Development Fund Awaits Year-End Boost

In the Development Fund campaign that ended last May, there were 2530 individual contributions from UND alumni and friends. A special Honor Roll edition of the *Alumni Review* will be published next year, listing contributors to the current campaign.

A special feature of the campaign is the competition between states. Last year, Maine was on top with 66.67 percent of its alumni contributing, followed by Virginia.

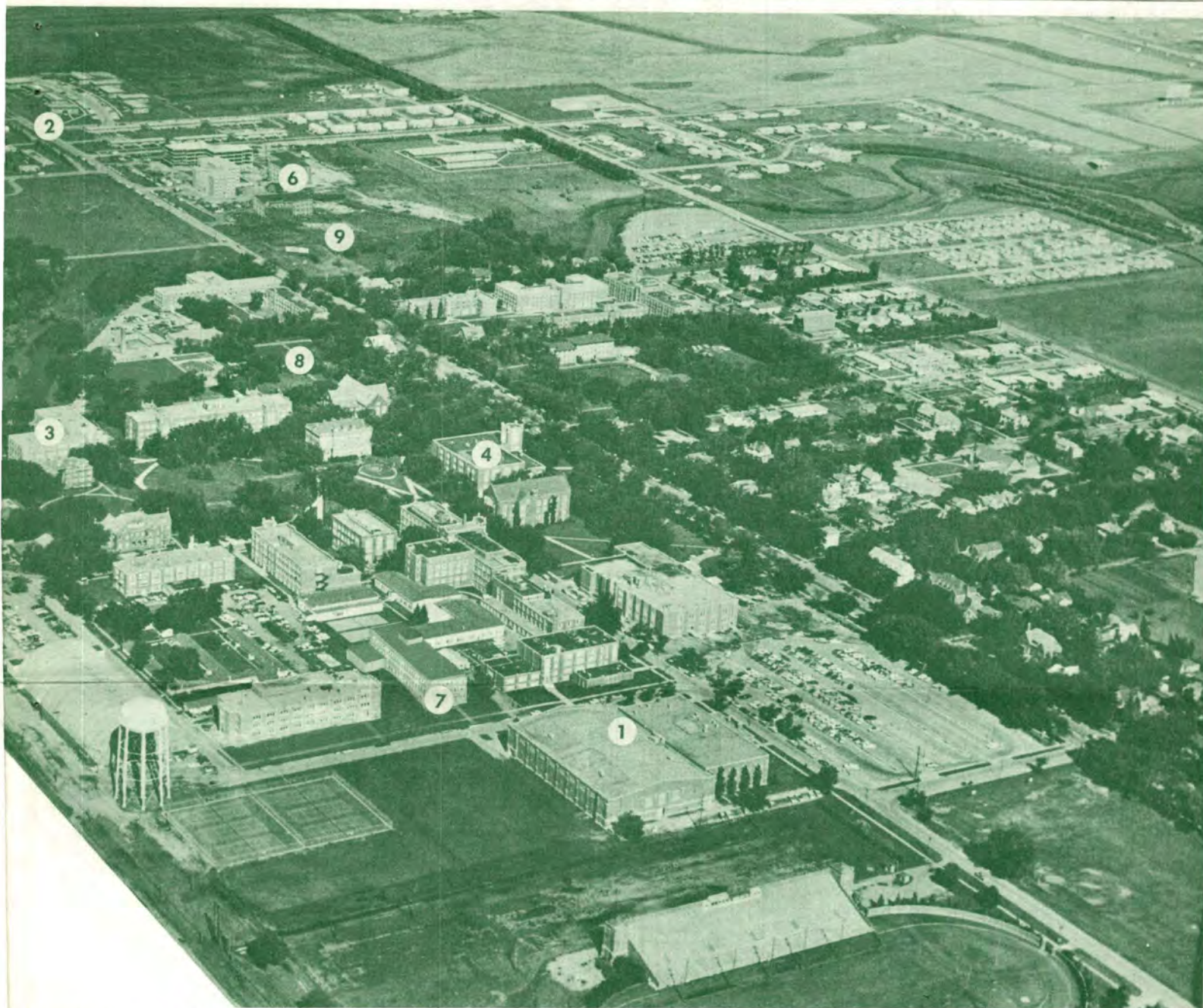
She is the second woman to receive a bachelor of science degree in chemical engineering from UND.

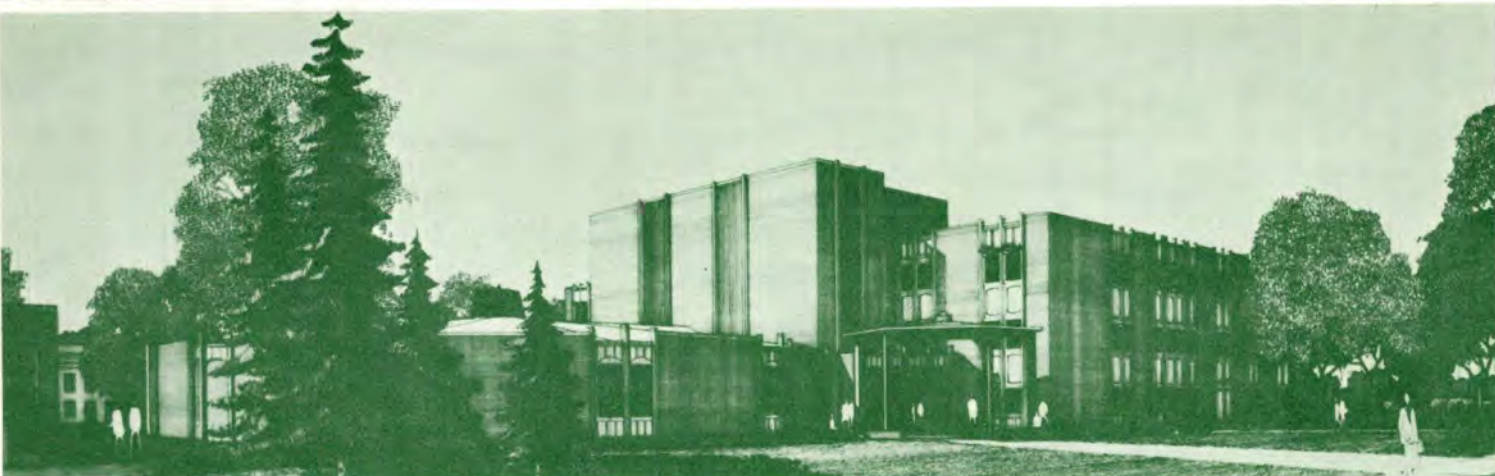
Brian W. Nelson, '61, and **Russell D. Maring, '67**, have formed a law firm in Fargo.
