Graduate Writes Of Campus Visit

Dear Alumnus:

Last year I wrote for the first time to University of North Dakota alumni now living in Texas. I am just ending a three-week visit in Grand Forks—and I thought you might like to hear again this year what one man's impression of the University might be.

For those of us who were acquainted with the University of North Dakota during the depression years, the recent advances seem impossible. In less than one decade the physical plant has doubled and, I believe, another decade may see it doubled again. You know that there are now on the campus two new dormitories, a new fieldhouse, engineering building, Student Union and medical building.

The addition to the power plant and a new building for the School of Education will be begun shortly. If you will excuse a glance in my crystal ball, I see by 1965 a new library, geology, biology and administration buildings, a "little theatre" and perhaps an auditorium.

If you were ever at the University in the summer, perhaps you remember how quiet and almost deserted it seemed. Now it is a regular ant hill. Summer enrollments run between 800 and 900 where 15 years ago the summer students numbered 300 or 400.

Most of us, when we return to the University, look for familiar spots on the campus and, somehow, expect and hope for familiar faces. Partly because of necessity and partly for tradition, I think, the University has kept much of its old charm.

The trees on the coulee bank have grown, of course, but the gentle sweep of that stream would recall many a happy time and probably some very dull moments. Davis hall, with its soft-colored walls and heavy roof reminds me of Queen Mary in one of her famous hats; and Old Main is still the proud but rather infirm seat of the administration.

I used to expect it to collapse with a crash; now I know better — it will simply sink into the ground and vanish, slowly and quietly.

There is, however, a new spirit of research at the University. The huge lignite laboratory is startling evidence of a change in emphasis. But wherever you go—into the new medical building, back in some hidden room of the Physics Department in old Science Hall, into the odors of the Chemistry Building—you will find someone working, studying, and searching for something new.

Since I work in a field of science and engineering myself, I am delighted at this development, especially as it is handled at the University. Here the research has not isolated itself from the undergraduate, but works in close harmony with the instructional program. We have all seen institutions where research is everything and the student is simply an unfortunate marked down item at the notions counter. This is not, and never will be, the case at the University of North Dakota.

Grand Forks is changing too. I think you would be pleased to know that University Avenue presents a wide, beautiful, newly-paved approach to the University.

The city is expanding—the new St. Michael's Hospital on Columbia Road is a huge structure—easily twice the size of Merrifield Hall. Almost all the region between Columbia Road and University Park is built up in small, modern houses.

With the increase in the size and scope of the University the city is, it seems to me, becoming more and more Uni-

Grant to Chemist Renewed

Renewal of a \$2,000 research grant to Dr. Lawrence Summers of the University chemistry department was revealed by the Research Corp. of New York City.

The renewal was made on basis of progress reported in the work Dr. Summers had done in the field of organometallic chemistry.

Dr. Summers is also carrying on research under a grant from the U. S. navy office of research. William Bakke of Hettinger has been named to a research fellowship in this work for the coming year.

Football Forces Defeated

University football fortunes hit their lowest point in many years as the Sioux lost their third straight North Central conference game to South Dakota State, 60-6, the worst setback a U.N.D. team ever took in league play.

Previously, Coach Frank Zazula's forces had lost to South Dakota U, 21-14, and to Iowa Teachers, 27-14.

In both those games, played in Memorial stadium here, the Sioux looked very good after an uncertain first period. They yielded two quick touchdowns to South Dakota, then came back in the second quarter to assume a 14-13 lead before the powerful Coyotes could halt their excellent offense. The outcome could have been reversed with a few breaks but the closeness of the final score gave hope of a brighter future.

The Sioux were not expected to handle Iowa Teachers and once again a poor first quarter let the Panthers assume a 13-0 lead. Once again the Sioux came back to assume a brief 14-13 lead but eventually succumbed to much superior manpower.

Down at Brookings, the Sioux reversed themselves. They went into a 6-0 lead early in the game. After that, it was a parade of Jackrabbit touchdowns as some 8,000 South Dakota State homecoming fans watched.

Fans here had expected a Jackrabbit triumph but the size of the final score was as shocking as it was disappointing. An injury early in the game to End Dick Ryan, the team's outstanding performer, hurt the Sioux badly and with him out, it was strictly no contest.

Whether the team can bounce back to make a respectable showing the rest of the way is a problem which Zazula and Assistant Coach Tom Hughes are trying to solve.
