Research Job Goes to U Grad

Dr. John A. Hutcheson, North Dakota University graduate in 1926 and a native of Park River, was named director of research laboratories for the Westinghouse Electric Corp. in Pittsburgh.

Hutcheson, former associate director, succeeded Dr. L. Warrington Chubb, who retired for reasons of health to become director emeritus.

Hutcheson joined Westinghouse soon after his graduation from the University and during the war directed the radar research program and helped plan the development of atomic energy.

Announcement was made February 29 of the establishment by Hutcheson of an award at UND for outstanding technical reports by engineering students. Awards of \$10, \$15, and \$25 will be made each year for semi-technical writings.

The award is known as the "William J. Hutcheson Memorial Prizes" in honor of John Hutcheson's father.

University Grads Hitting Public Prints

Latest to be mentioned is Lt. Bob McLeod, former UND basketball player, who draws mention in Quentin Reynolds' new book, "The Curtain Rises." Reynolds tells about McLeod's exploit as a PT boat commander in which he sank a Jap freighter laden with troops and oil off Bizerte, in the Mediterranean in July, 1943.

Another war incident involves Tom Campbell of Hardin, Mont., Grand Forks native and Sioux alumnus famed as "the wheat king." Campbell is mentioned in the late John G. Winant's book, "Letter from Grosvenor Square."

Winant, who was ambassador to Great Britain, tells about getting a call from President Roosevelt in which Roosevelt declared that Campbell had figured out what was wrong with the British tanks at that early stage of the war. Campbell's solution was to put heavier tracks on the machines. The British did-and found their tanks more effective, according to Winant.

State Regains Some of War Lost Population

North Dakota has regained some of the population it lost during the war years, accord-ing to figures received by the University journalism guide. The new 1948 Ayars newspaper guide lists the current population estimate for the state at 552,000, a gain of 32,000 over the last previous estimate of 520,000 made July 1, 1945. The current estimate is 90,000 persons, or 14 per cent, under the 1940 census figure of 642,000.

Contract Let for 'Science'

Minnapeolis contractor Fred R. Comb Co., was awarded a contract by the board of high er education to construct a science building at the Univer sity.

The company's bid of \$281,214 plus \$3,700 on two minor alter nates, was by far the lowest of five bids submitted.

The Lunseth Plumbing and Heating Co., of Grand Forks was awarded a contract for plumbing and heating installa tions on its bid of \$64,238.

Bids on electrical work will be re-advertised. Neither of two bidders held proper North Da kota licenses on the date of letting, according to A. F. Ar nason, commissioner of higher education.
