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## PREFACE

This volume of <u>Workpapers</u>, in addition to preserving data collected by advanced students, also makes available in prepublication form articles of more general interest.

The first of these, written by Thomas, presents a simple and helpful method of grammar analysis. Dawson's short article presents material on Kalagan of the Philippines. Considerable attention has recently been devoted to the English comparative by transformational grammarians. Hale's work represents a major contribution in this study, however, the paper included here is only part of a longer work by him (quantification not included here). Agarabi is a language of highland New Guinea; Goddard's paper gives grammatical description of a general nature based on a few short texts. The Telugu paradigms are intended for preservation of a rough preliminary analysis of certain facets of that language.

Since these papers are in pre-publication form, no public reference to them or quotation from them should be made without permission from the respective authors.

We are grateful to all who made a contribution to this volume of the <u>Workpapers</u>, especially to those authors who have given us this access to their recent work, even before it is fully polished for publication.
