There being no corrections, the minutes of the meeting of February 3, 1972, were ordered approved as submitted.

4.

Discussion resumed on the motion to refer to a committee the proposal to establish as of July 1, 1972, a College for Human Resources Development to include the Departments of Counseling and Guidance; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; Home Economics; Industrial Technology; and Social Work. Mr. Naismith withdrew his motion to refer the main motion to a committee composed of Mr. Johnson, Mr. Wasinger, and Mr. Robertson. The Chair asked if there be any objection to Mr. Naismith withdrawing his motion to refer to committee. There was no objection and the motion to refer to committee was

declared withdrawn. Discussion on the main motion followed. The main motion was then voted upon and carried 54 to 1, with 3 senators abstaining (Mr. Reiten, Mrs. Clark, and Miss Oslund).

5.

Miss Heyse moved that the College of Nursing be permitted to require a grade point average of 2.15 for admission to the College of Nursing for sophomores and a 2.25 grade point average to advance to the junior year. These averages apply to University averages as well as cumulative grade point averages. The motion was seconded and discussion followed. The motion was voted upon and carried 30 to 27. Mr. Tomasek moved to reconsider the motion. The motion to reconsider was seconded and discussion followed. The motion to reconsider was voted upon and lost 21 to 33.

6.

Mr. Ulven moved that the Senate permit the Registrar to actively investigate alternate methods of registration to the one used now which may involve a pre-registration. The motion was seconded and discussion followed. The motion was voted upon and carried.

7.

Mr. Rushing moved that the standing rule for adjournment at 5:30 be suspended. The motion was seconded. Mr. Quaday moved for a vote by written ballot. The motion for a written ballot was seconded, voted upon and lost. The motion to suspend the 5:30 adjournment rule was voted upon and failed for lack of a two-thirds majority (24 to 34). Mr. Koenker moved to have a special meeting two weeks from today's meeting (March 16) to act on the Report from the Curriculum Committee. The motion was seconded, voted upon and carried.

8.

Mr. Johnson moved that the stipulation that the Dean of the Graduate School shall call the Graduate Faculty into session within four weeks following the beginning of each semester, which appears as Item I-C in the "Report of Joint Committee to Study Graduate Faculty," adopted by the University Senate on May 2, 1963, be amended so as to require such a meeting "within eight weeks following the beginning of each semester." The motion was seconded and discussion followed. The motion was voted upon and carried.

It was moved, seconded, voted upon and carried to adjourn at 5:30 p.m.

Mr. Ring, representing the Curriculum Committee, presented the General Education Requirements for Senate approval. Discussion followed. Mr. Caldwell moved to adopt the General Education Requirements. The motion was seconded and discussion followed. Mr. Kolstoe moved to amend the original motion by adding a science requirement of 8 (eight) hours minimum. The motion to amend was seconded and discussion on the amendment followed. Mr. Robertson moved to amend the amendment by adding that, "Students who have had two years of science, beyond general science, in high school, and who have a standard score of at least 20 in the science area on the ACT, may have science waived as a general graduation requirement." The motion to amend the amendment was seconded and discussion on the amendment to the amendment followed. The amendment to the amendment was voted upon and failed 17 to 38. Discussion resumed on the amendment to the main motion. Mr. Koenker moved to amend the amendment by giving students in the College of Business and Public Administration the option of math or statistics in lieu of the science requirement. The motion to amend the original amendment was seconded and discussion on the amendment to the amendment followed. The motion to amend the amendment was voted upon and failed. Discussion on the original amendment resumed. The amendment was voted upon and carried 30 to 20.

Mr. Tweton moved that the standing rule for adjournment at 5:30 be suspended. The motion was seconded and voted upon. The Chair ruled that the motion carried by the required two-thirds majority.

Discussion was resumed on the amended main motion. Mr. Caldwell moved to amend the main motion by changing the wording under Section IV, item English: that the words "other than composition" be replaced by "in literature," and in Section IV, item Languages: that the words "in which the primary emphasis is on literature" be added in the parenthesis after "level." The items would then read:

- English (Classes in Literature)
- Languages (Classes above the beginning level in which the primary emphasis is on literature)

The amendment was seconded and discussion on the amendment followed. The motion to amend the main motion was voted upon and carried. Discussion resumed on the main motion as twice amended. Mr. Marti moved to amend the main motion that Physical Education be included in the General Education Requirements on the same basis as it presently is for the 1972-73 academic year. The amendment was seconded and discussion on the amendment followed. The motion was voted upon and failed 18 to 23. The original motion, as twice amended, was voted upon and carried 30 to 8. GENERAL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

These General Graduation Requirements may be satisfied by any of the following means:

- a. Successful completion of classwork acceptable for that area.
 - b. A score at a minimum of the 25th percentile level (National College Sophomore Norms) on a CLEP General Examination will waive the requirement for an area. A score at the 50th percentile or higher will grant credit for the appropriate area. The CLEP Brief Form may be used to waive a requirement but credit will not be granted.
- I. English Composition 5 sem. hours min.
 - II. Social Sciences 8 sem. hours min.

- V. A major or concentration whose specific requirements will be determined by the department or program responsible for the major or concentration subject to approval by University Curriculum Committee.

Scholarship Average

To qualify for a degree a student must achieve a 2.00 (C) average on all University work. For transfer students, it is required that his overall average (including transfer work) be 2.00 (C) and that his average of work taken at the University of North Dakota be 2.00 (C).

Some undergraduate colleges require higher averages in the major or minor. The College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Education requires that prior to taking Special Methods and Student Teaching the student completes two-thirds of the course work required in the major with an average of 2.50. The College of Nursing requires a 2.25 average in the major.

Upper Division Courses Required

No student shall be granted a bachelor's degree from the University of North Dakota who has not successfully completed 36 or more semester hours work in courses numbered 300 or above.

Residence Requirements

A candidate for the bachelor's degree who enters with transfer credit must obtain from the University a minimum of thirty semester hours and will therefore ordinarily be in residence two semesters, or one semester and two summer sessions, or at least three summer sessions. Fifteen semester credits in the student's major and four semester credits in his minor, if a minor is declared, must be completed in residence at the University of North Dakota. Some colleges of the University may require more than 15 hours in residence. The last 30 credits for the bachelor's degree must, ordinarily, be earned in residence at the University.

Academic Information

Formal Application for the Degree Sought

A student who files an application for a degree must have been enrolled in the College or School granting the degree for his last work done in residence.

Conferring of Another Baccalaureate Degree

Thirty semester credits are required for another Baccalaureate degree, in addition to the number required for the first degree. All requirements for the second degree must also be met. At least a summer session or a semester, in time, must intervene before the granting of the second degree; the additional requirement of 30 hours is to be satisfied by surplus credits beyond the requirements of the first degree, by correspondence work, or by work in residence, either in the summer session or during the academic year, provided, however, that at least one-half of the additional 30 hours has been done in residence.

Exceptions to General Degree Requirements

Any exception to the above general degree requirements must be submitted by the student's academic advisor, department chairman, Dean and approved by the Administrative Procedures Committee. Petitions requesting exceptions must be submitted to that Committee at least 6 weeks prior to the Commencement at which the student expects to graduate.
