The Chair made the following announcements: 1) A moment of silence was held for University Professor and Academic Vice President Emeritus, William Koenker, who died November 16, 1992. He was the University's first Vice President for Academic Affairs. 2) President Baker has agreed to speak to questions about the

Technology Research Center during the question period at the February 4 Senate meeting. 3) An interim report from the ad hoc committee on the faculty club was received from Dee Watson, Chair, which covered the status of the treasury, administrative arrangements for access and maintenance, a meeting arranged in December with President Baker to discuss the future of the club, and a plan to conduct a faculty survey. 4) The Faculty Rights Committee has not yet completed procedures to use in determining whether or not an issue involves faculty rights. The committee will report at a later Senate meeting. 5) The Chair asked Tom Owens, Chair of the VPAA Search Committee, to give a brief report on the activity of the committee. Mr. Owens reported that the first meeting of the 16 member committee was held on October 29 and the most recent one on December 2. Ads appeared in the Chronicle on November 18 and December 2 and will also be appearing in other publications. Applications will be received until the position is filled but those received by January 29 will receive full consideration. He invited everyone to submit nominations by contacting him or any other member of the committee. 6) The Chair asked Mr. Kemper to give a brief update regarding the report of the Recruitment, Retention and Reward Committee and on Faculty Roles and Rewards. Mr. Kemper said that the report revisited the roles of faculty and faculty accountability and in order to engage the faculty in this activity three members would be sent to the AAHE national discussion on Faculty Roles and Reward to be held late in January. Nominations of faculty to attend this discussion have been requested from the Council of Deans and the Senate Executive Committee. These faculty will be expected to lead the campus in discussion of issues. 7) A January Senate meeting is not planned unless circumstances dictate a need. 8) The Council of College Faculties met on IVN this past week and discussed faculty evaluation and roles. The faculty also discussed the administrative consolidation of NDSU and Bottineau and also Mayville and Valley City.

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The Chair asked if there were corrections to the minutes of the November meeting. Mr. Winrich moved approval of the minutes and Mr. Salzwedel seconded. There being no objection, the minutes were declared approved as distributed.

The Chair called for the Question Period. Ms. Sanborn voiced a concern regarding the notice in the University Letter and materials distributed by University Advancement inviting personnel to show support for the proposed Events Center. President Baker responded that the intent of the notice was to promote cooperation between the University and the community and to inform University personnel of the positive aspects of the Events Center.

The annual report of the Library Committee was considered. Mr. Munski moved the report be received. Mr. Schubert seconded the motion which was voted upon and carried unanimously.

Mr. Nielsen presented the tentative list of Candidates for Degrees in December 1992, and moved that the list be approved for recommendation to the State Board

of Higher Education for the awarding of the degrees indicated, upon satisfactory completion of the work of the present semester. Ms. Hess seconded the motion which was voted upon and carried unanimously.

8. M III APTOS DELDON SPA ATAK

Robert Kweit, Chair of the Admissions Committee, presented the following recommendations for changes in the Admissions Policy:

- 1) Under exemption categories 1.C, the words "Native American" to be changed to "American Indian."
- 2) Under exemption categories, to add category F. "Individuals ranking in the upper 1/2 of their graduating class."

The committee also recommends a change to the Appeals Process so the last paragraph reads as follows:

"A three-person subcommittee of UAC will act upon appeals in a timely manner. A representative of the Student Affairs area may attend the proceedings as a non-voting advocate for any student."

Ms. Elsinga moved approval of the recommendations and Mr. Munski seconded the motion. Discussion followed. Mr. O'Kelly moved to amend the motion by changing, "Individuals ranking in the upper 1/2 of their graduating class," to "Individuals with a high rank in their high school graduating class." Mr. Baker seconded the motion and discussion continued. The motion to amend was voted upon and carried by a vote of 55 for, 2 against and 3 abstaining. The original motion, as amended, was voted upon and carried by a vote of 58 for and 2 abstaining.

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Ms. Parker, Co-Chair of the Curriculum Committee, presented the report of the Curriculum Committee and moved approval of the minor in Special Education. Mr. Munski seconded the motion which was voted upon and carried by a vote of 59 for and 1 abstaining.

Ms. Parker moved approval of all new courses with the exception of those in Meteorology. Ms. Jacobsen seconded the motion which was voted upon and carried by a vote of 59 for and 1 abstaining.

Ms. Parker moved approval of the new program, M.S. in Atmospheric Sciences, and the new courses in Meteorology. Mr. Blount seconded the motion. Discussion followed. The Chair recognized faculty members from the Center of Aerospace Sciences to speak to the motion. Discussion continued. The motion was voted upon and carried by a vote of 51 for, 2 against and 5 abstaining.

Ms. Parker moved the termination of two programs,

B.S. Ed. with major in Elementary/Special Education Double Major and B.S. Ed. with major in Secondary/ Special Education Double Major.

Mr. Jacobsen seconded the motion which was voted upon and carried by a vote of 51 for and 2 abstaining.

Ms. Parker moved approval to delete the following courses:

Annual Report to the University Senate

for

1991-1992

Library Committee Charge: Advises on administration of library services; reports on library needs, especially financial and services; and allocates funds to academic departments for library purchases.

Members of the 1991–92 University Library Committee were Fikret Ceyhun (Economics), Siegfried Detke (Biochemistry), Graeme Dewar (Physics), Kenneth Hall (Languages), Andre Lebugle (Languages), David Nelson (Languages), Gary Towne (Music), John Vitton (Management), and Lonny Winrich (Computer Science). Student members of the committee were Kelli Powers and Anne Knipe. Frank D'Andraia, Director of the Libraries, was an ex-officio member and Graeme Dewar served as chair. The committee met four times during the year.

"The University Library Committee affirms the centrality of the library to all the academic missions of the University. A well-organized, adequatelyfunded library is a fundamental resource for the teaching and research needs of faculty and the study needs of students in all departments; the facility serves the citizens of North Dakota, whose geographic isolation gives added urgency to the need for an excellent library."¹

Most of the committee's time was spent on financial matters; our concerns are outlined below. The committee completed its charge from the President to submit two planning documents regarding the library for the "STRATEGIC PLAN" (sic) called "IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIES FOR THE 90'S". The final document was submitted November 2, 1991. Much of the remainder of the time was spent on library service and policy matters. The committee provided input to the Presidential Search Committee. Also, we sent a memo to the Faculty Instructional Development Committee requesting that scholarly books purchased by that committee become part of the library collection and not the personal property of individual faculty members.

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In 1989–90 this committee undertook an evaluation of our library. They found that we had 55% of the books required to support the academic endeavors of a university the size of UND. Further, our library expenditures on books and periodicals ranked near the bottom in two different sets of peer groups. In short, the library was chronically underfunded. This committee concluded:

Page #3

- "1. UND does not support university libraries with the same level of resources relative to the total budget of the university as do other peer institutions.
- "2. The level of support afforded university libraries at UND is apparently eroding relative to other universities in the region and UND's ranking among these universities has decreased.
- "3. The current university collection is inadequate for the programmatic needs of UND and does not provide necessary support for planned expansions in research and development activity.
- "4. The periodical subscriptions at UND have not kept pace with the development of academic programs and are weak in several areas.
- "5. Accreditation of several academic programs may be in jeopardy due in part to inadequate library resources.
- "6. Each academic program, and each <u>new</u> academic program, places an incremental demand on library resources."

The 1989–90 Library Committee made five specific recommendations to improve the deplorable status of the library. This committee² has distilled these recommendations to the:

- "1. Approximate doubling of the total annual acquisition budget (including books, periodicals, and electronic media) from \$956,366 to \$2,000,000.
- "2. Increase of salary budgets by 25%, from \$720,079 to \$878,000, in order to provide adequate support staff (at a ratio of 2:1) for the 17 librarians."

Note that the doubling of the acquisition budget will put UND at approximately the 75th percentile ranking of the 11 non-ARL libraries in the peer group of institutions often used for such comparisons. (This is one of the peer groups considered by the 1989–90 Library Committee and Vice President Clark gave information on this group to state legislators during the September 20, 1990 Legislative Tour of UND.) At present, the \$79 per student spent on materials expenses is the *lowest* of

all 11 institutions. The average for the other ten universities is \$156 per student. See the tables at the end of this report.

A comparison of UND's library and library budget to NDSU's demonstrates how poorly our library has fared compared to NDSU. Although NDSU has less than 75% the enrollment of UND, the total library budget for NDSU is more than 15% larger than UND's. NDSU spends \$115 per student on material expenses. See the attached tables.

This committee has recommended³ that the increase in the library's funding come from:

In identifying sources of this additional funding, this committee wrote:

"While somewhere between \$10,000 and \$50,000 per year of the above funding can be raised by the library itself, the committee calls upon the Administration, Alumni Association and the Board of Higher Education for the remainder of the urgently needed funding for the UND Library. Specifically, the committee recommends substantial increases in programmatic funding for the library as well as the establishment through the Alumni Association of an endowment fund for support of library collection development, with a minimum income goal of \$500,000 per year. Such endowments are common means of support for university libraries throughout the nation, and they offer alumni a chance to make gifts of permanent usefulness. Moreover, no large-scale program of this type has yet been undertaken at UND, so this is a great opportunity to broaden the appeal of alumni fund-raising."

There has been significant improvement in the library in the last year, although severe underfunding continues. The Director of Libraries has moved to implement a recommendation of the 1989–90 Library Committee to bring all the branch libraries under professional library management. A patent depository has been added to the library and various on-line electronic databases have been user tested. The Director has also fostered a change in the library's culture whereby grant proposal writing has become an important activity. This has recently resulted in 4 proposals being submitted and so far 3 have been funded.

Other changes at the library include the installation of a security system, renovation of the Main Reading Room, the imposition of fees for non-affiliated borrowers

and an effort to raise funds through the sale of bookmarks. Several staff development projects are underway and the library is involved in the long distance learning project. The library has initiated the Merrifield Competition to foster recognition of the library's special collections.

The library's budget faces distressing pressures in the near future. Subscription costs for periodicals has been rising (10% to 20% per year) much faster than inflation, especially for foreign publications. The base budget has been static for the last four years. At this rate, within two years there will be no funds at all for book purchases. The number of subscriptions will have to be deeply pruned *and* new funds will have to be found. This erosion of the library's acquisitions, coupled with the inadequate holdings, could be a problem with the North Central Accreditation Committee due to visit soon.

One means of alleviating the inevitable decrease in the number of periodical subscriptions is to improve access to electronic information services. This does not decrease the need for an adequate core collection: a computer terminal is not a library. However, commercial information services do provide access to less common journals in an economic manner. With the minimum cost of an interlibrary loan at \$7.50 and the typical cost of a journal article from an information service in the \$7 to \$10 range, any effort to treat the library as a "gateway" to a regional library system will require substantial new funds.

The economic climate in the country is bleak and nationwide public universities are facing budget reductions. One frequently hears cries of anguish from sister institutions which are facing sever budget cuts. UND has endured a decade of lean budgets and from our perspective others' severely cut budgets seem more than ample. We request that the Faculty Senate work with the administration to make the needs of the library known to the legislature in the upcoming budgeting process.
