The possibility of establishing a course on the history, doctrines, objectives and techniques of Communism in North Dakota high schools was explored by the committee.

The purpose of such instruction, explained Mrs. Kelly, would be "to instill a greater appreciation of democracy and freedom under law—and the will to preserve that freedom."

Although the National Education Assn. has been recommending such instruction since 1952, North Dakota high school students to date have been required to learn only a definition of Communism, she said. Meanwhile, Freedom Versus Communism courses are required for graduation by high schools in many states.

# Awarded to UND Lab

The Guy and Bertha Ireland Cancer Research Laboratory at UND's School of Medicine has received a grant of \$45,255 from the National Cancer Institute for the purchasing of scientific instruments.

This is in addition to the \$402,000 awarded by the Institute for a three-floor addition to the Ireland Laboratory now under construction, to be completed in December.

The funds are for procurement of scientific instruments for research to be carried out in the new addition. Dr. W.E. Cornatzer, laboratory director, said this will provide expensive scientific instruments needed for the further probing of the cell in this age of molecular medicine.

The American Chemical Society has asked Dr. Cornatzer to represent the Society as a director of the American Board of Clinical Chemistry for a second three-year term beginning July 1, 1963.

The board was organized in 1950 to establish and enhance standards of competence for practice of clinical chemistry, including toxicology; and to certify specialists in this field.

## Summer Session Opens June 11

Two-hundred seventy-six regular semester courses in 35 departments plus 16 conferences, institutes and workshops will be offered during the eight-week 1962 summer session at UND. An additional 34 courses will be offered during each of the two special four-week periods of the session.

The regular eight-week session will be from June 11 to August 4. The four-week sessions will run from June 11 to July 7 and from July 9 to August 4.

This is the third year that such a program is being offered. The program is designed to accommodate students who find it difficult to enroll for the entire summer and would like to take a shorter course.

Special interest has been shown in the courses offered in counseling and guidance, special education for gifted and retarded children, elementary education at both the graduate and undergraduate levels, music education, the sixth-year Specialists Program in Education Administration, art education and other master's programs for teachers.

A record enrollment of about 1,800 students is expected this summer. Last year's figure was over 1,600.

A new feature this year will be an experimental session for gifted high school students. The plan, recently approved by the State Board of Higher Education, allows promising high school juniors to be accepted for regular coursework at the University. Their work will count on University credit, but they will have to finish high school before actually enrolling.

Starting next fall Davis Hall again will be used, as it was originally, as a women's dormitory. It will be completely refurbished and remodeled over the summer.

## Alumni Asked to Aid Collection

Alumni of UND are being asked to assist in the location and gathering of North Dakota historical materials for the Orin G. Libby Collection in the Chester Fritz Library on the campus.

Directing the drive is Phi Alpha Delta, UND history fraternity. The Libby Collection is an accumulation of unpublished papers such as diaries, letters and memoirs on North Dakota housed in the North Dakota Room of the library.

The collection is named in honor of Orin G. Libby, UND professor of history from 1902 to 1945 and a leader in preserving the history of North Dakota. The collection, started in 1951, has increased steadily in size and includes papers of former governors, senators, congressmen and North Dakota pioneers.

Space is now adequate to permanently store these materials in an easily-accessible area, Glenn Brudvig, UND library archivist, said.

Most of the collection is open to the general public, Brudvig noted. However, personalized papers and material

of a more private nature are open only to qualified students doing research or other authorized persons, he said. These things are kept locked. Papers such as correspondence, journals, autobiographies, records of organizations, pamphlets, handbills and political cam-

paign literature are all samples of the type of material sought.

## Warns About 'Redheads'

# U Graduate Quoted

Dr. John S. Lundy, '17, formerly with the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., and now an anesthesiologist with the Veterans Administration Research Hospital in Chicago, was quoted in the April issue of Science Digest magazine as warning his colleagues about "redheads" when giving a local anesthetic.

Dr. Lundy said that red-haired persons are "hypersensitive" and will feel pain when others on the same amount of anesthesia will be pain-free. In general, he said, redheads are more sensitive than blonds. Brunets are the best risk of all he added.

"Redheads can't stand pain, sunshine or iodine," he commented, emphasizing the range of the redheads' sensitivity.

Dr. Lundy was unable to say whether the sensitivity of redheads had any relationship to their reputation for effervescence. He did say, however, that a calm person is the best candidate for an anesthetic.

Born and raised in Inkster, where his father was a pioneer physician, he was awarded an honorary degree from the University in 1948. Before retiring from the Mayo Clinic, he was head of the anesthesiology section there.

Glenn LeRoy (Red) Jarrett, '31, former UND athletic director and earlier a star athlete at Grand Forks Central High School and UND, died at St. Cloud, Minn., Veterans Hospital.

Jarrett was born at Ligonier, Ind., on Oct. 23, 1908. He came to Grand Forks as a child and was graduated from Central High School in 1927.

Jarrett was a member of the 1927 Central High School basketball team which won Grand Forks' first state cage title and continued to the quarter-finals of the national high school basketball tournament in Chicago.

His athletic career at UND through 1931 included sparkling performances as a football halfback under the late Coach Jack West and as a basketball forward. He scored the first touchdown of the 1930 season against Army as UND lost to the Cadets, 31 to 7.

He received a master's degree from the University of Oregon.

Jarrett began his coaching career at Minot High School in 1931. He coached at Minot until 1938, when he returned as assistant football coach at UND. He held that position until 1942 when he joined the U. S. Navy. He held the grade of lieutenant (jg) when he

was separated from service in 1944.

Jarrett became acting athletic director at UND in 1946 and was appointed director the following year. Before his resignation January 31, 1959, Jarrett served in the capacities of football, basketball and track coach at various times.
