



seconded with motion carried.

President Griffin called for any old business, there being none, he opened the floor for new business.

Bernie Wagner reported on the meeting of the Executive Board held at 7:00 AM, 8 Oct. 88. On the matter of Trust Fund CDs in the names of Fargo, Bismarck, Minot, Grand Forks and Dickinson Reunion Committees. the Executive Board recommended that these CD funds be redesignated as 164th Infantry Association CDs and placed under financial control of the Association Hg. The reason being that such reunion committees ceased to exist, per se, in those cities and individuals who initially transacted the CD purchase were inactive, or no longer available. Also, if the funds went to the Association Hg, those funds would be available to subsidize, in part, if necessary any future reunions held in any of these five cities. Motion was made and seconded to accept this recommendation. Motion carried. Discussion of recommendation by members ensued after the motion passed. Representatives of Fargo, Dickinson and Grand Forks voiced opposition and an amended motion was made as follows: Members, in attendance of these trust fund cities, would discuss the motion with other members in those cities who did not attend the 88 Reunion. Each city would then have until 1 April 1989 to inform the Association Hq a/o The Executive Board, by letter, of their opinion or decision.

Motion was made by Bill Williamson, seconded by Wally Johnson. Motion was carried to amend the above motion to include the provision that if a reply was not received by the 1 April 89 date, the Assoc Hq would then have the authority to redesignate the Trust Fund CDs of the city in default, to the Assoc Hq name.

Bernie Wagner discussed the By Laws section on life members. On the recommendation of the Executive Board, he made a motion to amend Article 2, Section 4 of the By Laws to read life members and spouse, thereby making the spouse a life member upon the death of the initial life members. Motion seconded and carried.

The matter of life membership for all members was presented by Bernie Wagner. This would reduce the administrative load of annual membership renewals, postage costs, etc.

Bill Williamson spoke to the Association on the upcoming election of 1988 which included initiated Measure No. 4 which would restore funds to the Veterans Commission of ND. A resolution was adopted by the 164th Inf Association to support the North Dakota Veterans Organizations in

passing Measure No. 4.

Avote of confidence and recognition was expressed by the Association members to Bill Tillotson for the outstanding job as Editor of the 164th News.

Bill Tillotson reported on the All Veterans Memorial under construction in Bismarck. Ground breaking ceremonies were held 28 Aug 88 with work beginning immediately. The Memorial will be on the Capitol Grounds and should be completed prior to the 1989 164th Reunion. It was suggested a memorial service or recognition of the Memorial be held at the site during the 1989 Reunion.

Floyd Henderson, WWI veteran and long time Associate was introduced, gave a few words and received a standing ovation from the members.

President Griffin called for a vote on the nominations of officers for the year 1989. Individuals selected by the Nominations Committee were elected unanimously by voice vote.

President Griffin recommended the formation of a Advisory Council in the Association. This Council would consist of one representative from each city or town which has Association members. No action taken at this meeting.

There being no further business, President Griffin called for a motion to adjourn. Motion made, seconded and motion carried.

It should be noted in these minutes, names of members who made motions and seconded motions were not given by the individual, in some cases. Therefore in most instances, the minutes will only specify member in regard to motions.
