
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Judges Attend Homecoming

Memorial Student Union Dedicated

Dedication of the new Memorial Student Union was one of the highlights of the University's 1951 Homecoming celebration. The building was formerly presented to the students Friday, October 12.

Attorney Theodore Kellogg of Dickinson, main dedication speaker and a 1930 University graduate, paid tribute to University leaders in directing the progress and growth of the school. He linked this progress with the development of North Dakota's lignite and oil resources.

In referring to University leaders' participation in oil and lignite research, Kellogg said: "Their alertness in recognizing these obligations has resulted in establishing this University in a position of leadership in providing the training and resources that will be required.

'It is a fortunate thing for the state of North Dakota that they have been so foresighted. We can look forward to seeing native North Dakotans, locally trained, leading in these new fields of development." J. Lloyd Stone, alumni director and member of the Student Union board of directors, presented the building to the students. Rinehart Ruff of

West Fargo, student board of governors chairman, accepted the building on behalf of the students.
