February 28, Friday—Seattle: Meet at Northwest Orient Imperial Lounge, Seattle International Airport for the UND Alumni Orient bon voyage party. Fly Northwest Orient Airlines Jet Flight over the Polar route, the shortest and fastest route, cross the International Date Line enroute.

February 29, Saturday—Tokyo: What a way to start Leap Year!! Arrive Tokyo airport in the evening. After clearing customs, we will be transferred to the beautiful Hotel Okura, the finest hotel in the Far East. The UND alumni have been personally invited to the Okura by Mr. Iwajiro Noda, the manager.

March 1, Sunday—Tokyo: This morning reserved for you to attend worship services. The Oriental atmosphere will make these services a memorable occasion. In the afternoon we take a comprehensive sightseeing tour through the largest city in the world; with such sights as the Imperial Palace Plaza, Meiji Shrine Outer Gardens, the Diet Building, Tokyo University, Asakusa Amusement Center with its popular Kannon Temple, and Nihonbashi, the heart of Tokyo's shopping district. Evening free to enjoy Tokyo's exotic night life.

March 2, Monday—Tokyo: Additional sightseeing in the city by motorcoach visiting the important points of interest in downtown Tokyo. Afternoon leisure for shopping.

March 3, Tuesday—Nikko: Transfer to the railway station for the electric express to Nikko, arriving mid-morning. Here, in the midst of the most beautiful scenery in Japan, the 17th century Shogun Iyemitsu built temples and shrines, so numerous and so beautiful that the Japanese say, "never say 'Kekko' (magnificent) until you've seen Nikko." After lunch, we visit Tochugu Shrine with the Mausoleum of Iyasu, and the famed Yomeimon Gate, before we drive to Lake Chuzenji where we will see thousand year old Kannon Temple. Then we visit Kegon Falls, where the waters of the lake leap over two hundred feet into a wooded gorge. We return to Tokyo for the night.

March 4, Wednesday—Tokyo: This day is at leisure for further exploration of this fascinating city or last minute shopping, or suggest you may view the 1964 Olympic grounds and stadium.

March 5, Thursday—Fuji-Hakone National Park: Today we drive to Kamakura where we visit the beautiful world-famous Dai-butsu Dan, the gigantic bronze statue of the Lord Buddha that is a symbol of Japan. Located nearby is Kachiman-gu Shrine, one of Japan's oldest temples, in a beautiful grove of cherry trees. We continue to fabulous Fuji-Hakone National Park, an area of forest, hill and woodland surrounding the sacred mountain, Fujiyama. We then drive to Lake Hakone to see the reflection of Fujiyama mirrored on its waters, and stay overnight in a beautiful resort hotel, the Kowakien. In the evening we celebrate Lloyd Stone's 39th birthday!!!

March 6, Friday—Atami-Yokohama-Kyoto: In the morning we continue via Ten Province Pass to picturesque Atami, and motor-ing along the shores of Sagami Bay via the great seaport of Yokohama, we drive to Tokyo Airport for a short flight to Kyoto and transfer to the Kyoto Hotel.

March 7, Saturday—Kyoto: Our full day tour of the city today includes a visit to Nijo Palace, whose masterpiece of decoration contrasts sharply with the austere classicism of the Old Imperial Palace. We admire the beauty of red-lacquered Heian Shrine in

its lovely garden setting, the Ginkakuji Silver Pavilion and many other points of interest.

March 8, Sunday—Nara-Osaka: This morning we motor to Nara the cradle of Japanese art and culture. After lunch we tour this enchanting city and visit Nara Park, a traditional woodland where tiny tame deer roam at will under aged trees; Kasuga Shrine, reached along an avenue of antique stone lanterns; Horyuji Temple, a cluster of buildings, each a masterpiece in its own style of architecture, and the Hall of the Great Buddha, largest wooden structure in the world, housing a 53 foot high statue of the Great Buddha. We continue on to Osaka for a brief tour of the city and return to Kyoto for the night.

March 9, Monday—Kyoto: Your day to explore the old Japan, the ancient culture, and to shop for the items you will want and can't buy at home.

March 10, Tuesday—Hong Kong: Transfer to Osaka airport for our flight to Hong Kong, The International Crossroads, famous for its blending of the oriental and western cultures. Our schedule calls for an afternoon arrival in Hong Kong to give you time to place your order for suits or fine dresses. Hotel Miramar.

March 11, Wednesday—Hong Kong: This day of leisure planned exclusively for shopping, before your tours of the city begin. Items ordered at this time will be ready for you on departure. Make your reservations for the famous Pekin duck dinner served in Gaddie's Restaurant Peninsula Hotel, or the Taipai Palace floating restaurant, Aberdeen.

March 12, Thursday—Hong Kong: Today we will enjoy a comprehensive sightseeing tour of this very busy Colony with an international population of three million inhabitants, bordering to the north on the forbidden territory of Communist China. We cross over to Hong Kong island and climb to the Summit of Victoria Peak by funicular railway to view the splendid panorama of harbor and mainland. We then visit fantastic Tiger Balm Gardens with the tall white pagoda and strange sculptured groups. Driving around the island via Repulse Bay and the Chinese fishing village of Aberdeen, we return to our hotel in Kowloon on the mainland.

March 13, Friday—Hong Kong: Today our sightseeing will take us to the New Territories where the rural life of ancient times goes on as if the modern world did not exist. We visit the walled village of Kam Ling, and Tai Po where the junks are pulled up practically at the roadside, and return through the busy shopping districts of Kowloon.

March 14, Saturday—Last day in Hong Kong: A day of leisure to pick up items ordered on arrival. Where else in the world can you order a tailor made suit of the best English cloth for approximately \$40.00. Truly a shopper's paradise for both men and women. A highly recommended optional feature is the Chinese Operetta in the Mirmar Hotel, reservations required.

"The bear didn't get over the mountain. No sir — the Montana Grizzlies were pushed off the hill as the Sioux defeated them 7-0 in the climax event of the twenty-third annual Homecoming.

Festivities, under the direction of Alumni Chairman Frank J. Webb and Student Chairman Bill McCosh, began Thursday night, October 20, with a big pep rally in the armory. Major J. Earl McFadden gave the main address of the evening. Friday night a student rally, snake dance and bonfire was held. The annual alumni banquet with Paul Griffith presiding was held in the Dacotah hotel. Later in the evening, house decorations were inspected. Gamma Phi Beta and Beta Theta Pi won first prizes, with Chi Omega and Alpha Tau Omega taking second places.

Gamma Phi Beta and Theta Chi won first prizes in the float competition in the parade Saturday morning, while Delta Delta Delta and Alpha Tau Omega took second places.
