- B. The Senate was reminded that the deadline for returning the Senate ballot designation form for the spring elections is March 6, 2000.
  - C. Mr. Bridewell informed the Senate that he attended the State Board of Higher Education meetings held February 17 and 18, 2000 at Mayville State University. Mr. Bridewell spoke to the Board members on behalf of the Senate regarding several different concerns.

Mr. Bridewell asked for corrections or additions to the minutes of the February 3, Senate meeting. There being none, the minutes stand approved as read.

The Chair announced the Question Period. Mr. Stevens asked about a summary of the Board of Higher Education policy revisions. Mr. Bridewell informed him the minutes of each Board meeting are on the Board of Higher Education Web site, although the minutes from the February meeting were not available at the time of the Senate meeting.

Cynthia Shabb presented the Report from the Committee on Committees on the slate of candidates for election to Senate committees. Mr. Lee moved to add Mary Drewes to the list of candidates for the Continuing Education, Distance Education and Outreach Committee. There being no more additions, the Senators proceeded to vote. Ms. Gabrynowicz seconded the motion to amend the original report. The amended motion was voted upon and carried unanimously.

The main motion, made earlier, to approve the report and recommendations of the Senate Compensation Committee, as amended by the above, was voted upon. The motion was approved by a vote of 42 for and 0 against.

The University of North Dakota Senate hereby resolves that the State Board of Higher Education should post in a timely manner any issues, agendas, or information relating to higher education policies, procedures and budgets under consideration by the Board or legislature on a Web site yet to be designated.

RE: Annual Student Academic Standards Committee Report to Senate

The Student Academic Standards Committee, an appeals board, meets upon demand. The committee functions within the guidelines approved by the Senate on February 3, 1983, as revised in April, 1985, and again as revised on March 4, 1999. A summary of the year's Probation/Dismissal, Reinstatement, Academic Grievance and exceptions to admission standards activities is indicated below.

Because of the confidential nature of the information about the students, the committee keeps no written minutes other than a statement about the action taken with respect to each student seeking reinstatement. When a grade grievance is the issue before the committee, minutes are kept of the entire proceedings.

The committee meets as needed, with the greatest demand usually occurring at a time immediately preceding the beginning of a term.

Six meetings were held from January 15, 1999 to January 10, 2000.

RE: Review and recommendations concerning SBHE Policy 607.4 – Sick Leave

A meeting of the Senate Compensation Committee was held on January 10, 2000 to discuss the SBHE policy change regarding the Sick Leave policy. Members of the committee present included: Diana Wells (Math), Anne Gerber (Biology), Tom Mohr (PT) and Sue Jeno (PT).

Current UND policy - Faculty Handbook - 10.2 Sick Leave

A faculty member is granted sick leave without loss of salary, provided arrangements can be made to have his or her classes taught by other members of the department, and provided the University program does not suffer because of his or her absence.

#### Proposed SBHE change:

- A. (Edited) Faculty and members of the academic staff at an institution on twelve month contracts are entitled to sick leave and family leave under the same terms and conditions as the employees subject to the broadbanding system.
  - · Sick leave is a benefit, not earned
  - Can be used for extended illness, to tend to needs of family members who are ill (appointments, etc.)
  - Employing department may refuse to authorize payment of sick leave without satisfactory medical verification
  - · Sick leave is granted on the basis of continuous service
  - Full time employees 8 hours/month of service, part time employees prorated
  - Department heads responsible for notifying Payroll Office in writing of the amount of sick leave taken by employees
- B. Faculty and members of academic staff employed for less than twelve months are not entitled to paid sick or dependent leave, but are allowed paid time off.
  - A brief absence or time off due to illness, medical treatment or dependent care permitted with pay if appropriate arrangements made to reschedule classes and make appropriate arrangements to perform essential job functions
  - Paid time off up to a total of six weeks per calendar year if employee and institution agree on suitable arrangements
  - · Time off beyond six weeks in any one year unpaid

#### Family Leave

Board is recommending unpaid leave of absence for full time eligible employees of sixteen weeks in a twelve-month period and twelve weeks for part time eligible employees subject to terms and conditions specified.

#### COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. That no differences in sick leave or family leave be made for faculty based on length of contract (twelve month vs. nine month).
- 2. That the current policy 10.2 remain the sick leave policy for faculty.
- 3. That a short-term disability policy be developed and implemented as a benefit for faculty. It is recommended that the AAUP STD policy be considered. This benefit would provide financial protection for faculty in the event of severe illness/disability in the period before the LTD policy becomes effective.
- 4. That due to the inability of faculty to "accrue" paid time off to provide financial coverage for family leave, some stipulation be made for the option of paid family leave based on years of service.

#### Commentary:

As trained Professionals on contract with the University, we are accountable to the terms and conditions of our contracts. To stipulate that faculty are required to account for every hour between 8:00 am and 4:30 pm or use "sick time" to cover absences from their departments is inconsistent with the ability of faculty to perform their responsibilities to the University and fulfill their contracts. Many faculty work from home, in the evening and early morning hours to maintain the high standard of teaching, research and service on which the University and its faculty take great pride. To further undermine the ability of the faculty to direct their activities as necessary to meet the needs of their department and the University, will further erode faculty confidence in the NDUS.
