Dear Sir:

In the interests of the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Fort Berthold Reservation, North Dakota, I should like to know what prospect there might be of obtaining for them a landing barge large enough to carry big trucks.

The situation is this: The reservoir of the Garrison Dam separates two sections of the reservation, and as things now stand it is necessary to make a trip of 150 miles from one side of the lake to the other by going around it. If a barge could be obtained the Indians could make the trip of 5 miles across the water, and thus save time, expense and inconvenience.

I understand that barges which would serve the purpose are sometimes available through the Surplus Property Division, and I should greatly appreciate information as to how such a barge could be made available to the tribe.

Severax I of the Indians are now in Washington, and it would be of much help if you could let me have the information requested as soon as possible.
