The Student Academic Standards Committee, an appeals board, meets upon demand. The Committee functions within the guidelines approved by the Senate on February 3, 1983, as revised in April, 1985, and again as revised on March 4, 1999. A summary of the year's Probation/Suspension/Dismissal, Reinstatement, Academic Grievance and exceptions to admission standards activities is indicated below.

Because of the confidential nature of the information about the students, the Committee keeps no written minutes other than a statement about the action taken with respect to each student seeking reinstatement. When a grade grievance is the issue before the Committee, minutes are kept of the entire proceedings.

The Committee meets as needed, with the greatest demand usually occurring at a time immediately preceding the beginning of a term.

Fall 2016-Spring/Summer 2017, members held 3 meetings between the dates of December 15, 2016 and August 8, 2017.

The following issues were discussed and voted upon during the 2016-2017 academic year:

The "Purpose" and "Functions and Responsibilities" of the committee were clarified.

Several Academic Catalog changes were proposed:

- UND would accept credits from nationally accredited American Council of Education institutions instead of regionally accredited institutions.
- UND would require high school transcripts from transfer students with fewer than 24 credits instead of 60
- UND would require 120 semester hours for a baccalaureate degree instead of 125.
- UND would no longer require transfer students to complete 60 hours at four-year institutions.
- UND would require 30 credits at UND for a baccalaureate degree instead of requiring that the last 30 credits be at UND.
- UND would allow credits to count at the same time toward 2 majors, 2 minors, or a major and a minor.
- UND would grant a second baccalaureate degree upon completion of the requirements, without requiring 30 additional credits beyond the first baccalaureate degree.
- Several common grade change requests may now be processed by the Registrar's office, without needing approval by the Administrative Procedures Committee.

During the 2017-2018 academic year, the committee has proposed:

- Requiring midterm deficiencies be entered into Starfish.
- Allowing repeating courses to use the best grade instead of the most recent.
- Adjusting the transfer credit requirement from 25 to 24 before requiring proof of high school graduation.
- Reducing the required number of credits for program certificates from 16 to 9.
- Examining the academic catalog items related to the charge of the committee.

RE: Blackboard LMS

Dear Chair Morton, Mr. King, and NDUS Board of Higher Education Members:

The Council of College Faculties, representing the 4,000 faculty members of the North Dakota University System (NDUS), would like to express our strong concern regarding the problematic implementation and continuing functional issues of Blackboard Learning Management System.

Disruptive outages that have lasted for hours (especially during peak times such as the beginning of the semester, midterms, and final exams), frustrating slowdowns, GB limits, languishing work tickets and other significant performance issues are negatively impacting our faculty's ability to educate effectively as well as our students' ability to learn. Blackboard LMS is, for many of our system schools, creating a dystopian classroom experience.

The Council feels that the NDUS balanced the potential of cost savings (which were grossly overestimated when considering costs incurred to the individual institutions that are not recorded as part of the NDUS contract) against appropriate pedagogy. It would appear that a choice was made that left students and faculty in an unconscionable position.

SBHE policy 1200.1.2 states: "It is the responsibility of all entities under the State Board of Higher Education to provide these services in an efficient, cost-effective manner with a high level of quality of service." The Council is concerned that the NDUS system and its institutions are not in compliance with SBHE policy.

Faculty have no confidence in the Blackboard LMS not because they do not want to adapt to or fear change; they have no confidence due to what they are experiencing as they attempt to fulfill the missions of their institutions.

The Council recommends that campuses be allowed to individually choose the Learning Management System that best reflects their needs. The current "unified system" with one instance is clearly not working. We understand that on January 30, 2018, Mr. King proposed several alternatives to the current NDUS plan, so it would appear that that the Core Technology Services (CTS) is aware of the substantial concerns that have been expressed by faculty, staff and students.

Thank you for your attention to this concern. The Council of College Faculties looks forward to our shared interaction in making ND higher education even better in the future.
