The following announcements were made:

1. Diane Hillebrand updated the Senate on Staff Senate initiatives. She first introduced Sharley Kurtz and Kim Keeley, the other Staff Senate representatives to University Senate. Staff Senate has been working hard on several initiatives: state employee recognition week, spring fling, the homecoming parade, raising funds for staff (Seeds for Staff Success benefit and Denim and Diamonds), raising funds for students to fund staff dependent scholarships and raising funds for the community through Denim Days and the Tubs of Love drive. There are workshops for staff professional development. The monthly U Shine award and Exceptional You to recognize exceptional faculty, staff and students.

- 2. Alice Brekke provided an update on budget and master planning:
 - For the master planning process, there are two conversations. One conversation is NDUS as a whole under which each campus does a campus plan. UND initiated a master planning process but the Chancellor at that time asked UND to hold. Instead, he approved a more limited project to go forward regarding classroom space utilization. Ms. Brekke indicated that the institution will be looking at the recommendations from that study along with the system plan. One priority which seems to be emerging is funds for renovations, but it is still too early for solid conclusions. Questions were addressed. The expectation is that the system master plan will be available in April.
 - The tuition increase is being discussed at the State Board of Higher Education. Last year, UND requested a 4.9% increase but was approved for 3.2%. This created an approximate \$3.3 million shortfall; additionally, the State did not fully fund their share. The question has been asked about the \$3.3 million short fall and how that is being addressed. Ms. Brekke indicated that it is being monitored through rate of expenditures and spending and we are close to balancing. She said that this is also being addressed by not spending dollars. For 2014-15, UND will request 3.72% increase. If that is funded, we will not need to cut the budget and it looks like we will be okay.
 - Ms. Brekke indicated that the budget information she shared is separate from the Library funding issue. The Library has faced significant increases in costs. In the past, one-time money has been matched to address this increase. This year, that did not happen since it is not sustainable.
- 3. Eric Murphy updated the Senate on the activity of the Council of College Faculties (CCF). He indicated that they are dealing with a number of issues. The first is open-source textbooks. He indicated that an official position will be adopted. The second issue is a SBHE revised draft of the NDUS Intellectual Property policy. The draft had significant issues which needed to be addressed. Mr. Murphy thinks that the policy ultimately will be beneficial. As of December, CCF passed a permanent research fund proposal to create a permanent research fund in the state. CCF will work with the Chancellor and legislators. The idea is that the fund, once funded, will be permanent and only the revenue will be used to support research. The intent is to focus on STEM and supporting early faculty research that would ultimately be able to compete for federal funding. Mr. Murphy reported lots of interchange on the security breach announced by the Chancellor. He expects discussion at the next meeting. Finally he shared the idea of an NDUS faculty wide conference hosted by UND. There will be a survey of faculty for content and interest. The focus of the conference will be on issues that impact higher education. There is discussion of the conference with the Chancellor and NDUS to gain support. The target date is perhaps spring 2015.

4. Mr. Zerr made several announcements:

- The annual sponsored program activity report is now available.
- SEC approved a curriculum change to HIST 391 due to an omission on the February Senate report.
- The Committee on Committees gathered campus input on the committee service preference form. Several ideas were submitted.
 - o There is Senate work in progress to determine if so many Senate committees are needed.
 - o The need for a faculty senate is an ongoing issue with the expectation for a proposal in the future.
 - o The formation of policies on non-maternity family responsibilities has been referred to the Compensation Committee.

- o The topic of research support for the humanities has been referred to the Senate Scholarly Activities Committee.
- o An investigation of the responses on surveys over the last five years has yet to be addressed.
- There are procedural changes to the Discrimination and Harassment Policy. Due to a random audit, two small changes were recommended by the Department of Energy. Both recommendations will be incorporated into the Faculty Handbook.
- The Budget Model Redesign and Program Prioritization initiatives are in progress. Regarding the Budget Model Redesign, those involved are Huron Consultants, the Executive Steering Committee, and the Steering Committee. Working on the Program Prioritization initiative are consultant Larry Goldsteen, the Steering Committee and two taskforces which include 28 faculty members involved in considering academic programs, and 31 faculty and staff members involved in considering support services.
- 4. Mr. Munski wanted the Senators to be aware that SBHE meetings are now available online by video. There is also an NDUS promotional video.

5.

Mr. Zerr called attention to the minutes of the February 6, 2014 meeting. There were no additions or corrections to the minutes. There was a motion of approval by Mr. Munski. A second was made and the minutes were approved as distributed.

6

The question period was opened at 4:52 p.m. There were no questions.

7.

Mr. Zerr called attention to the annual reports from the Student Academic Standards Committee, the Administrative Procedures Committee, and the Library Committee. A motion was made to accept and file the reports. There was a second and the motion was approved.

8.

The Curriculum Committee report was presented. There was a motion to approve by Mr. Munski and a second by Mr. Harsell. The motion was approved unanimously.

9.

Mr. Zerr called attention to the Senate Committee election ballot that was available at Senate check-in. He asked for nominations from the floor. Dana Harsell was nominated for the Legislative Affairs Committee. There were no further nominations and the call for nominations was closed. Mr. Zerr asked the senators to complete the ballot and to sign and submit it to Lori Hofland before leaving the meeting.

The proposed changes to the Senate Academic Policy and Admissions Committee charge were presented. Approval was moved by Mr. Munski, a second was made by Ms. Stone and the motion was approved unanimously.

A summary of the year's Probation/Suspension/Dismissal, Reinstatement, Academic Grievance and exceptions to admission standards activities is indicated below.

Because of the confidential nature of the information about the students, the committee keeps no written minutes other than a statement about the action taken with respect to each student seeking reinstatement. When a grade grievance is the issue before the committee, minutes are kept of the entire proceedings.

The committee meets as needed, with the greatest demand usually occurring at a time immediately preceding the beginning of a term.

Fall 2012-Spring/Summer 2013, members held 7 meetings between the dates of August 16, 2012 and July 18, 2013. Fall 2013 to present, members began meeting on August 15, 2013, and have held 4 meetings to date.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA University Senate Library Committee Annual Report for 2012/13

Membership

Committee Activities

- The University Senate Library Committee met twice times during 2012/13.
- The Committee elected Professor Mary Baker, Chair for 2012/13.
- The Committee received reports on the FY2013 Library budget: The Library budget drew on appropriated, local and endowment funds to support book purchases and continuation of serial subscriptions in multiple formats. The appropriated FY2013 budget was not expected to meet projected inflationary costs. (The Library met materials costs with supplemental funding from the VP for Academic Affairs/Provost \$300,000, the VP for Research and Economic Development \$50,000, Library salary savings and non-appropriated Library funding.)
- The Library continued partnering with UND colleges and departments in acquiring resources. The School of Geology and Geological Engineering partially supported access to Geoscience World and the College of Business and Public Administration provided matching funds to license Journal Citation Reports. A combination of funding from the Vice President for Research and Economic Development, the College of Business and Public Administration and the College of Arts and Sciences supported access to the datasets supported the Inter-university Consortium for Social and Political Research (ICSPR) at the University of Michigan.
- The Committee received reports on Library activities. Members provided reactions and recommendations to current programs and services.

Selected Library Activities 2012/13

- The Chester Fritz Library added over 33,016 new titles and offered access to 125,940 titles to electronic resources.
- 35,591 books circulated from the collection. There were 274,104 accesses to the Library's web site. During these visits, over 2.0 million searches were conducted within the Library's site. 257,542 people were recorded entering the Library.
- During 2012-13 Chester Fritz Library personnel in partnership with the Online Dakota Information Network (ODIN) staff lead the development of the Primo searching tool for North Dakota University System (NDUS) libraries and other members of the ODIN library consortium. PRIMO is a new way to search for journals, books and other scholarly resources, via the Library's web site. PRIMO not only searches for print materials held in the Library, but also electronic resources and web sites available through the Internet. It is able to identify thousands of sources in multiple formats, providing location information for books, journals, databases and digital resources and direct access to many of them. Primo was introduced at UND during August 2013 and has been implemented at each of the NDUS libraries.

(Over)

- Special Collections staff continued a major solicitation project to expand the Bygdebok Collection. The project involved contacting every Norwegian municipality and requesting information about and donations of their locally produced histories called bygdeboks. As a result 102 new volumes were added to the Arne G. Brekke Bygdebok Collection.
- Each semester, the Library extended hours during two week before finals to support students completing papers and studying for tests. Students continue to express interest in more hours of operation for the Library.
- The Library's Information Literacy/Instruction program provided instruction to over 5,706 students. Librarians partnered with faculty in teaching online and classroom courses.
- CFL personnel developed the digital collection, "IT COULD BE WORSE", a selection of editorial cartoons by Steve Edwards published in the Grand Forks Herald. His cartoons focus on issues and life in the American Midwest. The CFL continues to collaborate with campus faculty on digital projects. In conjunction with Professor Crystal Alberts (Department of English), the Library submitted a grant proposal to the National Endowment for the Humanities to support digital preservation of historic UND Writers Conference video.
- The UND Student Senate passed a bill providing continuing funding for the Popular Reading Collection. The Student Senate will provide \$1,000 annually for the purchase of books and audio books with the Library matching this amount.
- The CFL joined the international project lead by the Sponsoring Consortium for Open Access Publishing in Particle Physics (SCOAP3). The project aims to convert high quality High-Energy Physics (HEP) journals to Open Access (OA), pursuing two goals: to provide open and unrestricted access to all HEP research literature in its final, peer-reviewed form and to contain the overall cost of journal publishing by increasing competition while assuring sustainability.
- Library staff continued to work with colleagues from South Dakota and Minnesota to solicit, evaluate and implement access to digital scholarly resources for the three state area. These efforts have resulted in significant savings in journal packages and database subscriptions.
- The Library received a new \$100,000 endowment supporting the Library's Norwegian heritage programs.
- Paul LeBel, UND Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, presented the 22nd annual Elwyn B. Robinson Lecture, "The Perils of not crying wolf: Steering away from a world in which higher education is neither."
- In collaboration with the UND Center for Human Rights and Genocide Studies, the CFL hosted a traveling exhibit ""The Rescuers: Picturing Moral Courage," an exhibition providing photos and stories about people who helped to save victims during the Holocaust and during genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, and Bosnia. Such exhibits in the Library provide added educational opportunities for students, faculty and staff who use the library facility.
