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## U Development Fund Reflects Alumni Loyalty

### Construction, Controversy Discussed by President

Current and planned construction, controversy and student activism were among items discussed by University of North Dakota President George W. Starcher at a news conference Dec. 12.

President Starcher pointed out that three new buildings are scheduled for completion in 1968. They are the mathematics-physics building, which is expected to be ready for occupancy in the spring; the business and classroom building, in which classes are expected to begin next fall, and the fifth dormitory in the complex west of the English Coulee. Target date for occu-

pancy of the dormitory is fall 1968.

Other construction plans which are still in the "drawing board" stages are the building of another dormitory, a food service building, addition of married student housing units for graduate students, the possibility of converting the present law building into a student affairs facility, or utilizing its space entirely for the law school, addition of an engineering building and construction of an auditorium.

A gift of \$400,000 for the engineering building has been received from Alumnus Maxwell M. Upson, but matching funds are needed by the end of 1968. Construction of the auditorium depends upon the acquisition of state funds to supplement the \$1 million given by former UND student Chester Fritz in 1965. Beginning of construction of the auditorium could be as far away as 1970, President Starcher said.

In the area of student activism, Dr. Starcher called student interest and expression a good thing. He said, "The real heart of a University is freedom to express and to criticize," but added that a university cannot be a place where people are driven to violence in this expression and criticism. "I am extremely well pleased up to this point with the behavior of our students," he said, noting that expressions of opinion at UND have occurred in peaceful fashion and were not marked with the outbursts of violence that have been evidenced on some campuses in the nation.

President Starcher said that students should be cautious in allowing too much outside help in formulating ideas and expressing them.

### Generous Donor

Ernest F. Fox, Sr., of Billings, Mont., who has been a loyal contributor of the UND Development Fund for several years, made a gift of \$5,700 to the fund during December.

Fox is a native of Ulen, Minn. After graduating from high school at Michigan, N. Dak., he worked for a time in Grafton, Towner and Minnesota as a banker, rancher and farmer. He now holds interests in oil properties.

He has established the Fox Scholarships at UND and paid for the construction of the recently-erected footbridge over the English Coulee at UND, which bears the name of his wife, Alice C. Fox.

His son and daughter are UND alumni. They are Mrs. L. A. (Alice) Rudh of Grand Forks, and Ernest Fox, Jr. of Billings. In 1966 Mr. Fox, Sr., was honored with the Sioux Award during homecoming.

"Mr. Fox has been a real friend of our University," stated J. Lloyd Stone, executive vice president of the Alumni Association and Development Fund, "and has been very generous in supporting us with both his resources and time."

### SESSION SCHEDULED

The UND summer session will begin on June 17, 1968, and will be divided into three sessions, one eight-week and two four-week periods. The summer sessions commencement will be August 10.

### Substantial Gifts Reported in Year-end Totals

The UND Development Fund Campaign for 1967-1968 is off to one of the most successful years of alumni support, with mid-year totals showing many substantial contributions, according to E. E. Simmons, national chairman of the drive.

Basically, the Development Fund is made up of two categories in restricted and unrestricted contributions.

The restricted gifts totaled approximately \$400,000 at the end of 1967, and include contributions of cash, property, stocks, and trust funds. Restricted gifts by the donors must be used for specified purposes as designated by the givers.

A major contribution in 1967 was for \$200,000 from the Gamble-Skogmo Foundations, which will be used towards the cost of the new College of Business and Public Administration building now under construction. Gamble-Skogmo has been a generous supporter of UND for several years.

A trust fund of \$100,000 from Jack and Louise Stewart was among the restricted gifts in 1967, with the proceeds providing cash awards of \$4,000 for annual essay contests, starting in 1968, and for a sportsmanship award of \$500 to a UND athlete.

Ira Frenberg, a 1910 graduate, contributed \$75,000 for a special project. Frenberg, like many other loyal alumni, has made many other substantial contributions to the University.

During December, Ernest F. Fox, Sr., of Billings, a long-time contributor to UND, made a gift of \$5,700. During the same month, an alumnus of Minneapolis made a gift of property valued at more than \$7,000.

Late in December, Dr. Wilhelmina S. Scott of Lancaster, Pa., made a gift of \$3,000 to

The Development Fund. Dr. Scott, a native of Walhalla, has been with the radiology department of Lancaster General Hospital since 1936 and was a Sioux Award winner in 1967 at the Commencement week-end.

One of the most loyal and regular contributors is Harrison Wilder of Birmingham, Mich., who has made a gift of valuable stock each year.

Included in the mid-year total is a gift of more than \$7,000 from an alumnus who resides in Wisconsin, while other generous contributions have been received from the Dr. and Mrs. John Arnason Johnson Scholarship Fund, George W. Hanna, Edward McDermott, the Victor Cranley Memorial Scholarship Fund, Rosamund Zlevor Trust Fund, the Edna Twamley Estate, Bruce McArthur and Dr. John Alger.

Several other substantial gifts of restricted funds are expected to be made in 1968, which will provide scholarships, faculty grants, and physical buildings that would not be available from state funds.

Unrestricted contributions, which make up the funds for the normal operation of the UND Development Fund, totaled \$47,865 at the end of

tive - always has been. So when you get a letter, be careful! Before you know it you'll be committed for a million dollars or to the task of writing an alumni column while Lloyd is living it up in the South Seas.

In all my life I've seldom seen such an enthusiast. Lloyd is always on the job. He believes in North Dakota, he believes in North Dakota University, he believes in the Alumni. To him, you can do no wrong! He's so zealous that he sends me envelopes for the University Development Fund, despite the fact that I have a different Alma Mater that also needs support. But Lloyd has me believing in this cause, so here I am sending a check to be used with your contributions to help provide opportunities for higher education in a State to which I too owe a great deal.

I'm quite convinced that the people of North Dakota are among the finest on the earth. It's not the biggest state. Its people are not the most affluent. But there is a ruggedness and integrity that help make for outstanding men and women. For example, one of the finest physicians in Indianapolis, who is an elder in our Church, was a member of the Class of 1950 at the University — Dr. John D. Graham. He, his wife (Mary Reick, Class of 1950), and their four children are an "all-American family." Long ago I decided that North Dakota young people can compete with any in the world and come out well. And having been disciplined by dust storms and drought and grasshopper pestilence, there is no people in the world with more hope.

Margaret (my wife), and Katharine (my daughter), and I were with Grace and Lloyd last summer at Detroit Lakes. What hospitality and kindness! Grace is not only a world traveler, legislator, musician, mother, and grandmother—she's also a wonderful cook, as many of you know who have sat at their table. But if it's fish you want, don't count on Lloyd. A boat can't hold enough people for him. He has to be out talking with alumni and making new friends.

One of the privileges I have

had as a minister was that of giving the Baccalaureate Sermon at your Alma Mater on June 5, 1966. Speaking of sermons, I think of an occasion years ago when I heard Emily Squires, daughter of Dean Squires, give the Valedictory address at the University. She said something to this effect: "The most important discovery in astronomy was that of Copernicus—the discovery that the earth is not the center of our solar system but as a planet it centers in the Sun. Even so, the greatest discovery we human beings can make is that the world should not revolve about us, but rather that our lives should be centered in God." My greatest heritage from North Dakota came from the Christian faith I learned at home, in a little frame Church in Westhope, from devoted ministers, and from many sturdy Christian people who helped give me answers to life's deepest questions.

To President Starcher for whose devoted work we are all thankful, to the professors and students, and to you North Dakota University Alumni who are scattered all over the world I extend good wishes for the New Year. And to Lloyd and Grace and all the "Touring Alums" I send warmest greetings.

Lloyd, you've done it again! Here I am, working for you—and enjoying it!

## Pollard Named To Federal Athletic Post



**FRITZ POLLARD**

Frederick (Fritz) Pollard, Jr., UND graduate and bronze medal winner in the 1936 Olympic Games, has been appointed a special assistant for athletic programs in the U. S. Department of State's Bureau of Cultural and Educational Affairs.

The athletic program represents the department in U. S. professional, amateur and collegiate sports organizations and groups. It also invites individuals and groups in the field of athletics to participate in athletic events and programs overseas.

A 1939 UND graduate, Pollard was the university's first Negro athletic star and the first UND athlete to place on an Olympic team as a member of the U. S. track and field contingent at the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936. He placed third in the high hurdles and was awarded a bronze medal.

At UND he participated in football and boxing. During each of the three years which he played varsity football as a halfback, he was mentioned for the national All America selection. In 1937 he was named to the *Colliers Magazine* Little All America Team.
