Upson Establishes New Scholarships

Board Directs Land Purchase

The Board of Directors of the University Alumni Assn. approved the purchase of onequarter section of land near Emerado to be used by the UND biology department.

The purchase, recommended by University President George W. Starcher, will permit the biology department to use the land on approved research projects.

Dewey Balch of Minneapolis, was re-elected president of the group, with Loyde C. Thompson to serve as vice president, Dr. E. L. Grinnell, second vice president, and Gordon Caldis, athletic board of control head.

The allocation of \$17,000 for University scholarships for the coming year was further approved by the board, as was \$7,500 for faculty awards.

The largest scholarship fund ever received by the University of North Dakota has been donated by Maxwell M. Upson, prominent New York construction engineer and University alumnus.

A trust has been established with the U.S. Trust Co. of New York, the income from which will provide \$8,000 a year in perpetuity. Consisting of 16 annual scholarships of \$500 each, the program will begin this fall with grants for the 1958-59 academic year.

Mr. and Mrs. Duane Lindberg, 1954, are the parents of two children, Erik, 21 months, and Karen, five months. Lindberg is a student at Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul. Mrs. Lindberg is the former Mardell Kvitne, 1954.

Upson, who grew up on a farm near Cummings, N. D., received a Bachelor of Arts degree from UND in 1896 and an honorary Doctor of Engineering degree from UND in 1931. He is chairman of the board of Raymond International Inc., one of the world's largest construction firms.

In announcing the gift, Upson said, "I hope this effort will stimulate a raising of standards for the student body and provide more good citizens to take the responsibilities of the coming generations."

Plans Made For Reunion In October

A feature of the 1958 Homecoming, October 17-18, will be the reunion of alumni who were members of the University Band during the past 30 years.

Veteran U Educator Dies at 71

Mrs. Bertha M. Johnston. former associate professor of English at the University of North Dakota, died June 24 at a Glendale, Calif., hospital. She

Her son, Victor A. Johnston, a former Grand Forks man and a University of North Dakota graduate, is executive director of the Republican senatorial campaign committee in Wash-

Mrs. Johnston taught at the University for 30 years before her retirement last June.

During her stay here for the University's 1958 commencement she was made a lifetime deaconess of the Federated Church at a special service. Upon her return to California, she was hospitalized.

Following her graduation in 1912 from the University, she was principal for eight years at high schools in Walhalla, Lisbon and Carrington, She received her Master's degree in 1932 from the University.

She organized and was the first head of the University's Religious Council and introduced remedial English work at UND.

Arthur W. Koth, professor of metallurgy and head of the department of mining engineering at the University, was installed as president of the North Dakota Academy of Science at the group's 50th anniversary meeting.

in selection be given to North Dakota residents, the trust agreement said "the grantor desires to initiate a program designed to search out, preferably in the schools of North Dakota, young men and women who possess the greatest over-all promise of future leadership, and to provide a money award to attract them to the University of North Dakota and help defray the expense of their education and to secure for them the benefits which that University can confer upon them."

The Upson Scholarships will be granted on the basis of need, mental competence, dependability, character and motivation, acceptance by contemporaries, capacity for leadership, and a sincere intention to complete four years of study at UND.

Dr. George W. Starcher, University president, in accepting the gift, said "This scholarship program is going to inspire new hope for many worthy youth of North Dakota, advance the quality of the work of the University and be a peak of excellence in our 75th Anniversary year."

Gov. John E. Davis said, "This is a very significant gift to the people of the State of North Dakota. I am impressed by the vision which Dr. Upson has shown in establishing this living symbol of encouragement for worthy boys and girls throughout the years ahead."

J. Lloyd Stone, University alumni director, stated, "Intelligence, character and resourcefulness are not distributed to our young people in accordance to the wealth of their parents. This belief of Dr. Upson's has been nobly demonstrated in the establishment of the scholarship fund. Alumni of the University express sincere thanks to one of their most loyal graduates."

Dean D. J. Robertson, secretary of the University Scholarships Committee, said: "The gift meets a real need. Our committee knows from experience how many good students there are who need help and how deeply appreciative these students are of the help they

Loyde C. Thompson, Grand Forks, national chairman of the University Development Fund, said: "Dr. Upson's generosity will make it possible

for many North Dakota young people to attend the University who might not otherwise be able to do so, and for the University to attract a higher type of student. In all the years to come, the recipients of his scholarships, the University and people of our state will be grateful to Dr. Upson for his great gift to his alma mater."

Administration of the fund will be handled by the University Scholarships Committee. Inquiries should be sent to Robertson's office at UND.

Upson was born in Milwaukee, Wis., and at the age of five moved with his family to a North Dakota wheat farm north of Cummings. He received his early education from a minister who lived with his parents and at the age of 13 went to Grand Forks to continue his schooling.

After receiving his B.A. at UND, he went to Cornell University, where he received a Mechanical Engineering degree in 1899. He then became a managing engineer with Westinghouse, Church, Kerr and Co. of New York, and while there, he invented and patented an automatic gas producer, and designed and built the first reinforced concrete industrial building.

In 1905 he joined Hockanum Mills Co. of Rockville, Conn., as chief engineer and assistant to the president. During his two years with the firm, he was responsible for the development of the first all-reinforced concrete textile mill.

In 1907 Upson began his career with Raymond International, then known as Raymond Concrete Pile Co., serving as secretary-general manager-chief engineer. In 1917 he became vice president; in 1931, president; and since 1946 has been chairman of the board. He continues to devise new applications and equipment for concrete construction.

In 1957 the UND Alumni Assn. awarded Upson a Distinguished Service Citation for "distinguished achievements as a construction engineer, inventor, administrator and humanitarian."

He is a member of several professional societies, including the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and American Society of Civil Engineers, and of various advisory groups, including the Committee for Economic Development. He has contributed several writings in the fields of engineering, economics and social science.

He is widely travelled, having represented his company in Europe, the Orient and South America.

Three University graduates were presented Distinguished Service Citations during June commencement activities.

Receiving the honor were Fred G. Aandahl, Washington, D. C., assistant secretary of the interior; Dr. Keith S. Grimson, Durham, N. C., professor of surgery at Duke University School of Medicine, and Herbert E. Treichler, Richmond, Tex., retired vice-president and general manager of the Texas Gulf Sulphur Co.

Presented by the UND Alumni Assn., the honors were awarded "in recognition of superior attainments in chosen fields of work and for devoted service to the cause of education and support of the University."

Aandahl, who gave the commencement address June 8, is a 1921 UND graduate. He has been assistant secretary of the interior since Feb. 10, 1953.

Served in Congress

A native of Litchville, he was a member of the North Dakota Senate in 1931, 1939 and 1941 sessions. He was governor for three terms 1945-51. He was a member of the 32nd Congress, 1951-1952.

Dr. Grimson, a native of Munich, received a B.A. from UND in 1930, a B.S. in 1931, and an M.D. from the University of Chicago in 1934. He was an instructor at the latter institution before going to Duke.

He won the 1958 Modern Medicine Distinguished Achievement Award in January. In 1940 he performed the first total sympathectomy for the relief of hypertension (high blood pressure.) He has also done research with a number of drugs for relief of high blood pressure and ulcers.

Treichler was born at Niagara, and received from UND a B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1908 and a B.S. in Mining Engineering in 1909.

Gives \$25,000 to University Fund

Mrs. Rena Farup Hansen, Park River, has contributed \$25,000 to the University of North Dakota Development Fund for establishment of a scholarship fund. She is a 1910 UND graduats.

Mrs. Hansen's contribution provides for awards totaling \$1,000 annually to graduates of the Walsh County Agricultural and Training School. The first scholarships will be given in

May, 1959.
Chief consideration in selection will be need. An applicant must be in the upper half of his class and must show promise of doing acceptable University work.

Recipients will be chosen by a three-member committee consisting of the superintendent of the Walsh County school and the chairman and one other member of the UND Scholarships Committee.

New Men's Dormitory Authorized

The Community Facilities Administration has authorized a \$650,000 loan to the University for construction of a men's dormitory on which workswill start this summer.

Rep. Otto Krueger reported in Washington that the UND loan was one of three totaling \$1,295,000 for North Dakota colleges approved by the CFA. The other loans, also to finance dormitory construction, were for \$300,000 to Mayville Teachers College and for \$345,000 for Dickinson Teachers College.

E. W. Olson, University business manager, said the new dormitory planned here will be constructed immediately north of Bek Hall and will be similar in size and design to that structure. It will provide housing for about 260 men students and an apartment for the head resident.

The men's dormitory will bring to five the number constructed under a state law permitting state institutions to sell revenue-anticipation bonds with which to finance dormitories and other revenue-producing buildings. Those already constructed are Fulton and Johnstone halls for women and Hancock and Bek halls for men.

Wells and Denbrook, local architects, are preparing the plans and specifications for the new building.
