NSF Announces Major Research Program

The Office of Research and Program Development has recently received the NSF Major Research Instrumentation (MRI) Program Announcement. This program supports the acquisition or development of major research instrumentation at U.S. institutions as well as the maintenance and technical support associated with those instruments. Proposals may be for a single instrument, a large system of instruments, or multiple instruments that share a common research focus. Proposals for computer systems, clusters of advanced work stations, networks, and other information infrastructure components necessary for research are encouraged. The MRI Program supports projects that are generally too costly for other NSF programs to support. Awards will range from \$100,000 to \$2 million. There is a 30 percent match requirement which may come from any private or non-federal public source and may be in cash or in kind.

UND is eligible to submit two proposals for instrument acquisition and one proposal for instrument development. UND may also be included as a member of a consortium submitting a separate proposal. Because we anticipate that many departments will be interested in applying for these funds, we are requesting that interested faculty submit a two to three page pre-proposal that includes a project description, a discussion of the impact on UND infrastructure, and a project/management plan. Additionally, an estimated budget (one page) must be attached with some indication of potential sources and amounts of matching funds (NSF requires a 30 percent match). Preproposals must be submitted to the Office of Research and Program Development on or before Friday, Dec. 27. A committee composed of Marlene Strathe (Academic Affairs), Harvey Knull (Graduate School), and myself will review the preproposals and select up to three proposals for full development -- two for instrument acquisition and one for instrument development. Full proposals must be submitted to NSF by 5 p.m. on Feb. 20, 1997.

Technology Fee Allocations Listed

New allocations for the spring semester from the Student Technology Fee are listed below. The Student Technology Fee, instituted last fall, is a \$50 per semester fee (pro-rated for part-time students) which enables the University to upgrade and purchase new computers and other technologies for student use. Allocations are made by the Student Technology Fee Committee, convened by the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost. A total of 47 proposals requested \$1.4 million in funding; \$395,000 was allocated.

Funded were a Gillette Hall Instructional Lab and Student Lab, Mathematics Computer Lab, Psychology Computer Lab, Speech and Hearing Science/Audiology Lab, Geographic Analysis and Remote Sensing Lab, Introductory College Physics/General Physics/Natural Science, and Inductory Astronomy course classroom presentation equipment, Philosophy and Religion Computer Lab, and the Biology Instructional Lab. Also funded were the McKay Information Management Lab in Gamble Hall; Education Macintosh Lab; Aerospace Computer Literacy Lab and UNIX lab server disk upgrade; Fine Arts Graphics Lab; Nursing Room 108 classroom presentation equipment and Nutrition and Dietetics Computer Lab; and Upson II Computer Lab/Upson I Computer-Aided Engineering Network educational software. The Chester Fritz Library and branch libraries were funded, as was the Thormodsgard Law Library; the Student Financial Aid office received funding, which was recommended because of high need and the direct benefit it would have on students.

Employees May Take UND Courses At Low Cost

For just \$4.17 per credit hour, UND employees may enroll in one university course per semester. You may take up to three academic courses each calendar year, and are granted work release time upon arrangement with your supervisor. You must have successfully completed your probationary period. You can continue your education, earn a degree, or improve your skills. Staff members can work toward a degree; faculty may take courses for credit.

You can choose from hundreds of courses, ranging from management and sciences to languages and music, from exercise and ceramics to first aid and financial management. The deadline for enrolling in a course is Tuesday, Dec. 31. Here's how to enroll:

1. Pick up admissions materials, registration materials and a tuition waiver form at the Office of Admissions, 205 Twamley Hall (phone 7-3821) or at the Graduate School, 414 Twamley (phone 7-2784).
2. Choose the course you'd like to take. Prerequisites or other factors may affect registration.
3. Fill out the forms and return them to Admissions (undergraduates) or the Graduate School, and have your supervisor/dean sign the tuition waiver forms.
4. Return the completed waiver forms to Admissions by Tuesday, Dec. 31.
5. Register according to instructions in the Time Schedule of Classes.

If you are enrolling for the first time, you need to complete and return an "Application for Admission" form, available from the Admissions office, 205 Twamley Hall, or the Graduate School, 414 Twamley Hall. There is a \$25 matriculation fee for an employee who has not previously enrolled. You may need to file transcripts from schools that you have previously attended. Please note that some colleges have additional fees that cannot be waived. Engineering Senior Design Students Invite Public To Finals

University of North Dakota Engineering students invite the University community to observe the final presentations for their senior design class. Members of the student organization, Society for Energy Alternatives (SEA) will take advantage of the opportunity to demonstrate the progress they have made in designing a solar-powered vehicle, the "Subzero." Four design teams working on the vehicle are scheduled to make their final presentations Friday, Dec. 13. The SEA will host a luncheon that day for the project's sponsors.

For more than a year, members of SEA have worked to raise money, design, and build the "Subzero" in time to enter it in June's Sunrayce '97. Open to college-level education institutions in North America, the Sunrayce challenge is to design, build and race a solar-powered vehicle on a 1,230 mile state highway course from Indianapolis, Ind., to Colorado Springs, Colo. The event is sponsored by the Department of Energy, General Motors, and Electronic Data Systems.

The challenge for UND's team is complicated by the fact that North Dakota has never had a Sunrayce entry so there are no previous team's mistakes from which to learn or past sponsors from whom to obtain financial support. Additionally, road testing a solar car during north Dakota's winter months is virtually impossible.

Funding for the project has come from regional corporations, small businesses and private citizens. Among the biggest contributors are electric power companies.

Expected to attend the luncheon will be representatives from Otter Tail Power, Phoenix Industries of Crookston, Grand Forks Welding, Northern States Power, Hansen Ford, Rydell Chevrolet, Bruce Hart's Repair, Dow Welding Supply Company, Interstate Bearing, individual contributors, and interested UND faculty, staff and alumni.

Vehicle designs are nearly completed and construction has begun. The "Subzero" will be unveiled to the public in February 1997, tested at the Las Vegas Motor Speedway during spring break in March, and entered in the Sunrayce in June. Biology Faculty Candidates To Present Seminars

Applications Sought For Norwegian Exchange Professorship

Applications from interested UND professors contemplating leaves for next year are sought for the 1998 Ostfoldakademiet Professorship. This UND faculty member teaches two courses at Ostfoldakademiet, Moss, Norway, in the spring semester. Courses are taught using English and normally are numbered in the 200-300 range (i.e. sophomore or junior level, although other courses are possible). The semester runs from late January through the middle of May. Help in orientation and housing is offered through Ostfoldakademiet.

Ostfoldakademiet is a one-year tertiary academy approximately one hour south of Oslo on the island of Jeloy. Norwegian high school graduates complete their first year of university there prior to attending UND; UND students are able to spend a semester or academic year there taking courses in various subjects.

D. Scott Lowe (Philosophy and Religion) will be the 1997 professor. Curtis Stofferahn (1996) and Janet Moen (1995) (both Sociology) are the most recent Ostfoldakademiet professors.

UNIVERSITY SENATE

UNIVERSITY SENATE REPORT

University Senate began its regular monthly meeting Dec. 5 with Chair Sara Hanhan (Teaching and Learning) presiding, but the meeting was not adjourned but, rather, continued until Dec. 12 to complete input on the major agenda item. Sixty-two of the current 79 Senate members attended the first part of the December meeting, which ended at 6:02 p.m. after twice exceeding earlier agreed upon adjournment times. Reports on proceedings follow.

Senate Presents Initial Responses

To Restructuring, Reallocation Report

Informal discussion on a part-by-part basis of the report from its Restructuring and Reallocation Committee occupied most of the Dec. 7 Senate meeting after it was submitted for receiving and filing. Any reactions to the report which Senate agrees upon at a Dec. 12 continuation of the monthly meeting cannot alter the report as presented but will be appended to it when it is forwarded to UND President Kendall Baker.

The committee was formed by Senate in March to fulfill an earlier charge to initiate a permanent, ongoing way to involve faculty in University-wide academic restructuring and reallocation planning and execution. The original charge to Senate to create a vehicle for that purpose came from the University Council, which had been asked by the University Planning Council to find means for faculty input into the matter. UND as an institution was reacting to a State Board of Higher Education mandate that North Dakota University System institutions initiate and report on their progress and plans on academic restructuring and reallocation.

The Senate R and R Committee met from July into November, concentrating on low enrollment programs as per a mandate from the State Board of Higher Education to pursue that area. The committee reviewed as many low enrollment programs as it reasonably could, it reported.

A draft of UND Academic Vice President and Provost Marlene Strathe's preliminary recommendations on continuance or discontinuance of low enrollment programs, as defined in terms of number of program completers, was the basis from which the R and R Committee worked to develop its report. It contains 18 recommendations on low enrollment programs and also includes the committee's rationale on each recommendation, impact on students and curriculum, and VPAA/Provost Strathe's position on each program.

Five of the 18 recommendations drew Senate reactions, with the others being

passed over without comment. Most discussion was aimed at recommendations that a minor in Greek be discontinued, that the Bachelor of arts degree with a major in Latin be discontinued, and that formation of a Center for Interdisciplinary Studies be investigated by a Senate task force.

At the Dec. 12 continuation of the regular monthly meeting, Senate expects to try to reach points of concurrence on the R and R Committee recommendations and forward them separately from the report to its prime recipient, UND President Baker. The R and R Committee will continue to meet on other academic restructuring matters.

The 12-member Restructuring and Reallocation Committee, chaired by Carla Hess (Communication Sciences and Disorders), consists of the three elected faculty members of the University Budget Committee, three faculty selected by the Senate for its Faculty Advisory Budget Committee, a University Curriculum Committee representative, two Senate Executive Committee appointees, a student government appointee, a University Planning Council appointee, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost.

Other Senate Business

Other business at the Dec. 5 part of the December Senate meeting included the following:

Tabled until the next Senate meeting was a policy change regarding the automatic suspension for two years of courses not offered in a three-year cycle, with additional procedures for deletion or reinstatement of such courses. . . The tentative list of candidates for degrees at UND December commencement was approved for recommendation to the State Board of Higher Education pending satisfactory completion of the present semester. . . Senate approved recommendations from the Curriculum Committee for program terminations and suspensions, a new program request, a title change, and new courses. . . President Kendall Baker said he was pleased to report that just earlier in the day of the Senate meeting, the presentation of North Dakota Gov. Ed Schafer's executive budget recommendations for 1997-99 to a joint session of the North Dakota Legislature included a \$35 million increase for higher education. That includes a 3 percent salary increase for each year of the biennium, of which 1.5 percent will go across the board to all employees and the other 1.5 percent will be distributed selectively to reward merit performances, etc. The governor also is recommending creation of a \$3.2 million North Dakota University System wide pool to address additional salary issues, such as rankings compared to national and regional standards. Further, President Baker announced, the Governor's recommendations include 50 percent matching funds for a proposed Biomedical Center (animal research quarters) at the School of Medicine and Health Sciences. President Baker emphasized that the recommendations are still only that and must still undergo the usual legislative considerations in the 1997 session. In the same vein, he said in response to a question about how firm the salary increase recommendations are, that adjustments during the legislative process are always a possibility. President Baker noted that Gov. Schafer, in making his higher education budget recommendations, praised UND for its efforts, stating, "The type of introspective exercise that has taken place at the University of North Dakota is exactly what must continue to take place system wide."

Christmas Tree, Decorations Require Careful Use

You can prevent most holiday fires through careful selection and safe handling of the Christmas tree. Here are some basic safety tips for maintaining a safe tree.

Artificial trees are acceptable for decorating purposes. Live trees must have prior approval from the UND Safety Office and must be treated to comply with fire codes. If you plan to have a real tree, please contact the Safety Office for instructions before purchasing it.

Select a location that's away from heat and drying sources, such as registers or radiators. Do not place the tree where it might be in a path or exit, or block a doorway.

Inspect lights and other electrical decorations before putting them up. Look for frayed or bare wires, cracked sockets, loose connections and damaged insulation. When you leave the office for home, be sure to unplug all of your decorative lighting.

After the holidays, the sooner you remove the Christmas tree and take down decorations, the better. The longer the tree stays up, the more of a fire hazard it becomes. -- John Glass Jr., Director of Safety.
