With Our Alumni: Heads Giant Corporation

An article in a recent Forbes magazine features John D. MacKenzie, '18, president and chairman of American Smelting Refining Co.

The article gives great credit for the company's success to MacKenzie, who has been associated with it since 1920. After holding a number of positions in various divisions of the firm, he assumed charge of all foreign and domestic smelting and refining operations in 1949. In April, 1958, he was elected president and in August of that year, he was named chairman as well.

Despite lengthy strikes, the company had earnings of nearly 13 million dollars and net assets of \$134,000,000 in 1959. It employs 25,815 persons.

MacKenzie also is a director and executive committee chairman of both Revere Copper and Brass, Inc., and of General Cable Corp., and holds directorships and of-
