## Miniature Park To Include Campus Replica

A miniature reproduction of the University of North Dakota campus will be included in a new park planned for the nation's capital.

The park project, "America-in-Miniature," will feature a four - acre scale - model America bordered by small lakes representing the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans and the Gulf of Mexico. Within the miniature nation will be reproductions of outstanding topographical features of each region as well as models of buildings and other landmarks of each state.

The North Dakota section will include UND, Grand Forks; State Capitol and Statue of Sakajawea, Bismarck; Monument of the Four Chaplains, Bottineau; Fort Lincoln State Park, Mandan; Buffalo Replica, Jamestown; monument marking the center of the North American continent, Rugby; International Peace Garden, near Dunseith;

# Nationally Known Speakers Visit UND During Fall

There's a steady flow of famous names and speakers on the UND campus this fall, with a variety of events nearly every day.

For example, the UND General Extension Division joined the U.S. Department of Commerce for a symposium on export trade. Among the speakers were Kenneth C. Miller, international trade specialist of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Ross Barnett, former Mississippi governor, spoke during October on States Rights.

Richard M. Nixon spoke at the UND fieldhouse, marking his second appearance at UND. In 1960, he spoke as part of his campaign for the presidency of the United States.

Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon gave the opening address at the conference on the improvement of undergraduate education held in early November in the University Center.

Dr. Harland Wood, pro-fessor and head of the biochemistry department at Western Reserve University, gave one of five lectures scheduled in his field of biochemistry. He has received many national awards for his research work.

Dr. Deane W. Malott, president emeritus of Cornell University, was the first speaker this fall in the 1965-66 Maxwell M. Upson Lectureship series. The series was made possible by a gift of \$100,000 from Upson, an 1896 graduate who resides in New York City.

#### GEOLOGY DEPT. GRANT

The department of geology at UND has been approved for a \$2,500 grant by the Humble Oil Education Foundation. The grant is for the 1965-66 academic year.

# Alumni Charter Bus Caravan To Camelback

There's a new slogan at the UND Alumni Office entitled: "The Road to Camelbackand Back!"

The idea started around Homecoming time and is now firmed up in the form of a chartered Greyhound Bus that will leave Grand Forks on December 30, taking the Kansas City route to Phoenix. There will be five days of the fabulous Camelback Inn reunion, and the bus will bring the Nomadic Nodaks back via stops in Las Vegas and Den-

Sponsored by the UND Alumni Association in cooperation with the Champeau Travel Service of Grand Forks, the 33-passenger, complete-facility bus will be a mobile alumni home, leaving on December 30, 1965, and returning on January 16, 1966.

The chartered bus idea was proposed by UND alumni in the Grand Forks area who did not care to make the drive by car and who felt a Greyhound bus ride would be more attractive than air travel.

So, the plan is jelled; you are invited to join the Camelback Caravan. Although the route and stops are not finalized, it goes something like

Leave Grand Forks on Thursday, December 30, and travel to Sioux Falls, where you spend the evening at the Holiday Inn.

Arriving early the next day in Kansas City, plans include a gala New Year's Eve party there, with New Year's Day to see the city and its famous Christmas lights. Then it's an early start on January 2, and your route takes you through Dodge City and Roswell, with arrival in Phoenix on January

Garrison Dam, near New Town, and the Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The models will also show various North Dakota farming activities and industrial complexes.

UND officials have been asked to send photographs diagrams to assist the model builders. UND will be represented by three campus buildings reproduced in exacting detail.

The privately financed park will be completed by 1968 at a cost of \$20 million and will be built on a site in Montgomery County, Md., 12 miles from the District of Colum-

C. William Neuhauser, president of the America-in-Miniature Corp., said the project will be a "visual encyclopedia" designed to encourage Americans to travel within their own country and to acquaint citizens and foreign visitors with America's culture and heritage. Information centers are incorporated into the plan. Neuhauser conceived the America-in-Miniature idea on a trip to Europe, where he visited a city in miniature on an acre of land in The Hague, Holland.

The 50 states will be represented in their actual shapes and a network of walkways will interlace the Lilliputian country in a pattern approximating the Interstate Highway System.

# REPORT from the CAMPUS

Joe Bridston, who president of the University of North Dakota Alumni Association from 1950 to 1952, died September 26 in Grand Forks after a long illness. Joe was responsible for my coming to the University. President West had invited me to join the staff at the University, and because of other interests, I wasn't sure that I would make the move. Joe convinced me of the importance of alumni work and higher education and sold me on the idea of coming here in the fall of 1945. I've never regretted my decision, and I've always appreciated the fact that Joe convinced me that this was a great place to invest a man's life.

Joe was a powerful manevery inch a leader. He was one of the men who was instrumental in getting this University rolling after World War II. Under his guidance and direction the University Development Fund was started. Because of his vision and leadership, large gifts came to the University. Because of his understanding of legislative processes and his love for the University, many worthwhile projects for the University became a reality. To mention only a few of the things he sponsored, we would have to

merude the Medical Center, the dormitory legislation, and the University Fieldhouse.

He believed that University professors should be paid good salaries and worked constantly to improve the University's educational ser-vice budget. Joe's influence and leadership was felt not only state-wide, but nationally. He spoke out forcefully for those things in which he believed.

Joe was director of the Alumni Association when strong leadership was needed. He believed that alumni should remember their Alma Mater, and support it vigor-ously. He was largely responsible for the good start and fine record of the University Development Fund. He gave generously of his time to proclaim the University's message. The University owes him a great debt of thanks, and his memory as a friend of the University will long be remembered.

Homecoming 1965 is history. It was a great success, as always, though not as many alumni return in the off-year when we don't play North Dakota State. We enjoyed seeing those who did come back and missed those who didn't.

At Homecoming in addition to the Sioux Awards a presentation was made to C. D. Locklin of a book of testimonials from more than a hundred former athletes of the University. In reading the citation I said, "To one of the most outstanding sports writers ever to sit at a typewriter in the state of North Dakota and to one of the University's most loyal supporters, we present this book of testimonial letters." The presentation was made by Lloyde Richmond of the class of 1933, a former athletic great.

This week I received a letter from Lock asking me to express his thanks and appreciation to all the Sioux athletes who sent letters for the book. He said his gratitude was beyond expression,

We know Lock is sincere. and we were glad to be able to make such a meaningful presentation to such a "great guy!"

#### U BIOLOGISTS REPORT ON ANT FIND

The discovery of two new ant nests of the species "Veromessor lobognathus" in southwestern South Dakota by a University of North Dakota husband-wife research team was the subject of an article in a recent issue of the Journal of Kansas Entomological Society. The discovery was made by George C. and Jeanette Wheeler, who both hold doctor's degrees in biology. They previously discovered 7 nests of the species in a single locality in southwestern North Dakota.

After extensive searching, the Wheelers were finally rewarded last summer when they found two nests in southwestern South Dakota.

# Plan 3-Year Med Residency

A program in which UND's School of Medicine will establish a three-year residency training program in medicine, surgery, and x-ray in cooperation with the Quain and Ramstad Clinic in Bismarck has been given approval by the State Board of Higher Education. It went into effect July 1 following approval by the National Council on Medical Education.

For several years, the Quain and Ramstad clinic had a one year residency in medicine. The program to date in Bismarck has been fully supported financially by members of the clinic and they propose to continue this financial support, according to Dr. T. H. Harwood, dean of the UND Medical School.

The program as a joint operation will be supervised by a joint committee of the Quain and Ramstad Clinic and the UND Medical School. Over-all supervision of the program will be under the direction of Edwin G. Olmstead, M.D., associate professor of medicine at UND.

The hospital-patient portion of the program will be under the direction of Lloyd S. Ralston, M.D., an internist on the staff of the clinic. Grandon E. Tolstedt, M.D., will supervise the surgical program. Roger M. Berg, M.D., will direct the X-ray residency program.

"It is hoped that from time to time similar programs can be developed with other clinic groups in other fields of specialization to better serve the purpose of the Medical Center and the people of North Dakota," Dr. Harwood stated.

#### PSYCHIATRIST JOINS U
