1967-68 Development Fund Tops Goal

Commencement Wraps Up Academic Year

Another great year at the University of North Dakota has been recorded with commencement activities on June 2 marking the close of the 1967-68 academic year.

It was a year when the enrollment soared to the 7,000 mark, when new buildings made further changes in the skyline of the campus, when there were days of achievement and days of uncertainty, and then it all totaled up to another year of progress.

Significant events of the Commencement Week-end included the dedication of the Ray Richards golf course, the honoring of five Sioux Award winners, the annual spring meeting of the UND Alumni Board of Directors, and the Commencement exercises in the Fieldhouse with Dr. Malcolm Moos, president of the University of Minnesota, giving the main address.

Dr. Moos, the first native Minnesotan to become president of the University of Minnesota, was given the Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from UND by President George W. Starcher.

Duggan Trust Established

A scholarship trust has been established for the University of North Dakota by Raymond Duggan of Great Falls, Mont., who died May 24, 1968.

This trust agreement with the University of North Dakota will eventually provide about \$60,000 each year to be used for scholarships and loans in the medical school. The trust approximates \$1 million in value.

The income of the trust will go to his widow, a sister and a brother during their lifetimes before being transferred to the University.

"Mr. Duggan had a keen interest in the University and its medical school," stated J. Lloyd Stone, executive vice president of the UND Alumni Association, "and this scholarship and loan fund will be of enormous significance to worthy pre-medical students, medical students and medical internists of the University of North Dakota."

Alumni Gifts Reflect UND Loyalty

Another record breaking year for the University of North Dakota Development Fund campaign was recorded in 1967-68 with final results showing a total contribution of \$114,638.84, according to E. E. Simmons, national campaign chairman.

In addition to the cash and non-cash gifts, there were capital gifts of \$275,000, including \$100,000 from Jack Stewart, \$100,000 from the Gamble-Skogmo Foundations, and \$75,000 from Ira Frendberg.

The \$114,638.84 Development Fund contributions exceeded the budgeted goal of \$108,350 by \$6,288.27, with the major portion devoted to student scholarships, faculty grants, University promotions and printing and mailing of the Alumni Review.

"This indicates the tremendous continuing support being given by UND alumni and friends," stated Simmons, "and reflects their great loyalty to our Alma Mater. I express my personal thanks to all state and city chairmen for their fine cooperation." Senator Milton Kelly of Devils Lake will head the 1968-1969 campaign which has a budgeted goal of \$135,100.

In the competition among states, Maine took top honors with a 52.95 percentage of contributors, with Virginia repeating for second place laurels. Others in the top ten states were Nevada, Maryland, Hawaii, New Hampshire, Delaware, Connecticut, New Jersey and New Mexico.

In the competition for the states with the most improvement in percentage of contributors for the past year, Nevada won first place with an increase from 16.95 percent (Continued on page 2)

Alumnus Gains High Honor

Dr. John S. Lundy of Seattle, one of the most distinguished alumni of the UND School of Medicine, was honored by the Canadian Anaesthetists Society during May by the awarding of the Gold Medal of the group for his contributions to the specialty of anaesthesia.

A native of Inkster, Dr. Lundy was graduated from UND in 1917, and joined the Mayo Clinic in 1924, where he had an outstanding career in anesthesia. He retired in 1959, moving to Seattle in 1964.

Dr. Lundy was awarded the honorary doctor of science degree from UND in 1943, and was on the campus in June, 1967, during the 50th reunion of his class. Two of his three children attended UND, including Mrs. D. G. Robinson (Joan, ex '50) and John Charles Lundy, '60.

cent to 33.33 percent. South Carolina was a close runner-up.

A special contest was held between the ten major cities of North Dakota, with Devils Lake winning honors under the chairmanship of Dr. Robert Fawcett. The other cities finished in this order: Valley City, Grafton, Fargo, Bismarck, Grand Forks, Minot, Williston, Jamestown and Dickinson.

The number of individual contributors, in the 1967-68 campaign reached an all-time high of 2,694 of the 33,000 alumni. On a "Mr. and Mrs." basis, the contributor total rose to 4,310, or a percentage of 13.07 percent.

A special "Honor Roll" edition of the Alumni Review will be published this summer listing all contributors to the 1967-68 campaign.

Stewart Essay Plans Progress

Plans are now being shaped for the 1969 Stewart Essay Contest, following the selection and awarding of 1968 winners during May.

Open to full-time students in good academic standing at the University of North Dakota, including those at UND-Ellendale and UND-Williston, the 1969 essay winners will receive cash awards and plaques and will have their names added to the permanent plaque on the UND campus.

There will be competition for ten awards, with cash prizes totaling \$4,000, including a \$1,500 first prize and \$1,000 second prize. The subject for the 1969 Essay Contest will be: "What Would Your Opportunity Be Under the Communist System as Compared to Free Enterprise?"

Official entry applications will be available at the UND Alumni Office in the fall, when dates will be announced for the deadline of submitting entries. It is presumed that the awards will be made during the spring of 1969, perhaps again on Governor's Day.

The Stewart Essay Contest was made possible by a \$100,000 gift to UND from Louise and Jack Stewart and is an annual event. Harold Boe of Grand Forks, chairman of the Stewart Essay Committee, announced that the 1969 committee will include two student representatives.

Kelly Selected

State Senator Milton Kelly, ex '18, of Devils Lake, has been appointed National Chairman of the UND Development Fund for 1968-1969, succeeding E. E. "Mick" Simmons of Grand Forks, who served for the past two years in that capacity.

Kelly has been active in Alumni affairs with his wife, Sybil, who was a member of the Board of Directors for nine years. Senator Kelly was chairman of the Development Fund in North Dakota for the past year.

The Board of Directors established a budget goal of \$135,100 for the 1968-1969 Development Fund campaign, as compared with the \$108,350 goal for the past year.

Mexican Festival Cruise

Following Camelback Inn, plans have been made for an 11-day Mexican Festival Cruise, starting January 21 and ending on February 1. This winter vacation cruise was requested by many alumni, and marks a departure from the longer tours that have included Europe, South America, the Orient, and the Pacific.

UND Alumni and friends will live aboard the S.S. Statendam, a beautiful air-conditioned ship that is one of the

finest cruising out of Los Angeles. Departure from Los Angeles is on January 21, with a "bon voyage" cocktail party aboard for North Dakota friends and tour members. The cruise will start along Isla Cedros and Baja California, with shipboard activities, entertainment, sunning, dancing and deck sports.
