joined us. So, by the time we had walked around the island about one hundred natives had joined us.

Schroeder was like a God or Judge to the people. He settled arguments, divorces, etc. He communicated in pidgeon English and a few talked English.

At each village he would ask if they had picked up anything Japanese. The Japs had made small bamboo rafts and floated in hand grenades, one hundred fifty-five casings etc. All information gathered I put on this map such as, a good boat landing area, poor area, where boat was picked up, location of each village, etc.

Schroeder said that I was the first man to map the island.

Regimental headquarters set up a communications station about four miles from our CP. A path was hacked out so they could get there with a jeep they had brought along. There was a level piece of grassland one hundred fifty feet in diameter where they set up their CP.

It was quite an experience to see the natives get their first ride in a jeep. At first they were scared, but as one after the other rode, everyone wanted a ride.

Natives picked up one of our pilots out on the ocean while we were there. Schroeder said that was the seventh one rescued on Savo. We left the island with a six by six truck full of bananas furnished by the goodhearted natives.

I came back to the States just before the company left for the Philippines. I was assigned to the Army Air Corp on my return to duty.

VA News

The National Cemetery System will honor a request from the surviving veteran spouse for adjacent national cemetery burial spaces, if the request is formally made at the time the first veteran dies. All eligible veterans are entitled to a burial space in a national cemetery and a headstone recognizing their military service. Previously, military couples were buried in the same plot with the name and information of the first deceased veteran on the front of the marker and the second veteran's information on the back of the marker. Veteran couples now have the option of adjacent plots or burial in a common plot, but must make the decision at the time of arrangements for the internment of the first veteran spouse.

VETERANS HOMES

North Dakota Veterans Home was established in 1891 to provide care to veterans spouses and surviving spouses. It has 112 basic care beds. The skilled nursing facility at the Veterans Home consists of 38 beds. To be eligible for services you must be: (a) bonafide resident of North Dakota for at least one year or (b) have served in an activated North Dakota National Guard or (c) been a resident of North Dakota upon entering the Armed Forces or spouse or surviving spouse of the veteran.

Hi Don:

Each of us have combat memories of these "Green Hell Years," in the South Pacific of WWII. The story I'm about to recall may be remembered by many members of B Company 164th Infantry on Bougainville in 1944, Solomon Islands.

Our company was located on the front line perimeter, at the base of hill called "Snuffy Nose Ridge." We were well dug in with plenty of fire power. In the rear of the company, we set up a mess hall and, of course, we had a Class A screened in "latrine," situation was becoming "livable," and the chow was improving.

One day after chow, a soldier/or officer was blown-up in the latrine. It seems the guy on latrine duty couldn't find the Lime, so he improvised by pouring in a can of gasoline into the trench. The unsuspecting guy comes in and has a seat, he would have been OK, until he decided to light up a cigarette. That's when the big "Boom" happened, setting fire to our latrine and blowing-out the soldier sitting there. Many of us heard the explosion and saw the man rolling down the hill, in front of the latrine covered in flames, he looked like a flame thrower hit him. He was evacuated with severe burns. To this day I wonder who he was and also how he explained this to his family.

So guys if you remember this incident, please let me know if he made it.

Back in 1987 when my wife and I joined a group of "Canal" vets, to return 45 years later to break ground for a fit memorial. I was the only 164th member of that group of mostly marines and sailors. In that group was a chap named C.A. Buser who was during the campaign, stationed at the Pagoda (air operation center) Henderson Field. Buser's job was in the nature to assist the air traffic controller. Anyhow, we became good friends early on. Especially when he heaped so much praise for our 164th Rgt. He continues to do so to this day and in his frequent letters writes that if our Rgt. had not helped save Henderson Field then likely all could have been lost including his own life.

Now one of Buser's close friends is doing research work on various points of "Chesty" Puller's life. As I recall "Chesty" was the C.O. of the 1st Bn. of the 7th Marine Rgt. During the October 23-26 period the Japs hit his Bn. very hard and in short order our 3rd Bn. 164th was rushed into the line to assist his Bn, and our own 2nd Bn. I was with Co "C" 3rd Platoon Ldr. along Alligator (Tenaru) Creek during the fight and a marine runner came to Company Mq. ready to lead my platoon wherever it was needed. Fortunately the lines held. Since my retirement in 1975 in my travels etc. I have met several marines who were there and you would be surprised how many told me "You guys saved our butts".

Not long after the big battle I visited my old company "K" where I had been 1st Sgt. I knew all the men and in our conversations several mentioned that they had visits from marine "Brass" thanking them for their fighting ability. Now if anyone can recall such visits with marines - please contact MR C.A. Buser.

Prior to the Ntl. American Div. Reunion in Reno, Nevada June 20-23 I received a nice letter from Lloyd J. Morrell, reunion coordinator, asking me to be the parade marshall - but I begged off. However I felt it an honor to be offered that position in the 1st place. Lloyd used to live across the bay a few years ago so we got to know each other.

For what it's worth - you may find some help for our good friend C.A. Buser. Wish you had the 164th Reunion in Dickinson - I would be there come hell or high water.
