Dear Congressman: On June 14th I addressed the Secretary of the Interior, viz.:

"May I present to you a seemingly minor error in the description of some of the lands, or the records, as follows:

"Richland County Register of Deeds Albert Funfar of Wahpeton, N.D., states that there is an error in the description of the lands hereinafter mentioned, all on the S.D./N.D. state line, with one exception. He says however that there is an error and that the description at least partially in error, being two miles above, instead of on, the state line. In the meanwhile I have been unable to get any further word as to where-and legal description of the tract presumed to be off state line-or perhaps more than one. We concede that one tract is on the old Sisseton/Wahpeton line about that distance away from state line -perhaps two miles. Mine are:

Lot 1, Sec. 28, in T. 129 N., R. 49 W., 5th P. M.; Lots 3 and 4, Sec. 26, T. 129 N., R. 50 W. " "; Lots 3 and 4, Sec. 27, T. 129 N., R. 50 W. " "; Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, Sec. 28, T. 129, N., R. 50 W. Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, Sec. 29, T. 129 N., R. 50 W.;

Your consideration of these two entries will be greatly appreciated, and particularly as relating to the presumable error as to location as indicated by the Richland County Auditor; and of which todate have been un ble to get any further details, nor whether it be one tract, of many, in aunit that in question.
