The following announcements were made:

- A. Ms. Jenó announced the passing of Senator Randy Lee and the Senate observed a moment of silence in remembrance.
- B. The ad hoc harassment committee has reconvened and reviewed the revised draft harassment policy. The committee expects to forward the policy to the Senate at the April meeting.

- C. The President has implemented an interim policy to exempt applicants for fall 2006 from the ACT writing component. The matter has been forwarded to the Senate Admissions and Academic Policies Committee to recommend a permanent policy.
- D. There will be three forums regarding the Strategic Plan. The forum sponsored by the Senate will be held on Wednesday, March 30, from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. in Swanson Hall, Rooms 16-18.
- E. The Provost Search Committee has completed its work and forwarded its recommendations to the President. The Committee found all four of the candidates acceptable, although one of the candidates, Kathleen Long, withdrew from the pool.
- F. Mr. Schuetzle announced that the "Big Event" will be held at UND on April 16. This event is designed to promote and conduct service projects for the community. More information is available on the student government website.

5.

The Vice Chair asked for corrections or additions to the February 3, 2005 minutes. There being none, the minutes were approved as distributed.

6.

The Vice Chair opened the question period at 4:14 p.m.

Mr. Mochoruk noted that the Grand Forks Herald reported that Phil Harmeson is responsible for the UND response to the NCAA regarding the athletic logo, and that surveys will be used in responding. He asked if there was a role for Senate or a role for faculty in this report. He also asked if the University had lost any funding sources because of our logo. Mr. Petros responded that when the controversy first started they did surveys of faculty, staff, and students, and he made a guess that these surveys were being used in the response. Ms. Potvin reported that the issue has not been discussed at President's Cabinet and that it has not been discussed at the American Indian Program Council. Ms. Jenö announced that she has been asked to serve as interim faculty athletic representative and she would be willing to share the report when she sees it. Mr. Jones also asked what role the Senate might play in this issue. Mr. Crawford pointed out that the Senate was on record as opposing the logo, and Ms. Heitkamp added that the Senate has opposed the logo twice. Ms. Yurkovich asked how current the surveys were, and Mr. Petros responded they were about four years old. Mr. Murphy stated he thought the Senate should weigh in on the report as the representative body of the University. Mr. Hikins asked if the former resolutions could be provided to the Senate. Mr. Petros suggested getting the resolutions from the Senate minutes and distributing them on the listserv. Ms. Krogh said she would do so.

Mr. Murphy asked why we had only 14 days to pay a parking ticket before it doubles. Mr. Hikins added that he saw a student who had nine tickets and the ticket was \$50. Mr. Schuetzle answered that it went from seven to fourteen days last year because this was negotiated by the parking committee. Mr. Petros suggested Mr. Gallagher could address this question at the next meeting.

The question period closed at 4:28 p.m.

7.

Mr. Mochoruk moved that the annual reports of the Senate Student Academic Standards Committee, the Senate Administrative Procedures Committee and the Senate Intellectual Property Committee be received and filed. The motion was approved unanimously.

The Student Academic Standards Committee, an appeals board, meets upon demand. The Committee functions within the guidelines approved by the Senate on February 3, 1983, as revised in April, 1985, and again as revised on March 4, 1999. A summary of the year's Probation/Suspension/Dismissal, Reinstatement, Academic Grievance and exceptions to admission standards activities is indicated below.

Because of the confidential nature of the information about the students, the committee keeps no written minutes other than a statement about the action taken with respect to each student seeking reinstatement. When a grade grievance is the issue before the committee, minutes are kept of the entire proceedings.

The committee meets as needed, with the greatest demand usually occurring at a time immediately preceding the beginning of a term.

Fall 2003-Spring/Summer 2004, members held 10 meetings between the dates of October 2, 2003 and June 11, 2004. Fall 2004 to present, members began meeting on October 1, 2004 and have held 4 meetings to date.

Meetings:

The Senate Intellectual Property Committee met on an irregular schedule throughout the academic year. Meetings are held in Chester Fritz Library Room 217D, the Director of Libraries' conference room. There have been seven (7) meetings of the Senate Intellectual Property Committee since the last annual report to the senate. The dates of these meetings include:

Major Accomplishments:

1. The University of North Dakota Intellectual Property (IP) Policy consists of essentially two parts: a Copyright Policy and a Patent Policy. The primary activity of the Senate Intellectual Property Committee during the 2002-2003 academic year involved updating the UND Copyright Policy to comply with the State Board of Higher Education (SBHE) intellectual property policy (in effect as of June 20, 2002). The University Senate approved the revised UND Copyright Policy during the 2003 spring semester.
2. The primary activity of the Senate Intellectual Property Committee during the 2004-2005 academic year has involved revising the UND Patent Policy to comply with the State Board of Higher Education intellectual property policy, integrating the Patent Policy with the Copyright Policy into a single coherent IP Policy and working with the newly appointed Tech Transfer Officer Jim Petell to modernize and structure the procedure for review and handling of UND inventions. While, it was determined that the existing UND Patent Policy was in technical compliance with the SBHE policy (in effect as of June 20, 2002), significant revisions were necessary to reflect current and proposed administrative changes on campus. Clarification of certain aspects of the Patent Policy was also necessary to ensure compliance with the Bayh-Dole Act (the Federal law governing ownership of intellectual property produced with funds provided by the Federal government). Although work on a draft of the Patent Policy largely completed during the 2003-2004 academic year, a draft of the UND Patent Policy was not presented to the University Senate for approval. This delay allowed the Committee to utilize the experience and expertise of Jim Petell, the new Technology Transfer Officer (TTO) in reviewing the policy to ensure that the outlined procedures were consistent with the TTO's vision for developing technology development at UND. The University Senate approved the revised IP Policy (which includes both the Copyright Policy approved on November 6, 2003 and the newly drafted Patent Policy) at its meeting on December 2, 2004. The UND IP Policy is now in compliance with SBHE policy.
3. The Patent Policy calls for the creation of an Invention Disclosure Committee (IDC). The IDC will assist the TTO in the evaluation of inventions, approval of patent applications, and the implementation of the Patent Policy. This Committee will continue to serve UND as the IP policy-making and compliance body in the future, without responsibility for the implementation of policy. While the TTO will continue to serve as an ex-officio member of this Committee, the Committee determined that it was not necessary for the chair of this Committee to serve as a member or ex-officio member of the IDC.
4. Employee receipt of royalties was the major item of discussion among members of the Committee in drafting the Patent Policy. Such participation can have a significant impact on the ability of the University to recruit and retain exceptional faculty. The State Board of Higher Education has set the minimum return of net patent royalties by North Dakota higher education employees at 30%. Professor Will Gosnold, former head of ORPD, provided the committee with information regarding the distribution of royalties at several institutions and found that faculty generally receive 50% or less of the royalties for any invention, usually after all expenses for patent filing and licensing are recovered. According to Gosnold, the findings were in line with other studies, which have found that the more royalties a particular university gives to its inventors, the greater the number of inventions generated by that university. The Committee also considered the distribution of royalty revenue among the units housing the inventor, the University generally, and any patent management organization that might be created. (While the Patent Policy did not mandate the creation of a patent management organization (PMO), many institutions have adopted a structure that uses a separate foundation or other entity to house and maintain their intellectual property and in select situations assume an equity share in spin-off companies). The Committee felt that it was possible and even

likely that UND would adopt such a structure in the near future and wanted the Patent Policy to be compatible with whichever direction the University takes.

The Committee decided to share the net royalties received by the University with inventors using a sliding scale. After the costs of securing and maintaining the invention had been recovered, the inventor will receive 50% of the first \$25,000 of net royalties, 45% of the next \$25,000 and 40% of any additional net royalties. The inventor's unit will receive 10% of the net royalties regardless of amount. The remaining net royalties will go to the University or a PMO, should the University choose to create one.

5. The UND Intellectual Property Policy specifically includes the possibility of protecting inventions as trade secrets. In general, universities typically deal with copyrights, patents, and material transfer agreements. The Committee felt, however, that given the increasing prevalence importance of trade secrets as a preferred mode of protection of intellectual property in industry, providing the TTO with the possibility of using trade secret protection to protect University intellectual property would give him more flexibility in developing and marketing the inventions.
6. Technology Transfer Officer Jim Petell notified the Committee that the IDC has been formed and became functional in December 2004. The IDC has already approved the filing of the first patent application under the new Intellectual Property Policy. Since August, 2004, the University currently has filed four provisional US applications and one application under the Patent Cooperation Treaty, which equals the number of the previous year.

Committee Objectives for the 2005-2006 Academic Year:

The objectives of the Senate Intellectual Property Committee will be:

1. To review Sections III-5.4.2 and IV-12 of the Faculty Handbook concerning Confidentiality of Trade Secret, Proprietary, Commercial and Financial Information and Reproduction of Copyrighted Materials, respectively for compliance with the North Dakota State Board for Higher Education intellectual property policy and consideration of any changes that may be advisable to make those Sections more useful to the campus community, and
2. To work closely with the TTO to improve the intellectual property policies and procedures and their implementation on the UND campus.
3. To review the impact of the State of North Dakota open records law on the protection and licensing of the University's intellectual property.
