





The University of North Dakota School of Medicine & Health Sciences, founded in 1905, was a two-year school of basic medical science until 1973 when the North Dakota Legislature approved initiation of a four-year curriculum leading to the doctor of medicine degree. The school offers a statewide, university-based, community-integrated medical education program which places an emphasis on primary care. Practicing physicians, constituting the majority of the faculty, educate medical students in clinics and hospitals throughout the state.

The mission of the University of North Dakota School of Medicine and Health Sciences is to educate and prepare North Dakota residents as physicians, medical scientists and other health professionals for service to the people of North Dakota and the nation, and to advance medical knowledge through research. Through its federally-funded Indians Into Medicine (INMED) Program, the school seeks to address disparities in access to health care by educating American Indians as physicians and as other health professionals.

The first two years of medical education are provided at the UND campus in Grand Forks. The third year is completed in hospitals in Fargo, Grand Forks and Bismarck, and the fourth year consists of clinical rotations at Grand Forks, Minot, Bismarck and Fargo. Students may elect to take the majority of their third year in rural communities through a program called ROME, Rural Opportunities in Medical Education. Medical students also have the opportunity to experience training in other parts of the country and even the world during fourth-year electives. Postgraduate residency training in family medicine, internal medicine, general surgery and psychiatry, as well as a one-year transitional program, is conducted in the state's four major cities.

The University of North Dakota School of Medicine and Health Sciences offers a combined M.D./Ph.D. program in which students pursue a terminal degree in one of the basic science disciplines while earning the doctor of medicine degree. Students who pursue the M.D./Ph.D. degree devote six or seven years to this goal and are usually interested in careers in research as it relates to the practice of medicine.

In addition to the medical education program the school offers graduate study in clinical laboratory science, occupational therapy, physical therapy and physician assistant studies, as well as in the basic sciences of anatomy and cell biology; biochemistry and molecular biology; microbiology and immunology; and pharmacology, physiology and therapeutics. Undergraduate study is offered in cytotechnology, athletic training and clinical laboratory science.

I will work to promote health and prevent disease.

I will advocate for the welfare of my community.

Even under duress, I will not use my knowledge or my skills against humanity.

I will acknowledge my limitations and my mistakes so that I may learn from them.

To uphold these responsibilities, I will maintain my own well-being and the well-being of those close to me.

I will promote the integrity of the practice of Medicine.

In the tradition of my profession, I honor all who teach me this Art.

Through honest and respectful collaboration with my colleagues,

I will uphold the highest standards in the service of patients.

I will seek new knowledge, reexamine ideas and practices of the past, and teach what I have learned.

Above all, the health of my patients will be my first concern.

This Oath I take freely and upon my honor.

Keynote Speaker





Donna & Shalala, Ph.D., became professor of political science and president of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. She has more than 25 years of experience as an accomplished scholar, teacher and administrator. A leading scholar on the political economy of state and local governments, she has held tenured professorships at Columbia University, the City University of New York, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

She served as president of Hunter College of the City University of New York, chancellor of the University of

Wisconsin-Madison, and Health and Human Services Secretary in the Clinton Administration. She also serves as a trustee of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation.

The Cleveland, OH, native received her A.B. degree in history from Western College for Women and the Ph.D. degree from The Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. One of the country's first Peace Corps volunteers, she served in Iran from 1962 to 1964.

After graduating from Syracuse in 1970 she taught political science at Bernard Baruch College in New York City, then taught politics and education at Columbia Teacher's College. In 1975 she became director and treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation which helped reverse New York City's financial collapse.

From 1977 to 1980 she served in the Carter Administration as Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). She promoted women's issues, working toward the creation of battered women's shelters, mortgage credits for women, and anti-discrimination measures.

Appointed as chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1987 (the first





woman to head a Big Ten school), she led what was then the nation's largest public research university. During her six-year tenure, she successfully strengthened undergraduate education and the university's research facilities, and spearheaded the largest fund-raising drive in Wisconsin's history. In 1992, *Business Week* named her one of the top five managers in higher education.

In 1993, President Clinton appointed her U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) where she served for eight years, becoming the longest-serving secretary in U.S. history. At HHS her major policy initiatives included: revision of health-care financing, expansion of the Head Start program for preschool children, universal childhood immunizations, expansion of AIDS research and welfare reform. She directed the welfare reform process, made health insurance available to an estimated 3.3 million children through the approval of all State Children's Health Insurance Programs, raised child immunization rates to the highest levels in history, led major reforms of the FDA's drug approval process and food safety system, revitalized the National Institutes of Health, and directed a major management and policy reform of Medicare. At the end of her tenure as HHS secretary, *The Washington Post* described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

President Shalala has received more than three dozen honorary degrees and a host of other honors, including the 1992 National Public Service Award. She has been elected to the Council on Foreign Relations, National Academy of Education, the National Academy of Public Administration, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Social Insurance, the American Academy of Political and Social Science, and the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.
