Doctor of Arts in Teaching

The Doctor of Arts in Teaching (D.A.T.) degree program is designed to prepare teachers for the 4-year and 2-year colleges in subject matter fields. The recipient of this degree must have demonstrated a command of knowledge in the broad field of the degree and an ability to teach the subject at the post-secondary level.

The D.A.T. degree requires the completion of a program of ninety semester credits beyond the baccalaureate degree. The program of study will provide for the following:

- a. A minimum of 60 credits of work in the discipline (the major) of which no more than 20 credits will be designated as an area of concentration. Included in the area of concentration will be a minimum of 5 credits of independent research.
- b. A minimum of 10 credits in areas cognate to the major.
- c. A minimum of 15 credits in college teaching. The majority of this work will be in a teaching internship in the discipline and in work in the major department preparatory to the internship.

Only those persons holding a Master's degree are eligible for admission to the D.A.T. program. The degree program will require a minimum of two years of study beyond the Master's degree. At least two regular consecutive semesters of residence are required on the University of North Dakota campus.

A written comprehensive examination will be required before advancement to Candidacy for the degree. This examination will cover the broad field of the major and will be prepared by the Graduate Faculty of the department. A final oral examination based on the area of concentration and the independent research also is required. A committee of three members of the Graduate Faculty will supervise the student's program.
