It was first feared he might be permanently blind, but when the bandages were removed he could see without his glasses.

Barger Originates **Bolivia Blood Bank**

Maj. James D. Barger, 1939, former Linton, N. D., resident, is responsible for plans being made to set up a national blood bank in Cochabamba, Bolivia.

He has recently returned to Washington from LaPaz, where he of the Institute of Inter-American affairs field party in Bolivia.

Barger left his work in Rochester, Minn., at the Mayo Medical foundation to go on active duty in the AUS in September, 1942. In August, 1944, he joined the office of Inter-American affairs.

Originating the idea for a Bolivian blood bank when he watched a young Bolivian boy die for lack of blood plasma, Maj. Barger's plans call for the blood bank to be set up in Cochabamba from which it will be possible to fly plasma to the place where it is needed as soon as a call is received.



Sioux Basketball Season Shows Winning 13-5 Mark

The University of North Dakota basketball team rallied n the second half of their season-ending game with the South Dakota State Jackrabbits here to hand the southern team a 49-47 defeat and end their season with a record of 13 wins and 5 losses.

Coach "Red" Jarrett, in an interview, claimed none of the credit for his team's first postwar season and added: "The boys themselves deserve all the credit. They were a wonderful bunch to work with, Captain Louie Bogan, who led the floor play, was responsible for pulling the team through some rough spots. He held the team together.

Jarrett, who next year will turn the team over to the newly appointed coach, Glenn Barnum, now coaching at Bemidji high school, leaves a talented and experienced squad of which only two will be upperclassmen. They are Don Bell, regular forward, a junior, and Dennis "Red" Huntley, reserve forward, who will be a junior. The rest of the squad, including regulars Bogan; Tom Amberry, Grand Forks; Roger Stromme, Cooperstown; and Creighton Knutson, Rugby, are freshmen.

Health Bureau Pians X-Ray Survey at UND

Mass X-ray surveys of all University students, faculty members and employees is being planned by the State Department of Health for the latter part of April, according to a letter received by President John C. West.

Planned for the purpose of helping to bring about the final eradication of tuberculosis in North Dakota, the program's success would make this state the first to achieve such a goal. Success of the program, however, will depend entirely on the co-operation of UND students.

Equipment for the survey would be set up in the dispensary and the library. Removal of clothing would not be necessary and the X-ray picture would take only a few minutes of each person's time, according to Ruth Noren, campus nurse.

Representatives of the State Department of Health have been on the campus making plans for the survey.

A survey of the colleges in the state is expected to be completed by May 20th. In preparing an expects his discharge from the itinerary to cover the colleges

president has recently returned from military service and has resumed his position on the staff of Life magazine.


No report has been received of the Fargo UND founders' day banquet held March 21. Alumni Director Stone and Professor of Education John Page attended the meeting.


