

Lest We Forget

How many ever realized or gave serious thought to the provisions of Public Resolution No. 96 - 76th Congress, approved 27 August 1940, as an event that would affect the lives of every National Guardsman in the U.S. at that time. It was to see the mobilization of all National Guard Units. In fact through the time it would see a change brought about in the world by one of the most devastating wars ever. It was a happening of such trauma that the Guard still bears the realness of that of necessarily taking the brunt of organized resistance along side of the regulars in any time of need.

It is felt that this year of 1980 the 40th anniversary year is and should well be a time to recollect some of the fateful things of WWII that changed the lives of millions and left its mark on many today. It was on 16 Sept. 1940, when the first National Guard unit was mobilized to receive one years training after which they were to be released in accordance to a resolution that had been adopted by congress on 27 Aug. 1940. It was on that same day (16 Sept. 1940) that President Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed into being the Selective Service Act. This was to fill the ranks of the many Guard units whose ranks needed manpower to bring those units up to full strength. Yes, this was to be a time for the Guard units to train their recruits, because replacement centers did not exist at that time. The North Dakota National Guard was inducted into active, (Federal Service), military service of the army of the United States for a period of twelve (12) months under the Provision of Public Resolution 96 -76th Congress approved 27 Aug. 1940 under the provisions of the National Defense Act as amended and Army Regulations 130-10.

During the period of 20 Sept. 1940 and 1 April 1941 a total of 183 officers and warrant officers and 3,016 enlisted men of the North Dakota National Guard were inducted into service. Records show that 187 enlisted men were discharged and 0 officers.

On 10 Feb. 1941, the 34th Division was inducted, to which the North Dakota National Guard provided 114 officers, one warrant officer and 1,734 enlisted men. These units moved to Camp Claiborne, Louisiana, during the period of 18 to 26 Feb. 1941 for training.

Of course many of us recall the Executive Order extending the periods of training to 18 months instead of the

original one year. This was Executive Order No. 8862 signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, dated 21 August 1941. As some may remember it was the joint resolution - removing restrictions on the territorial use of units & members of the army of United States extending periods of service of same. This joint resolution was brought about by Public Law 338 - 77th Congress. This resolution was binding IAW the amendments & changes applicable to the Selective Training Act of 1940 as amended; approved 13 Dec. 1941. It was Special Orders No. 22, dated 24 Jan. 1941 that the 164th Infantry Rifle consisting of the following:

HO & HQ Company — Company "E"; HQ & HQ Det 1st Bn - Company "F"; HQ & HQ Det 3rd Bn - Company H; Anti Tank Co - Company "I"; Service Co - Company "K"; Band -Company "L"; Medical Det -Company "M".

Company's "A", "B", "C", "D" were inducted into active duty all in accordance with Executive Order No. 8633 dated 14 Jan. 1941 The White House, and as announced 10 Feb. 1941 was the effective date of induction for the units listed. It was signed by order of the Governor, Heber L. Edwards, the Adjutant General. All deeds and accomplishments after that date was up to the individuals of the units to include the filler personnel. As we well know the personnel of the 164th Infantry did perform well and earned with sweat and blood every bit of recognition given them during their tenure with the Americal Division. Their deeds in performance as a part of Task Force 6814 and the Americal Division deserve to be recognized and congratulations to each all of you on this fortieth anniversary year.

I hope I have helped you enough with what I recall of that night's combat. Also remembering the 164th, was up against the best Tojo had, all seasoned Japanese combat troops, who never head the experience of having the Americans or anyone for that matter throw a curve at them to fight a defensive battle, where they were so used to fighting offensively, and never having been defeated in battle.

I hope this writing is legible, as my muscles & nerves in my arm & neck are slowly deteriorating from this 70% VA disability and operation I had on my neck & shoulder.

(1) Your unit — Area where you were in combat.

"C" Co., 1st Bn, 7th Marines — All through Guadalcanal — From Matanikau — Tasafarongu — Tenariu & Blood Knoll.

(2) How contact with the 164th was made during the night support operation.

Approximately some time around midnight and 0100 in the morning. It was pouring rain and the 164th came up on the hill behind the airport.

 (3) Any names you might recall — Commanders, etc.

> Vaguely, I think the commanding general of the army units at that time was Luther Hodges. My C.O. for that battle was Capt. Charles Kelly — My Bn. Co was Louis "Chesty" Puller.

(4) Any other comments you might have about your association with the 164th Infantry Regiment or the Americal Division.

> To a marine, I think 164th Infantry performed exceptionally well and even beyond their call as combat army, considering they came off the beach that night green and received their christening as com

bat soldiers under the conditions they were put into combat. To give us support, we were getting low on ammo after fending off two or three Banzai charges. At the time we were using 03 Springfields. Japanese were counting our rounds as

we expended them. The 164th had M'ls.

We asked them to hold their fire until the Japanese counted our shots. When they attempted another Banzai charge the 164th let go with their M'ls catching the Japs by surprise and also giving us time to reload our five round clips into our Springfields. It's been so long my memory is a little confused, but, I think with the help of the 164th that night we wiped out the 122nd Imperial Marines. These marines were of exceptional height, much taller than the average Japanese soldier. I think they unloaded from the transport of Santa Crury Pt. This transport was sunk and capsized early that morning.

There were quite a few CMO's awarded the next day. I don't recall if any were awarded to any of the 164th that night or next day as I was moved with my outfit to the Tenaru River position inland where we caught the balance of the Japanese Army as they tried to get to the sea, and we practically anihilated them in the trap between the inner jungle and the beach.
