Sioux Skaters, Cagers Show Progress

North Dakota's 1953 hockey and basketball teams winged away to winning starts in their respective conferences but tumbled as the season progressed.

Double victories over University of Michigan, 10-3 and 5-3, and Denver University, 9-5 and 7-2, gave Coach Cliff Purpur's skaters top place in the Western Collegiate Hockey League. The Wolverines played on the Sioux home ice while the Denver series was at Denver.

The annual Minnesota-Sioux series, a four-game affair, opened with two games in the Winter Sports Building, the first a 2-2 tie and the second a 5-0 victory for the Gophers.

Coach Louis Bogan's basketball forces played a tough pre-conference schedule with poor success but opened loop play by beating Iowa Teachers at Cedar Falls, 71-61. After the holiday vacation, the same teams picked up loop play at the U Fieldhouse and the Panthers scored a 61-53 victory.

The brightest light for the Sioux was Center Jon Haaven of East Grand Forks, who set a new North Central Confer-

ence scoring record with 40 points in the game at Cedar Falls and tossed in another 34 in the fieldhouse game. His mates, however, were unable to give enough support.

In their next start the Sioux whipped Morningside, 87-59.

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When President West retires June 30, a landmark will be gone for he has headed this institution since 1933 and piloted it through the bleak depression years when the state was forced to strain its then slender resources to maintain an accredited University.

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Now resplendent with its new buildings, enlarged faculty and enlarged student body and improving scholastic standing, the University stands ready to continue its vital role in the life of an expanding North Dakota by preparing young men and women for the various occupations that will soon be needed in the state.

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The medical school will be in a better position than ever before to provide needed services. The college of engineering again received top rating in an inspection by a committee for the engineering council for professional development. The survey showed the chemical engineering department to be one of the few west of the Mississippi River that is accredited.

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As oil developments swell in the state, the geology department and the state geologist's office at UND have increased from a very minor to a very major part of the institution. Oil has brought a renewed interest in this field and students are crowding the department's classes, while the staff of State Geologist Wilson M. Laird, who is also head of the department of geology. has swelled to eight times its "pre-oil-discovery" number.

Paul Barr, Art Head, Dies at 61

Prof. Paul E. Barr, 61, head of the University art department, died December 22 in a Grand Forks hospital.

He had been admitted to the hospital December 14 following a stroke.

Professor Barr had served as head of the University art department since 1928.

He was born Nov. 25, 1892 in Tipton County, Ind., and grew up on an Indiana farm. He graduated from Tipton high school in 1911 and attended eight colleges and universities, among them Indiana university, University of Colorado, University of Chicago, the Sorbonne, University of Paris and Art Institute of Chicago.

He received his bachelor of arts degree from Indiana university in 1928, and his master's degree here in 1932.

Recieves Professorship

From 1934 to 1949 he was an associate professor at the University and in 1949 was appointed professor of art.

During his younger days, Professor Barr ranched in Colorado, taught school, played baseball on three college teams and coached athletics for six years in Indiana high schools.

He was married to the former Margaret Libby June 8, 1932, in Grand Forks.

G. E. Miner Dies at 53

Glen E. Miner, 1924, president and general manager of Lystad and Redick, Inc., died unexpectedly January 7 in a Grand Forks hospital. He was 53 years old.

Mr. Miner was born at Spencer, Ia., April 22, 1901. He received his early education at Kenmare, N. D., and entered the University of North Dakota in 1920, attending four years, and receiving a bachelor's degree in commerce.

He married the former Marcia Cussons of Cooperstown, at Breckenridge, Minn., June 5, 1924. She survives, with a son, Richard, also in the employ of Lystad and Redick; a brother, Melvin C. Miner, Seattle, and two sisters, Adah Miner, Seattle, and Mrs. J. W. Stannard, Williston, and his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Miner, also of Seattle. Another son, Robert, was killed in World War II.

Mr. Miner was employed by Northwestern Bell Telephone Co in Fargo after graduation from the University. He later was transferred to Sheridan, Wyo., with the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co. He returned to Fargo in 1926 and later the same year went to work at Mandan. Later, he was transfererd to Harvey, and remained with Northwestern Bell until 1930, when he moved to Langdon with Central West Public Service Co.. He was employed in Devils Lake from 1930 to 1932.
