December 1, 1977

The December meeting of the University Senate was held at 4:05 p.m. on Thursday, December 1, 1977, in room 7, Gamble Hall. Ronald Pynn presided.

It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the meeting of November 3, 1977, be approved as distributed. The motion was voted upon and carried.

Mr. Phillips, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, presented the list of candidates for election to the Administrative Procedures Committee, the Codification Committee and the Committee on Committees. The Chair announced that a ballot would be cast now and that the secretary would tally the results and report them in the minutes and in the next issue of the University Letter.

Those nominated for election to the Administrative Procedures Committee were: Bonniejean Christensen, Mabel Curry, Glenn Lykken, Russell Peterson and Barrie Wells. The Chair called for additional nominations from the floor. Since there were none, a ballot was taken and Ms. Curry, Mr. Lykken, Mr. Peterson and Mr. Wells were declared elected as members of that committee.

The nominees for election to the Codification Committee were Randy Lee and Arne Selbyg. The Chair called for additional nominations from the floor. There were no additional nominations. A ballot was taken and Mr. Lee was elected.

The nominees for election to the Committee on Committees were Dean Engel, Gordon Iseminger, Paul Kannowski, Lloyd Omdahl and Monte Phillips. The Chair called for additional nominations from the floor. Since there were no further nominations, a ballot was taken and Mr. Engel, Mr. Iseminger, Mr. Omdahl and Mr. Phillips were elected.

5.

Mr. Ulven presented the tentative list of Candidates for Degrees in December, 1977, and moved that the list be approved for recommendation to the State Board of Higher Education for the awarding of the degrees indicated, upon satisfactory completion of the work of the present semester. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried. (See attachment #1.)

6.

The Chair called for the report of the Summer Sessions Committee. Mr. Penn reported that the Committee is presently engaged in long term planning and review activities and will submit a written report upon completion. There being no objection, this was approved.

7.

Mr. Robertson presented the report of the University College Committee. (See attachment #2.) Mr. Naismith moved acceptance of the report. Mr. Tomasek seconded the motion. The motion was voted upon and carried.

8.

Mr. Markovich moved a recommendation from the Senate Executive Committee to change the first sentence of the Senate Bylaws under Meetings to read: Items for the agenda shall be in the hands of the Registrar not later than 14 days (exclusive of holidays) before a Senate Meeting. The motion was seconded.

The Chair asked for discussion and since there was none, announced that this was the first reading of the proposed Bylaws change and that a vote would be taken at the January Senate Meeting.

9.

Mr. Crail presented the report of the Student Policy Committee. Mr. Tomasek moved acceptance of the report. Mr. Koenig seconded the motion. It was voted upon and carried. (See attachment #3.)

10

Agenda item #7 was withdrawn at the request of Arne Selbyg and the consent of the Senate. Mr. Selbyg requested permission to include in the minutes the reason for withdrawal. There being no objection, this was allowed. Mr. Selbyg withdrew his recommendation since the rules in preparing the academic salary budget have been changed so position count won't be a factor in the number of faculty hired.

11.

Conny Nelson presented a budget report. He gave the background information used in formulating the academic salary budget and reviewed the budget activity which is ongoing on the campus. He presented visual slides which Mr. Selbyg requested be included in the minutes. There being no objection, the slides are attached to these minutes. (See attachment #4.)

12.

Mr. Lewis presented the following recommendation and moved its approval: Be it resolved that the Senate duplicate and distribute copies of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Senate to all faculty and to administrators and students who are University Senators. Be it further resolved that the Senate direct that the next editions of the Faculty Handbook and the Code of Student Life contain copies of the Constitution and Senate Bylaws. The motion was seconded and discussion followed. Mr. Lewis moved to amend his motion to delete the Code of Student Life. There being no objection, the amendment was approved. The motion was voted upon and carried.

13.

Mr. Lewis moved that because of projected curtailments in funding and possible reductions in students and faculty, it seems desirable that plans also be made that will ease the reduction of administrators. In fact, since 1970 administrative costs and administrators have grown at a faster rate than either student enrollment or faculty.

While it is recognized that this growth has been in faculty- and student-support areas and has indirectly contributed to the primary teaching and research missions of the University, if retrenchment is required, indirect support of teaching and research should be the first funded area to be curtailed. Given the State-mandated funding formula, it behooves the University to seek State funds on the basis of its

primary missions and to argue reasonable trades of indirect support for direct support. For example, administrators who have faculty rank can (and, by Senate rule--see the "Statement on Administrator Responsibilities," approved April 6, 1977--should) teach; thus, new administrators could be appointed from the ranks of present faculty, shifted to the non-instructional budget, and continue to teach on a reduced but regular basis. The University should be encouraged to argue for expansion or at least retention of faculty, student, and research resources, and especially those of the University Libraries, with, if necessary, a trade-off of administration and non-instructional cost. It seems possible that the State Board of Higher Education and the citizens of North Dakota could be persuaded of the wisdom of such a trade.

Therefore, as a demonstration of its faith in the primacy of teaching and research, as an initial step in the reduction of administrative costs, BE IT RESOLVED that the UND Senate develop a plan by February 1, 1978, whereby one-third of the administrative personnel funded from non-instructional budgets henceforth be appointed to positions for a maximum of three years and that these positions be identified as temporary; persons with faculty rank filling those positions could, at the expiration of their terms, return to full-time teaching and research if they had tenure or if appropriate vacancies exist.

(If this resolution is adopted, either the Senate Executive Committee, an ad hoc committee, or a person or persons designated by the President could present the plan for limitation of administrators to the Senate.)

To implement such a resolution, it is important that persons who are not full-time teachers and researchers be excluded from the instructional budget. Therefore, it is necessary that the Senate review the list of all faculty and administrator positions by title, FTE, budget classification and tenure status. Therefore, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Senate direct the Office of Institutional Research to prepare such a list for distribution to the Senate before its next meeting.

The motion was seconded and discussion followed. Mr. Iseminger moved to suspend the standing rules of the Senate so the meeting could continue beyond 5:30 p.m. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried. Discussion on Mr. Lewis' motion continued. Mr. Kolstoe moved to adjourn. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried. Mr. Pynn announced the next meeting of the Senate would be held on January 19, and that agenda items would be due at 4:00 p.m. on January 9.

The University College Committee met Thursday, November 17, at 11:00 a.m., in Twamley Hall, Room 211-B.

The members of the Committee are: James Rue, George Schubert, Gerald Lawrence, Rodney Medalen, Lynn Allen, LaVernia Jorgenson, M. Helen Smiley and D. J. Robertson (advisory).

The Committee was convened by Dean D. J. Robertson, advisory member. Professor George Schubert was elected chairman.

Various activities of the University College were discussed, including advisement of students, high school visitations and recruitment, and the summer registration program. There was also some discussion of prospects for the future as it may be affected by the scheduled retirement of Dean Robertson and the appointment of a successor.

The Committee decided to recommend to Conny Nelson, VPAA, that a member of the University College Committee should be added to the Search Committee for the Dean of the University College. Lynn Allen was designated as the representative on the committee if arrangements can be made.

### STUDENT POLICY COMMITTEE 1976-77 Annual Report to the University Senate

The Student Policy Committee (SPC) is comprised of ten members: five students, four faculty members, and the Vice-President for Student Affairs. Members of the Committee during 1976-77 were:

Students: Dave Reitan (Chairperson), Terry Barnhardt, Erick Crail, Bob

Krasicki, and Lu Ann Rasmuson.

Faculty: Dave Beach ('77), Betty Gard ('78), Sue Neidlinger ('79), and Bob

Snortland ('77).

Vice-President for Student Affairs: Russ Brown.

In accordance with the charge to SPC to "review policies and regulations concerning the student's life outside the classroom," SPC acted upon the following four major subjects this year.

- 1. TASK FORCE ON ACCOUNTING PROCEDURES. In response to past problems with purchases made by representatives of student organizations, a task force was formed by SPC to study this problem area and make recommendations. This task force was comprised of Ken Brandt, Director of Student Activities; Brenda Blazer, Chairperson, Student Activities Committee; Bruce Haskins, Accounting Office; and SPC members Crail, Neidlinger, Rasmuson, and Reitan. The Task Force made the following recommendations:
  - A. All checks written to University student organizations should carry reference to UND in the pay-to-the-order blank. This is to insure that student organization funds are deposited in their University accounts.
  - B. The Task Force drafted a Purchase Authorization Form and urged all student groups to use it as verification for all group purchases.
  - C. A letter should be drafted to the Chamber of Commerce informing them of these past problem areas. Businesses should be urged to require proper identification and authorization for purchases, and should contact the Student Activities secretary if they have any questions.

Recommendations A and B were carried out by SAC, and C was carried out by SPC.

2. UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE STUDY. In response to questions regarding the relationship between SPC, University Senate, Student Senate, and the Board of Student Publications, SPC recommended that an Ad Hoc Committee on University Governance be formed by President Clifford. This committee would investigate current relationships and make recommendations to the appropriate bodies for changes needed to clarify these relationships. The recommendation also contained a suggested structure and composition for the study group. This recommendation was submitted to President Clifford in October, 1976. In February, 1977, SPC was informed that this study group would be formed during that month under the University Senate Executive Committee. SPC later learned, although never officially informed, that no separate study group was formed; instead, the Executive Committee was conducting the study, and had limited the scope of the study to a review of the University Constitution. Late last spring, SPC concluded that the issues which gave rise to the original motion for a University governance study are still unresolved and continue to give problems to SPC. Therefore, SPC again strongly urged the President to create an Ad Hoc Committee on University Governance. This issue will be pursued further during 1977-78.

- 3. RESIDENT ASSISTANT PARTICIPATION IN OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES. Concern was expressed to SPC regarding the Housing Office requirement that all Resident Assistants (RA s) be prohibited from major participation in extracurricular activities or other outside jobs. SPC found this policy to be unjustified because several past cases had shown that RA s could participate in other activities without adversely affecting job performance as an RA. This policy unfairly prejudged a student's ability to handle such situations. Upon conferring with the Acting Director of Housing, Terry Clark, SPC was assured that Housing would change the policy to reflect a more positive approach: RA s would still be urged to consult with the Director of Housing before accepting other activities, but no prohibitive action would be taken unless and until a detrimental effect on the RA's job performance had occurred.
- 4. CODE OF STUDENT LIFE. In February, 1977, SPC received the revised draft of the Code of Student Life as drafted by the Office of Student Development. The Code is a student handbook containing policies and regulations regarding the following subject areas: student organizations, student records, Student Health Service, Counseling Center, University Center, use of University facilities, student conduct and appeals, University owned residences, due process, the "Joint Statement on Rights and Freedoms of Students," and selected Grand Forks city ordinances. SPC proceeded to approve the Code section by section. This was a laborious process due to the readability of the draft, incongruencies between sections of the Code, failure of the Housing Office to submit their draft section on University owned residences, and a major revision of the sections dealing with due process and student conduct. Work on the Code is expected to continue through the fall semester of 1977–78.

In addition to these other activities, SPC conducted its function of recognizing student organizations by approving constitutions and constitutional modifications for the following groups: National Student Exchange, Citizens League on Environment and Natural Resources (CLEAN), Red River Valley Student Nurses Association, Synchronized Swim Club, Fisheries and Wildlife Biology Club, "NASUJAPI" Rugby Club, Soccer Club, Chinese Students Association, Society of Women Engineers, Students Older Than Average, Volleyball Club, and the Board of Student Publications (BOSP).
