The Chair made the following announcements:

- 1) An open discussion with the Grand Forks delegation to the 1999 North Dakota Legislative Session has been rescheduled for Monday, December 14, 1998 at 3:45 p.m. in Clifford Hall, room 210.
- 2) Ms. Kweit provided the Senate members with a copy of the Senate responsibilities, as stated in the University Constitution. This was in response to inquiries by Senate members after the last Senate meeting.

- 3) Ms. Kweit acknowledged the work done by the members of the Committee on Committees: Nagy Bengiamin, Joanne Gabrynowicz, Betty Gard, and David Rowley. The committee restructuring report will be available to the University Senate by March, 1999.
- 4) Ms. Kweit also acknowledged the work completed by the Special Review Pool members. They are working on more specific guidelines from the committee, and also a review of the contradictions between the University guidelines and those provided by the State Board of Higher Education.
- 5) The responsibility for establishing a University of North Dakota Copyright policy has been assigned to the Library Committee.

5.

The Chair asked if there were additions or corrections to the minutes of the November 5, 1998 meeting. There being none, the minutes were approved as distributed.

6.

Mr. Markovich moved to add to the agenda a discussion of the possibility of inviting Larry Isaak to meet with the Senate regarding the University presidency. The motion was seconded, voted upon and approved unanimously.

7.

The Chair introduced the Question Period.

Ms. Handy-Marchello questioned the status of the bookstore. Mr. Baker explained that Barnes & Noble will take over the operation of the bookstore in January, 1999. The bookstore will remain in its current location until legislative approval is given to build a Barnes & Noble store.

Ms. DeMers asked if the Health Sciences Bookstore would be in the same location. Mr. Baker responded that discussions are in progress with Altru Health Systems regarding the trading of the Rehabilitation Hospital building with a future building to house the Family Practice Center.

8.

Two Annual Reports on the Consent Calendar, from the Faculty Instructional Development Committee and the Student Policy Committee, were received and filed after a motion from Mr. Lee, which was seconded by Mr. Luebke. (Attachments #2 & #3)



9.

Mr. Baker moved to accept the Candidates for Degrees in December. Mr. Robertson seconded the motion which was voted upon and approved by a vote of 59 for and 1 against. (Attachment #4)

10.

Mr. Marshall moved to accept the recommendations from the Curriculum Committee for New Courses, New Course Prefix and Course Deletions. Mr. Snortland seconded the motion. Discussion commenced.

Ms. Fry moved to divide the ENTR new course requests from the motion. The motion was voted upon and rejected by a vote of 21 for, 37 against, and 3 abstaining.

Discussion continued. Mr. Rowley moved to amend the motion to note that approval of the new courses does not constitute approval of the certificate program. Ms. Rakow seconded the motion to amend which was voted upon and approved by a vote of 47 for, 12 against, and 2 abstaining.

The main motion, as amended, to accept the recommendations from the Curriculum Committee for New Courses, New Course Prefix and Course Deletions (without approval of a certificate program in Entrepreneurship) was voted upon and carried unanimously. (Attachment #5)

Mr. Markovich moved that the Chair of the University Senate invite Chancellor Larry Isaak to the Senate meeting scheduled for February 4, 1999 in order to discuss the question of "broader responsibility" for presidents to manage their campuses. Mr. Snortland seconded the motion which was voted upon and approved by a vote of 52 for, 7 against, and 1 abstaining.

## II. THE UNIVERSITY LEGISLATURE

1. Legislative Bodies

- a. The University Legislature shall consist of the Council and its Senate.
- . . . . .

3. Powers and Functions

- a. All legislative powers of the University government are vested in the Council. The powers of the Council shall include, but not be limited to:
- (1) Requirements and methods for admission to the institution and questions related to advanced standing.
  - (2) Requirements for degrees and certificates.
  - (3) Determination of curricula, authorization of new courses of study and changes in courses of study.
  - (4) Questions of scholarship and attendance, coordination of outside activities, methods of recording class standing and credits, examination and recitation schedules, vacations, and the institution catalog and calendar.
  - (5) Institutional prizes, honors, and honorary degrees.
  - (6) General relations and interests of students, including health, conditions of living, regulations of social life, intramural and intercollegiate athletics, student organizations and publications, musical and dramatic clubs, debate and oratory.
  - (7) The general policies of the Library and the Division of Continuing Education.
- b. The Senate may exercise all of the powers of the Council, but subject to whatever limitations or instructions the Council may from time to time impose on the Senate in this regard. Any action of the Senate taken in the exercise of the Council's powers may be revoked and declared to be of no force and effect at any meeting of the Council, except as to any action that may have been completed pursuant to Senate action taken hereunder. In the event of conflict between legislation of the Council and of the Senate, the legislation of the Council shall prevail.
- c. The Council and the Senate shall make available to all the Council members reports of all action taken at all meetings of the two bodies.
- d. The Council and the Senate may form from the respective memberships permanent and ad hoc committees and delegate to such committees any powers or functions that are vested within the respective parent body. The Council and the Senate may also form or participate in, through designated members as representatives, committees composed partly of non-members of the Council or of the State.

**Committee Activities AY 1997-98:**

During the academic year 1997-98, the FIDC made grant awards and funded Summer Instructional Development Professorships. Sixty-one proposals asking for \$53,630.02 for grants were received, up from 60 the previous year, and 47 were funded for a total expenditure of \$24,568.93.

The Committee received 19 proposals, up from 16 the previous year, for Summer Professorships and awarded 10 four-week professorships for a total expenditure of \$35,910.00.

The Committee reviewed four requests for Developmental Leave Supplements and made recommendations to the Director who actually grants the awards. Four were funded for the 1998-99 academic year for a total expenditure of \$13,600.00.

The following is the Faculty Instructional Development Committee (FIDC) response to the "Evaluative Review of the Office of Instructional Development" (OID) by Dr. Stewart Bellman, December 31, 1996. The FIDC responded to Bellman's report by the FIDC charge - pages 1-5 in the report (External Evaluator's Introduction and Report) - (Look for OI).

### Value of OI (Value 20, p 2)

The FIDC agrees that the report is a positive statement that the OI is highly valued by faculty and administrators. Dr. Dan Rice should be congratulated for his leadership role that has been truly exemplary in his role related to Instructional Development. He has been highly responsive to faculty instructional needs, always listening, open-minded, and an excellent role model. Instructional needs can be addressed. The committee brings out that it would be better as a result, faculty perceive OI as a faculty-oriented agency.

The FIDC also appreciates the report's attention to the OI's existing program. The FIDC agrees that the report's program, Dr. Bellman's charge, brings from a review of research study during the first of the semester of 1996-97 that the faculty could be broadened to their first year and to the extent of which they were involved. It is a significant finding for those pursuing the issue of faculty retention. The statements about the committee's contributions to retention of faculty are interesting. OI might be considered in its current role. Is there a key component from this program that could be extended to other faculty? Another issue to be discussed involves preparing faculty in early stages of development. What are the needs of "new" faculty members? How could these needs be met?

Other programs that appear to be successful in the Faculty Instructional Development Grant Program, Writing Across the Curriculum, Newcomer/Exchange, Challenging Experiences (now being launched), and the Summer Instructional Development Professors' Program.

### FIDC Grant Proposals (Appendix 10, p 10)

One comment that was very responsive was given regarding the Faculty Instructional Development Committee being inconsistent and somewhat progressive regarding grant money. Even though only one comment was made, the FIDC has an obligation to review its guidelines. Consistency is always a concern and every effort is made by the FIDC to be consistent. However, committee members change and new instructional needs.

**RE:** Response to the Evaluation Review of OID

The following is the Faculty Instructional Development Committee's (FIDC) response to the "Evaluative Review of the Office of Instructional Development" (OID) by Dr. Steward Bellman, December 31, 1996. The FIDC responded to statements related to the FIDC charge on pages 1-5 in the report (External Evaluator's Impressions and Recommendations for OID).

## Value of OID (Valuing OID, p 2)

The FIDC agreed that the report is a positive affirmation that the OID is highly valued by faculty and administration. Dr. Dan Rice should be commended for his leadership role that has been truly exemplary in matters related to Instructional Development. He has been highly responsive to faculty instructional needs, always listening, connecting, and investigating how faculty instructional needs can be addressed. His leadership brings out the leadership in others; as a result, faculty perceives OID as a faculty-owned program.

The report included comments in reference to the Alice T. Clark mentoring program. The FIDC affirms the importance of this program. Dr. Bellman shared findings from a national research study stating that "most of the negative characteristics of dissatisfied faculty could be traced back to their first year and to the manner in which they were hired." That's a significant finding for those pursuing the issue of faculty retention. The comments about the program's contributions to retention of faculty are interesting. OID might be interested in researching this question. Is there a key component from this program that could be extended to other faculty? Emphasis seems to be directed toward preparing faculty in early stages of development. What are the needs of "elder" faculty members? How could these needs be best met?

Other programs that appear to be successful are the Faculty Instructional Development Grant Program, Writing Across the Curriculum, Interdisciplinary Dialogue Programs (brown bag lunches), and the Summer Instructional Development Professorships Program.

## FIDC Grant Proposals (concern #5, p3)

One comment (440 survey responses) was made regarding the Faculty Instructional Development Committee being inconsistent and somewhat possessive regarding grant money. Even though only one comment was made, the FIDC has on its agenda to review its guidelines. Consistency is always a concern and every effort is made by the FIDC to be consistent, however, committee members change and new information arises.



**All Faculty & GTAs (Recommendation #1, p4)**

The FIDC grant program is designed for all faculty; full & part-time, tenure, non-tenure, lecturer, & instructor. Communication can be increased for a broad awareness of the FIDC grant program and other OID programs. The FIDC recommends that other programs modeled after the Alice T. Clark Mentoring Program be considered. Also, the FIDC recommends that the Graduate School and OID with the Office of Academic Affairs develop a program and provide funding for GTA instructional development. While OID has been instrumental in initiating these programs, over the long term, these should be provided for in the regular institutional budget. To have OID assume long term responsibility for these programs would diminish the ability of OID to meet the overall instructional needs on campus.

**Communications (Recommendations #2,6,11,12,13, &14, p.4)**

In the report several comments were made that OID needs to more visible. How might this be accomplished and supported? How can OID do a more effective job of advertising programs? Possibly, an increase in newsletters, brochures, e-mail, and/or web homepage. Releasing additional information on OID, sponsored programs, grant programs, publishing a report from FIDC with a list of accomplishments and projects generated from the grant program, and other opportunities for faculty. Is there some way that FIDC can take a leadership role in the advertisement of the grant program?

**Interdisciplinary dialogue (Recommendation #5, p4)**

Suggestions were made in the report to address elevating the importance of teaching (in relationship to research). The FIDC recommends that OID continue its leadership role toward an increased emphasis on teaching. The very existence of OID and its record elevates and gives recognition to "teaching" on campus. It is important for OID to continue bringing to the attention of faculty matters associated with teaching. While OID and FIDC can help faculty to consider balance among the "trinity", this is tender ground; ultimately the decision rests with the campus at large. On-going article(s) in the newsletter on the meaning and implications of the scholarship of teaching may be beneficial.

**Teach one another (Recommendation #10, p4)**

Another recommendation was to, "consider finding ways to use people on campus to teach one another". At the recent POD conference, several campuses had put together in a publication, teaching ideas from faculty across the campus. One project began by soliciting "best teaching ideas" from seasoned faculty to be passed along to new faculty. As it turned out, the "seasoned faculty" wanted copies of the publication as well. What is the possibility of putting together such a publication for the UND campus? What about supporting a "Scholarship of Teaching" symposium each year. For instance, there seems to be an interest in exploring the topic of cooperative learning, especially in lecture courses. What about bringing in someone to explore this topic in the fall and then follow up in the spring (follow up is critical) with smaller sessions, maybe more focused on individual needs. On a smaller scale, several departments were involved in a workshop sponsored by OID that addressed cooperative learning. The follow-up workshop with these departments will occur this semester.

**OID & CILT (Recommendation #15, p4)**

The FIDC gave considerable time to discuss the relationship between OID and the Center for Instructional and Learning Technologies (CILT). It is important to focus on OID's differences and its unique mission. OID looks after the pedagogical roles and needs on the campus (which is profound, rich and deep). OID needs to stress pedagogy before technology but acknowledges and supports technology for instruction. OID has a history of supporting faculty for introducing technology in instruction and has had an increasing role with technology in instruction. OID's role is to help the faculty take on instructional philosophies and strategies that truly make a difference for the students, to improve instruction and learning, to improve the relationships of teachers to students, and to serve as an advocate on campus for "teaching" among the recognized "trinity". Therefore, OID should be



independent/autonomous from CILT, which has the staff and resources to support teaching from a technical standpoint. OID and CILT should continue an informal relationship for the mutual benefit of the faculty for instructional improvement.

**Conclusions**

The Faculty Instructional Development Committee wishes to further commend the efforts of Dr. Dan Rice and the Office of Instructional Development. The "Evaluation Review of the Office of Instructional Development" by Dr. Bellman was very positive and affirmed the significant impact that the Office of Instructional Development has had at the University of North Dakota.

Although the Evaluation Review of the Office of Instructional Development did not address the issue of providing faculty incentives for innovation for teaching and technology, the FIDC recommends such incentives receive consideration. The university is fostering the concept of the "virtual university" which will have a major impact on pedagogy and technology for teaching. But the faculty rewards system for tenure and promotion is traditional. The FIDC recommends that incentives for innovation in the area of teaching be given strong consideration toward tenure and promotion.

The Faculty Instructional Development Committee recommends that the Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs and the Director of OID receive this "Response to the Evaluation Review of OID" by the FIDC and that a meeting be scheduled as soon as practical with the Provost and VPAA, the Director of OID, and the Chairperson of FIDC to further discuss the "Evaluation Review of OID" by Dr. Bellman and the "Response to the Evaluation Review of OID" by the FIDC in the interest of making the best possible use of the evaluation findings and recommendations and the subsequent response of the committee.

The Faculty Instructional Development Committee strongly believes that the Office of Instructional Development is fulfilling its mission of providing faculty and instructional development and that OID is vital to the future of the University of North Dakota.
