## Five Alumni Honored with Sioux Awards

One of the highlights of the 1965 UND Homecoming will be the presentation of Sioux Awards to five outstanding Sioux Alumni in a special ceremony during half-time of the football game October 9.

Selection of the Sioux Award winners was made after a careful evaluation by an Alumni Citations committee. The five honored alumni will join an outstanding group of former Sioux Award winners. Alphabetically, they are Weston Christopherson, B.S.C. in 1949, J.D. in 1951; Leonard Crawford, Class of 1937; Paul Larson, Class of 1950; Ed Madsen, Class of 1940; and

Hugh Moore, Class of 1933. Each is outstanding in his profession, and all are loyal supporters of the University of North Dakota.

Christopherson, a native of

Walum, N. D., was born in 1925, attended school in Hannaford, and served in the U.S. Navy until 1946. He enrolled at UND in 1946 and earned a B.S.C. degree in 1949, then his Juris Doctor degree in 1951

His wife is the former Myrna Christensen (UND 1951), of Kenmare, and they have two daughters. They make their home at Lake Forest, Ill. Christopherson joined Jewel Tea Co. as an Christopherson attorney after his graduation and is currently vice president and a member of the Board of Directors of Jewel, as well as executive vice president and director of Osco Drug, Inc.

### **Heads Nation's Engineers**

Crawford was born and raised in North Dakota, receiving his high school education in Bismarck and his Bachelor of Science degree in civil engineering from UND in 1937.

Following his graduation from UND, he joined a consulting engineering firm in Springfield, Ill. and held this assignment until World War II. After his Army service, where he gained the rank of Lt. Colonel, Crawford became a partner in the firm of Crawford, Murphy and Tilly Consulting Engineers in Springfield.

The firm is engaged primarily in the civil engineering field. Crawford is a registered structural engineer in Illinois and a registered professional engineer in Illinois, Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin. He is a member of several engineering societies.

## Many Alums Expected for Homecoming

It's strictly Homecoming A-Go, Go for 1965 with the annual celebration scheduled on the UND campus October 8-9 with a full week-end schedule of events and excitement.

A highlight of the 1965 Homecoming will be the reunions of classes of 1940, 1954 and 1955.

The events get underway at 2 p.m. Friday, October 8, with registration in Twamley Hall administration building. Registration will continue until 4 p.m. Also scheduled Friday afternoon are tours of the campus and dedication of Leonard Hall geology building.

Climax of the two-day Homecoming will be the annual all-alumni party at the Grand Forks City Armory-Auditorium starting at 7 p.m. Paul Hansen's orchestra will be featured for dancing, and a buffet dinner will be available for those desiring to eat.

### Hike UND Fees

Students who enrolled at UND this fall found higher fees in effect, but a college education at the University of North Dakota is still a bargain when compared with other institutions of higher learning.

Students from North Dakota, who are enrolled full-time, will pay approximately \$375 in fees for the 1965-66 academic year, while non-resident students pay about \$705 on a full-time basis. Students in law, medicine, and engineering pay slightly more than their colleagues, due to the higher cost of books, materials, and some fees in those fields.

The cost of room, board, books, and materials for an in-state student, including tuition, totals about \$1,060, while an out-of-state student must pay about \$1,400.


### GAIN PROMOTIONS

The picture in the September REVIEW of Davis being destroyed prompted him to write: "My copy of the '06 Dacotah helps me to remember my fellow students and in particular, Ladies Hall.

"As a new beginner, I was instructed in the 'Social Graces' in the 'Commons' that served as our dining hall, and I must of course refer to the Reception Room where I met at the 'Reception for the new Students' the experienced and trained persons who made me Welcome and at Home, and the many beginners, like myself.

"I was placed at the table assigned to me with Ida Forrest, J. F. T. O'Connor, Mary B. Flemington, Olgar B. Burtness, and Helga Swarstad as our 'Hostess.' I was lost in the presence of these advanced students and my old enemy of being bashful kept me tongue tied, so I was far from being the life of the party, but may have created some influence.

"My many contacts with President Merrifield and the instructors, particularly Dr. O. J. Libby, could fill pages." Mr. Syverud attended the University in 1904-1905 and is an active correspondent with the Alumni Office.

We note with pleasure that the new president of Sertoma International is a UND alumnus. H. A. Zethren of York, Nebraska, assumed that position on July 1. Mr. Zethren graduated from the University in 1930 and ownes and operates the Zethren Coast to Coast Stores of York. Scientist, administrator, and practical man of business, your Alma Mater proudly confers upon you the degree of Doctor of Laws."

When the school bells rang at Bismarck this fall three long-time faculty members were among the absent. Retiring last spring were Mrs. Lucile Anderson, Miss Louise Johnson, and Miss Rita Murphy. They were all students

at UND at the same time, and all began teaching at Bismarck high school in the mid-twenties.

Some of the grid names you'll be hearing include flanker Ron Green, quarterback Corey Colehour, end Dave Lince, guard Roger Bonk, halfback Ronnie Bergh, and fullback Jerry Evenson.

In the North Central Conference race the forecasters predict a three-cornered fight between the Sioux, State College of Iowa and North Da-kota AC (State). This year we take on the Bison at Fargo and we'll be shooting for our 13th straight win. Of course, the Fargo talk has been quite hot and heavy predicting a Bison victory.

Homecoming October 9 will find the Sioux facing South Dakota State, which shapes up as a real clash between UND's newly-installed protype offense and the airminded Sodaks.

Our road schedule finds us at State College of Iowa October 2, at North Dakota State October 16, at South Dakota U October 23, at Montana State October 30 and at Idaho State November 6 to end the season.

With school just underway there is talk about the great freshman basketball team which has been recruited by Coach Bill Fitch. Similarly, Coach Bob Peters has brought in some fine hockey players. We are expecting great things from both of these teams again this season.

Despite a great deal of rain, great changes are underway on campus parking adjacent to Memorial Stadium, with the three-block long intramural field being blacktopped. All preliminary work on the new Raymond Richards Golf Course has been completed, with the nine-hole course to be seeded next spring. This will be a very fine course and one which all UND officials are thankful for to Mr. Richards for his loyalty and generosity.

Paul O. Larson was born in Bovey, Minn., in 1927, attended high school in Coleraine, Minn., and then served for two years in the U. S. Navy during which he completed the Navy's course for electronic technicians.

In 1950, Larson received his B.S.E.E. degree from UND, where he was awarded a Kermott Scholarship and a Hut-

cheson Memorial Prize. He worked as a junior engineer in St. Louis, and then as an engineer for the Electronics Research, Inc., of Evansville, Ind., before being called back into the Navy during the Korean conflict.

In 1952, Larson joined the AC Spark Plug Division of General Motors as a systems engineer, where he participated in systems design and flight evaluation of the Stellar Inertial Bombing System, one of the first long range inertial navigation systems to be successfully flight tested.

As a result of the broad experience gained in the early MACE, THOR and REGULUS inertial guidance system, he was appointed Engineering Director of the THOR program in 1958.

At the present time, Larson is Director of the TITAN III program, and his authority encompasses design, manufacture, test and field support of the TITAN III system.

Larson is a member of several professional engineering groups and makes his home in Elm Grove, Wis., with his wife and two daughters.

### UND Gets Collection Of Birds, Mammals

A collection of several hundred mounted birds and mammals has been acquired by the UND biology department. The collection represents the lifelong work of H. V. Williams, Grafton taxidermist, and his father, the late W. H. Williams.

Dr. Robert Seabloom, assistant professor of biology at UND, was instrumental in procuring the specimens. The historic value of the collection is almost priceless because the Williams are recognized as pioneers in the study of the area's wildlife, as well as excellent taxidermists.

Waterfowl, upland game, family groups of raccoons, foxes and skunks, and hundreds of individual specimens are included in the collection, along with a group of scientific skins.

At present, the collection is housed in the UND Biology building, along the walls and in separate rooms. Dr. Paul Kannowski, chairman of the Department of Biology at UND, indicates that the collection points up the need for a natural history museum on the campus, as there is a lack of adequate space to properly display the collection.
