Named to State Board

A former Grand Forks woman was named a member of the state board of education Wednesday by Gov. Norman Brunsdale.

She is Mrs. Mildred Burns Johnson of Wahpeton, a lawyer and the second woman ever to be named to the board. Both she and her husband, Vernon Johnson, '32, of Whapeton, former speaker of the state house of representatives, are lawyers.

Named to a seven-year term ending July 1, 1959, Mrs. Johnson will take the place of Fred J. Traynor of Devils Lake, who has served on the board since its inception in 1939.

UND Grad Scholarship Fund Sought West Point

A program which, when completed, will provide the University with a \$1,000,000 scholarship fund, will be expedited at a Minneapolis meeting of the UND Alumni association board of directors thiis

Gifts from corporations to aid in matching the J.F.T. O'Connor bequest to the University will be the principal business of the Minneapolis session, Alumni Director Lloyd Stone reported.

The scholarship fund is being set up under terms of the will of the late O'Connor, former comptroller of the currency and UND alumnus. O'-Connor's bequest represents one-fourth of his estate and it is estimated that the University's share will approximate \$500,000. This amount must be matched by the school.

The alumni association now

is conducting a fund drive for that purpose. Invitations to all alumni directors to the Minneapolis meeting will be extended by Daniel Bull, president of the Cream of Wheat Corp.; Dewey Balch, vicepresident of General Mills, and Henry Lykken, president of Hurricane Pulverizer Co., all of Minneapolis.

Federal tax laws permit corporations to give up to five per cent of their earnings to worthwhile educational, scientific and welfare activities at little actual cost to the donating firms. (Continued from Page One) the frst academic procession in West Point's 150 years of existence. In the procession of over 500 people, delegates in academic robes representing American and foreign colleges and universities predominated.

Of the latter the oldest school represented was the University of Bologna, founded in 1088 and the youngest was the University of Natal, South Africa, founded in 1949.

Delegates of the foreign military academies, representatives of the diplomatic corps, which included many foreign military attaches, moved in the long and colorful procession at the end of which marched President Truman, who delivered the principal address. Other speakers were Gen.

Omar N. Bradley, chairman of joint chiefs of staff, and Karl T. Compton, chairman of the corporation, Massachusetts Institue of Technology. On the speaker's platform sat a number of leading figures in public life, such as cabinet members, four admirals and 13 generals, including Bradley, Collins and Ridgway.

The Jubilee Banquet was held in the huge Washington Hall, an excellent example of military Gothic architecture at West Point. The great dining hall with the high ceilings can seat the entire corps of cadets, 2500 men, at one time. Covering the entire south wall is a magnificent mural portraying 20 great battles and 20 great generals in world history. Colorful heraldic insignia on the massive cross beams, flags of the states and territories give the hall an appearance of ' a baronial Gothic manor.

At each table in the banquet hall sat a few West Point seniors, thus affording the delegates a good opportunity to learn more about the academy, the interesting traditions, customs, regulations and the personalities of the cadets.

Occupied as a military post since 1778, West Point was established as a military academy in 1802 and continues to be a worthy and living symbol of American history.
