Dear Senator:


I am wondering if our Post Office Bldg. might not be presented soon and if such appropriations are made for same at this time.

I induced some men from the east to look over the situation and they procured an option on a site. Now then comes along your proposal attached to appropriations for funds for the Dam; where by the Indians must be carried for forest, Why it will be years before they will be disturbed at all. But this THING thereto attached to the bill for money delays and delays as you may see.

Again Senator, No one wishes to cheat the Indians at all- But get this they do not farm 2% of their lands, And bearing that in mind what does good lands mean to them in comparison to the whites.

This movement has delayed activities in many ways and where we most need them like unto the HOTEL is there any way where this situation can be cleaned up if so kindly advise and oblige.
