There being no corrections, the minutes of the December, 1967, meeting and the Special Senate meeting on January 4, 1968, were ordered approved as submitted.

4.

Mr. St. Clair moved the following recommendation regarding special examinations go into effect next fall. Special examinations are of three types:

- a. Validating examinations, by which students may establish credit and grade points for courses that they have taken at an unaccredited institution. If successful, the student receives the credits and the grades assigned by that institution.
- b. Exempting examinations, by which a student may be excused from taking required courses by demonstrating that he already has a satisfactory knowledge of the subjects.
- c. "Challenge" examinations, by which a student may receive credits but not grade points in a course in which he has not attended as a regular student or as an auditor.

For validating and exempting examinations, the student need only take the final examinations in the appropriate courses at the University of North Dakota. "Challenge" examinations, however, must be longer, more searching, and more comprehensive, and must be administered by a committee of three members of the department.

The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Mr. Tomasek moved that the Chair be given the authority to refer this item to an appropriate committee, either an ad hoc committee, which he would designate, or a standing committee. The motion to refer was seconded, voted upon and carried.

5.

Miss McKenzie presented the list of candidates for degrees in January, 1968, and moved that they be approved for recommendation to the State Board of Higher Education for the awarding of the degrees indicated, upon satisfactory completion of the work of the present semester. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

6.

Mr. Naismith moved that the Senate adopt the Committee on Committees Report on the Curriculum Committee. (See attachment) The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Mr. Robertson moved to postpone action on the report until the next regular meeting of the Senate. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

7.

Mr. Bullard moved that the Senate delegate authority to the Curriculum Committee to approve or disapprove curriculum and/or course changes submitted by the Ellendale Branch or the Williston Center of the University. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

8.

Mr. Bullard reported that the Curriculum Committee had approved a two-year terminal curriculum at Williston which requires only one year of physical education.

9.

Mr. Robertson moved that transfer students from two-year colleges (junior or community colleges) are normally expected to do at least their last two years of course work or sixty credit hours in the University. Transfer credit from two-year colleges will be counted only in those courses which are offered here as freshman or sophomore courses. The University of North Dakota transcripts of transfer students from two-year colleges will show all work done for credit and not just those hours for which transfer credit is counted at the University. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

10.

Mr. Rognlie announced that the ad hoc committee to study the regulations on special exams and report to the Senate at their next meeting would consist of Mr. St. Clair, Mr. Smith, and Mr. Rudisill.

11.

Mr. St. Clair moved that the minutes include the following statements:

- 1) Debates in the Senate may be carried on only by Senate members and that visitors may not expect to participate.
- 2) Visitors are expected to be present at the opening of Senate meetings and remain until adjournment.

Miss Heyse moved to refer this item to the Liaison Committee for discussion and study. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

CURRICULUM COMMITTEE

- Membership: Eight faculty members and the Vice President of Academic Affairs.
- Term: Three years with approximately one-third elected each year.
- Selection: Elected by the Senate at the May meeting and take office on Sept. 1 of the same year.
Vice President of Academic Affairs ex officio.
- Functions and Responsibilities: Both on its own initiative and at the request of departmental and college curriculum committees
- 1) make recommendations or review requests for new courses and programs as well as revisions of existing courses or programs
 - 2) review critically and systematically the offerings of all disciplines, departments, divisions, branches, centers, and colleges of the University
 - 3) review of all course proposals and new program proposals coming from the Williston Center or the Ellendale Branch of the University
 - 4) explore, along with the Graduate Committee, possibilities for cooperation with other institutions of the state in reducing course duplication and proliferation, sharing faculty members, transfer of students, etc.

Guiding Principles

The following recommendations shall be considered an integral part of the program of changing courses and programs.

- 1) Primary responsibility for proposal of new and review of existing courses and programs rests with the department and college concerned.
- 2) Recommendations from the department and college then become the responsibility of the Senate's University Curriculum Committee which is charged with the responsibility for orderly development and continuing review of the University's offerings.
- 3) In addition, courses and programs which have university-wide implications shall fall within the province of the Senate Curriculum Committee.
- 4) Departments and Colleges should establish curriculum committees of their own; and because of variations in size, each should determine its own structure and membership.
- 5) Funds should be allocated to the University Curriculum Committee for the employment of consultants to aid in the orderly review of departmental and college courses and programs.
