## Guadalcanal Ordeal Claimed New In History

DETROIT (Mich.), Wednesday, AAP.- "Never in history has such a group of healthy, toughened well-trained men been subjected to such conditions of strain and stress as those experienced by the marines on Guadalcanal."

This claim was made by Lieut. Commander Rogers Smith at the annual meeting of the Psychiatric Association.

He declared that Guadalcanal conditions produced group-neurosis never seen before and which might never be seen again. The marines' composite story as it was gradually pieced together gave a picture of physical and mental strain which combined the highlights of an Edgar Allan Poe horror story with the hair-raising adventures of Buck Rogers, colored-strip hero.

"I believe the enemy made a careful study of American psychology, American ways of living and thinking, and used this knowledge against us," Lieut.-Commander Rogers Smith declared.

He described the Machiavellian skill shown by the Japanese in timing raids and bombings to prevent sleep and said that some of the marines lost 45 lbs.

"This was not the sudden, quickly-terminated but terrific rape of Pearl Harbor or the similarly acute days of Dunkirk," he added. "It was worse than both of them and was prolonged for weeks" - Gaudalcanal Echoes

## New Caladonia an Island Paradise

March 1942 the convoy of naval vessels and troop transports arrived in New Caledonia before any Japanese occupation force arrived by invasion or by the Vichy government's invitation for a limited occupation while aboard the troop transports. Through the kindness of Australian Army, a crew of 24 artillerymen, and two officers were supplied to train the American Task Force artillery men to use the North African battle proven British 18-pounders and 25-pounders.

The American Chiefs of Staff feared the Japanese would penetrate beyond New Britain and the northern Solomons to the southeast to invade New Caledonia and sever the lines of communication between Australia and the United States.

The Japanese had exactly such plans. However, the valiant men still fighting at Bataan and Corregidor held up the Japanese Pacific advance. These men deserve a great deal more gratitude than ever given them. The troop movement from Australia to New Caledonia was in reality a race to beat the Imperial Japanese Army to strategically located New Caledonia.

# THE VETERAN'S CEMETERY PROTECTION ACT OF 1997

There have been many reported cases of vandalism in national cemeteries. Many of the perpetrators escaped punisment as there were no criminal penalties provided in the 1974 Act. To correct this situation H.R. 1532 was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Representative Calvert (California). This is a bill to amend Title 18, United States Code, to create criminal penalties for theft and willful vandalism at national cemeteries. The legislative bill is known as The Veteran's Cemetery Protection Act of 1997. The legislation passed the House of Representatives June 23, 1997. The legislation now moves to the U.S. Senate to be voted on in September or October. If you support this legislation contact your U.S. Senator and urge him to vote for the legislation.

### Statement from Congressman Earl Pomeroy (N.D. Democrat) The Veterans' Cemetery Protection Act of 199

Honoring those who have protected our freedom is an absolute responsibility of our country.

Across America, national cemeteries serve as a poignant reminder that some have given the ultimate sacrifice in the defense of freedom. From the beaches of France, to the jungles of Southeast Asia, and the deserts of the Middle East, Americans have fallen fighting for our common values. The resting places for our war dead must be protected and honored.

It is shameful to think that anyone would desecrate or steal from the hallowed ground of a veterans' cemetery, but sadly such acts have occurred in recent years.

I am pleased that just before Independence Day, the House of Representatives passed the Veterans' Cemetery Protection Act. This legislation would serve as a deterrent by increasing the penalties for those who dishonor the nation's war dead. Under this legislation, anyone convicted of vandalism that causes damage of less than \$1,000 could receive a fine and serve a prison term of up to one year. Anyone convicted of vandalism that exceeds \$1,000 could receive a fine and a prison term of up to 10 years. In addition, anyone convicted of hiding, stealing or selling national cemetery property could receive a sentence of up to 15 years in prison.

The 114 veterans' national cemeteries are the most important symbols of the sacrifices that have been made to keep our nation free and strong. To desecrate them is a despicable act that cannot be tolerated. I commend all of the veterans, their families and others who worked hard to make this legislation a reality. The U.S. Senate will vote on this legislation in September or October 1997.

### THE MYSTIC ISLAND

The first sight of New Caledonia was from aboard ship. A heavy morning mist was present and the island had a mysterious appearance on the horizon. It was a rugged mass unfamiliar to most Americans. As the ship neared the island, our course was intercepted by hidden reefs over which the ocean broke into a magnificent spray thrown continuously, high into the air. The shallows formed by the reefs were beautifully colored by various shades of green, aquamarine and blue, bordered by a snow white spray.

As the colorful shoreline came into view through the mist, one noticed a town of whitewall houses with red roofs nestled on the beaches in the shadow of the rocky mountains and rolling green hills. There were barren-appearing heights with clumps of dark green eucalyptus trees scattered here and there. Higher boulders awkwardly stuck out of the shady beaches.

The rugged geography of New Caledonia gives explanation for some of the difficulties in defending it. In general, New Caledonia was a huge cigar shaped island extending from northwest for 250 miles to the southeast. It's average width was 30 miles, and the area was 8,000 square miles. It has a central mountain spine raising to 5,000 feet and the island was limited to one narrow washboard dusty "coast" road winding the full length of the island with occasional secondary spurs crossing it. All island roads were damaged by floods and washouts and required constant repairs.

### THEISLAND

The island is located 800 miles east from Australia. It is halfway from Australia to New Zealand, and is on the fringe of the Coral Sea. The French used it as a penal colony much as Great Britian used Australia. The Chaine Centrale, a rugged, bare, and orange colored mountain range divided the west coast from the east. Ridges ran parallel in herring-bone pattern from the central range to the sea. The mountain peaks rose almost straight up to 4,000-5,000 feet above green valleys and rushing rivers.

A coral barrier reef, 620 miles long, enclosed the island. It was second in magnitude only to the great Australian barrier reef. The reef had several navigable breaks for an invasion fleet.

# AWHALEOFATALE




Early in May 1942 the Japanese submarine reconnaissance of the island of New Caledonia began with stepped-up activities to locate, map and find a possible area for good landing sites to establish a beachhead for an invasion of New Caledonia.

All during the month of July 1942 there were many reports of unidentified surface ships, submarines, and enemy aircraft west of New Caledonia.

Air Corps (now U. S. Air Force) planes on July 15, 1942, flying from New Caledonia were examining the area where considerable Japanese submarine activity had been observed. Apparently there were a number of whales in the area. Due to poor light or maybe darkness, the Air Corps dropped their bombs and good hits were scored on a number of huge whales. One of the whales, about 100 feet long and maybe 30 or 40 feet wide, was destroyed by the bombing. The deceased whale floated in to the St. Vincent Bay area. When the tide went out, the dead whale was left on the coral reef in about 2 to 3 feet of water. The smell of the rotting whale was very strong. Many fish and small sharks were feeding on the dead whale.

The whale was probably the first one any of those in the 164th had ever seen - dead or alive. To enhance their knowledge of life from the sea, several intrepid numbers of the 164th waded out to the whale. Of course shoes were worn to protect one's feet from being cut by coral. It was an unusual experience for boys from North Dakota.






This mineral rich, densely wooded island, during World War II, developed into a great strategically important island.

Noumea, New Caledonia, is the largest city and is the Island's capital. Noumea was similar to the towns in southern France with it's pastel colored villas. The mixture of races is a pleasant blend of French, Japanese Indo-Chinese, Tahitians, Tonkinese and Javanese.
