Prof. William E. Budge, who was connected with the University in the college of engineering practically all his adult life, died Dec. 6 at the Veterans hospital, Fargo. He was 60 years old.

A graduate of Valley City high school in 1908, he re-

ceived his degree from UND in 1911 and became assistant in the lignite and class research at Hebron until he entered the army in March, 1917. Commissioned in the coast artillery, he served overseas from July, 1918, to March, 1919, with the mining branch

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
