Journalists Rank First Nationally

The University of North Dakota undergraduate chapter of Sigma Delta Chi scored a double triumph at the thirtythird annual convention of the national professional journalistic fraternity at Denver, Colo.

The UND group won both of the fraternity's major awards for the past year. They are the Hogate plaque for professional achievement and the Beckman plaque for chapter efficiency.

Few Win Both Awards

It was one of the few times in the history of Sigma Delta Chi that a single chapter has won both awards. The Hogate trophy goes to the chapter having the largest percentage of its graduates during the past five years still in the profession of journalism. The Beckman trophy is awarded on

Cagers Start Slowly

University of North Dakota's basketball team got away to a slow start in its pre-conference games but fans here believe Coach Louis Bogan, in his second year as Sioux tutor, will have one of the North Central loop's top teams.

Home fans have yet to see the Sioux quint win after two games in the new fieldhouse. After splitting their opening road series, with Montana State, the Sioux lost to Luther college of Iowa, 90-68, and dropped a 71-69 decision to St. Cloud Teachers.

Bogan's squad came close to sweeping the series with Montana State but a 25-point fourth quarter for the Bobcats provided a 70-68 Montana State win in the first game after the Sioux had led a great portion of the way.

Score 71-66 Win

The following night, however, the Nodaks triumphed, 71-66, although the Montanans once again staged a torrid final-period rally.

Luther came here with a surprisingly strong team which also enjoyed a hot shooting night and after a close first period it was no-contest as the over-anxious Sioux did everything wrong. Luther outscored the home team, 28-5, in the second quarter and that did it.

They improved considerably against St. Cloud but once again let the visiting team move too far ahead in the second quarter. This time the Sioux trailed by 14 points at the half, 41-27, and were still 12 points back starting the final period. They had the Teachers on the run in the waning moments but just missed pulling even.

Wolfe Big Scorer

The bright spot in the first four games was the scoring of the veteran Chuck Wolfe of Minot. He led the conference in scoring as a sophomore two years ago but was injured late last season and it was feared he might not be able to regain his earlier form. However, Chuck tallied 107 points in the


first four games for a 25.5 average and it appears that he will be among the league's top offensive threats.

Bogan has a new team, with only Wolfe and Jon Haaven of East Grand Forks, a sophomore, as starting lettermen from last year. There is more depth on the squad this year and fans are confident the Sioux will be a factor in the conference race.

Poll Picks Sioux

A news service poll at the season's start showed, in fact, that rival coaches predict the Sioux will win the title this year. Their concensus showed North Dakota first, N.D.A.C., defending champion, second, and Morningside third. Both the latter two teams are veteran aggregations so a firstplace prediction for North Dakota appears out-of-place until actual conference play starts.

(Continued from Page One) their conference schedule December 19 at Iowa Teachers, a perennially strong team, and if the 1952 outcome follows the pattern of previous years, the Sioux appear doomed to start with a defeat. It can be said, however, that this year's team is stronger than that of a year ago at the season's start.

What was expected to be North Dakota's best hockey season has been grounded at the outset because of weather.

Unseasonably mild temperatures prevented ice making in the winter sports building until late November. Then, after a couple of practices, the temperature climbed again and made the ice impossible to skate on.

So the Sioux had to cancel their first scheduled games, against a Canadian team, and Coach Ciff Purpur will be forced to start his Midwest conference schedule with a squad that is certain to lack sufficient practice and may likely open with only a couple of practice contests.

An all-veteran team is back, bolstered by several good freshmen from last year and it is possible that Purpur can get the boys ready in time. The warm fall and early winter, however, point up once again the handicap under which the Sioux work.

Where rival schools like Minnesota, Michigan, Denver and Colorado college get on their artifical ice sheets as early as October, the Sioux must depend on nature to relent and freeze early if they hope to start practice before late November.

It was the fourth time in the past five years that the North Dakota chapter had won the Hogate trophy, while in 1951 the UND group was second in the Beckman contest, scoring 97 out of 100 points compared to 98 for South Dakota state.

Compete With 52

The UND chapter won its awards in competition with 52 other undergraduate chapters.

In the fraternitiy's newspaper contest the Dakota Student, UND weekly publication, took third place in the straight newswriting division.

The article selected was written by Richard Gorrell, 1952 University graduate, now employed by a Richmond, Va., daily paper.

Alvin E. Austin, Sigma Delta Chi faculty adviser and head of the University journalism department, was elected a vice president of the national organization.

GET \$8,000 GRANT

Two machines values at \$8,000 for medical training were presented the University of North Dakota Medical School by the National Heart Institute. They will be used by undergraduates in studying the heart disease field. The machines are a cardio-vascular unit and an electron cardio-scope.
