
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## New Medical Building

### Sioux Fourth In Conference Football Race

Coach Frank Zazula's football team stowed away its gear after dropping the season finale to University of South Dakota, 35-13.

The Coyotes won the North Central championship with an unblemished record in six games. The Sioux were fourth with a record of two wins and three defeats.

Following their unexpected but thorough trouncing of the North Dakota A. C. Bison, 33-14, the Sioux had hopes of finishing above the .500 mark but the Dad's Day game with Augustana here was canceled because of snow and cold and then the loss to South Dakota ruined the hopes.

### Had Hoped to Win

The Sioux were confident of victory over Augustana, which finished last in the circuit, and the chances are that the Zazula forces could have downed the Vikings with a Dad's Day throng to cheer them on and their own squad in top condition for the game.

# **Medical School Accredited**

The University of North Dakota two-year medical school is now accredited by the Association of American Medical Colleges.

Sanction of the school by the association was voted late in October and eliminates the probationary status imposed in 1937-38.

Announcement of the associ-

ation's action was made at the annual meeting in French Lick, Indiana. Dean W. F. Potter, head of the medical school, attended the three-day convention.

### **Efforts Blocked**

Dean Potter said that accreditation is the essential step in establishing the proposed four-year medical school here.

Efforts toward initiating the four-year plan were blocked until the association's stamp of approval had been given the two-year course.

Difficulty in placing graduating students here in other institutions would be modified by the sanction, Dean Potter said, as would acquiring and maintaining a permanent, competent staff.

H. E. French, dean emeritus of the medical school, said the probationary status was inflicted in 1937 mainly because of inadequate financial support by the state.

### **Criticize School**

In addition, the report by the association effecting the probation, criticized the school's staff, library, equipment, quality of students and insufficient room space.

The work that University medical students did here and at schools accepting them as transfers was hit by the report, Dean French said.

In 1933, during the height of the depression, the legislature halved University appropriations and the school began a decline that ended in probationary status with the association.

### Medical School

(Continued from Page One) After 1937, appropriations began to increase "slowly," Dean French said, and in 1945 the present Medical building was appropriated, Before that medical school classes were held in the old science building.

The one-mill levy established in 1948 by initiated law for the construction of a state medical center here was a big point in favor of accreditation, Dean French declared.

One of the avowed purposes of the medical center is the accreditation of the two-year school.

#### **Questions Ability**

The probationary report criticized the combined departments, such as pathology and bacteriology being under one man and the lack of personnel, Dean French said. One examiner questioned the state's ability to hire competent personnel to replace the 1937 staff if they left the University for the salaries then extant, he added.

With only two exceptions, every graduate of the medical school has been placed in other schools to continue his studies, but accreditation should make it easier for graduates from here to get in the schools of their choice, Dean French declared.

A better school in every way, Dean French concluded, was the probable reason for accreditation.

But, he warned, it will be necessary to select students carefully from now on to keep accreditation since we are judged largely on their work here and in other medical schools.

#### Name Inspectors

Inspection of the medical school for the association was completed October 1. Inspectors included Dr. Francis R. Manlove, associate secretary of the American Medical association; Dr. Dean F. Smiley, secretary of the Association of American Medical Colleges; and Dr. Stanley W. Olson of

the University of Illinois, representative of both groups.

Association sanction is tantamount to approval by the American Medical association, although that organization has not issued formal approval to date.

A survey team of medical school deans inspected the state's medical facilities viewing the establishment of the four-year school but has not yet issued a report.

A step toward the four-year medical school accreditation was made recently when the medical school disclosed plans for a \$600,000 addition to the present medical building.

According to Dean Potter, the extension is "not necessary" to the proposed fouryear medical school but it is needed badly "to provide facilities to attract the calibre of men necessary for accreditation."
