# Veteran History **Head Dies**

Death removed a second University of North Dakota faculty veteran in 1946 when Dr. Clarence Perkins, head of the history department, died October 13 in a Grand Forks hospital, where he had been a patient less than a

Dr. Perkins had been ill since March of this year but continued his teaching duties until October 7, when he was stricken. Funeral services were held in St. Paul's Episcopal church here October 15 and burial was in Memorial Park cemetery.

### IS SECOND LOSS

The loss of Dr. Perkins was the University's second faculty setback within the space of a few weeks, Dean Emeritus E. F. Chandler of the college of engineering having died late in August.

Born August 17, 1878 in Syracuse, N. Y., Dr. Perkins gradu-ated from Syracuse university with a B. A. degree in 1901. He reecived an M. A. degree from Harvard university in 1904 and a Ph. D. from that school in 1908.

Meanwhile, Dr. Perkins had studied in London and Paris in 1906-07, and traveled and did re-

# **Memorial Service Honors** 147 Graduates of University

A solemn note was added to 1946 University Homecoming events when memorial services were held for the 147 UND graduates who gave their lives in the service of their country in World

Brig. Gen. C. F. Schilt, marine corps medal of honor winner, was the principal speaker at the service. "With moral courage and the spirit of cooperation," he said, "America must lead the way to world peace."

The marine corps officer asked the audience for an "offensive for peace," which is far harder than one for war. Because privation and strife are still wide-spread, he said, Americans must exert themselves to preserve the

#### WEST SPEAKS

Gen. Schilt was introduced by President John C. West, who quoted Lincoln's Gettysburg address. After Gen. Schilt's speech, President West introduced Gov. Fred G. Aandahl.

Gov. Aandahl pointed out that the service honored "those from the University who died that ideals might live." He quoted Dr Richard Beck's poem in memory of the war dead.

### RECEIVE AWARDS

After the governor's speech, Alumni Director Lloyd Stone read the honor roll, while the next-of-kin received memorial awards from the University on behalf of the World War II dead. Members of Blue Key Service fraternity and Kappa Sigma social fraternity ushered and presented the memorial awards.

Under the direction of John E. Howard, the University band played "Abide With Me" and the national anthem. At the close of the program Jerry Stenehjem, Minot, N. D., played taps. Rev. Maxwell Brown gave the invocation and Rev. Fr. William McNamee the benediction.

### SIOUX THRASHED

There was little joy for University supporters among the 8,000 who saw the Homecoming football battle between the Sioux and N. D. A. C. Bison, the latter winning, 31-0, to crush completely U. N. D. hopes for a big finish to the first full-scale postwar Homecoming celebration.

University students were cheered ed third place with a pipe of briefly during the halftime when Gov. Fred G. Aandahl crowned Queen Elaine (Patsy) McNeill, Minnewaukan, N. D., and Homecoming Chairman Ralph Maxwell awarded float and house decorations prizes.

Delta Gamma led sorority floats with first prize, while Delta Zeta's ship sailed away with second place. Gamma Phi Beta placed third. Delta Tau Delta's railroad train steamed into first place for fraternity floats, while Theta Chi's live cow took second place honors. The Sigma Chi float earned third place.

### DELTA ZETA WINS

Maxwell presented Delta Zeta with first-place trophy in the sorority house decorations, giving the Delta Zetas two awards. Delta Delta Delta and Pi Beta Phi placed second and third, respectively. Sigma Alpha Epsilon won fraternity first place with its statue of liberty, while Sigma Chi's equation totaled secondplace honors. Kappa Sigma earnpeace.

#### PARADE SUCCESSFUL

The Homecomng parade Saturday morning measured up to prewar standards with 19 floats, seven bands, the queen and attendants and visiting dignitaries. Shortages of materials was evident in the scantiness of sorority girl's costumes. Taking 20 minutes to pass, the parade measured five blocks long.

Dr. R. E. Leigh presided at the alumni luncheon in Epworth hall. He introduced the speakers, President West, Gov. Aandahl and John Hancock, prominent alumnus. West greeted alumni and introduced several guests. Hancock asked alumni to back the Memorial student union fund drive.

ed Memorial stadium October 19 to watch the University Sioux and the N.D.A.C. Bison tangle in their traditional football battle, highlight of the 1946 Homecoming celebration here, saw their favorites absorb one of the worst setbacks in a long history of gridiron competition with the downstate

The Bison, definitely "up" as much as the Sioux were "down" all afternoon, trampled the Glenn Jarrett squad, 31-0, scoring twice in the first quarter, twice in the second and once in the fourth.

The Sioux, tasting defeat for the first time this season after five straight victories, threatened only once, late in the second half. A fumble cut short the rally on the Bison 17.

Previously this fall, the Sioux had defeated Bemidji Teachers, St. Thomas, Luther college, Augustana and University of South

By defeating the Sioux, the A. C. gained undisputed possession of the conference lead and knocked the Sioux from a firstplace tie down into the runner-up

# VETERAN BUSINESS MANAGER SERVES UND 40 YEARS

While the University, walls bulging from an all-time record enrollment of more than 2,600 students, battles problems ranging from GI enrollments and housing for GI families to lack of classroom buildings, one of the state's real veteran administrators continues to shoulder his accustomed huge job, devoting every minute and every effort to keeping the cogs turning in this most difficult of school years.

Back in 1903, this man, J. W. Wilkerson, came to U.N.D. as a student instructor. Since then, he has seen thousands of students come and go, has helped countless hundreds of them with personal

and financial problems.

Now in his fortieth year as University business manager, he is shouldering heavier burdens but giving even more of his time and energy to making the state's biggest and best institution of higher education continue on its accustomed high

Wilkerson, assistant to the secretary-registrar from 1904 to 1906, was appointed business manager in the latter year. He received a certified public accountant's certificate in 1919 by examination before the state board of accountancy. Later, he was a member of that same board, serving on it from 1925 to 1938.
