- a. The proposed catalog wording for the honors policy effective dates was presented for information. The wording reflects the changes passed by the resolution at the January Senate meeting.
- b. The English Coulee committee is partnering with CleanFlo International to clean up the Coulee. They are looking for persons interested in helping with the project. There will be a future forum regarding this project.
- c. The Study Abroad Fair is scheduled for February 7, 2007.
- d. There is a new ITSS Incident Response Policy which is under review.
- e. Dr. Jeffrey Powell, from the Dean of Students Office, indicated that he is soliciting and accepting changes to the Code of Student Life that may need

approval by the University Senate. He indicated that the process will start next month. He also reported that there is a faculty opening for the Student Policy Committee.

f. The Committee on Committees is soliciting nominees for various committees for the next year. Ms. Smart, chair of Committee on Committees, is

accepting nominations.

g. CCF report by Curt Stofferahn: The CCF made recommendations which included a combined salary increase for faculty and staff of 7.4%, increased health contributions, and increased retirement contributions for staff with more that 15 years of service. There was also the recommendation that 21% of the ND budget be for higher education. Mr. Stofferhan indicated that the position of the Higher Education Roundtable is that ND is not living up to their agreement of support to higher ed. They support funding at 21%; however, the Governor requested a 96% budget. His budget proposal is for a 5% salary increase plus some equity money. The current status of the budget process is not hopeful. It looks like maintaining the 5% salary increase with separate promotion funding will be difficult. Full funding of health insurance will be difficult as well.

Senator Jerath asked about tuition. It was explained that the proposed cap will mean that we cannot rely on tuition for increased revenue. Senator Rice stressed the need for and importance of full funding for health insurance.

 ${\tt Mr.}$  Stofferahn closed by presenting the names and brief comments about the Chancellor candidates.

h. Mr. Martindale commented on the ND Student Association work in Bismarck on legislation. He reported that there is not a lot of good news on the student front as well. He indicated that although capping tuition may be good, it may ultimately result in higher tuition later. He shared a concern that Montana and Minnesota bills will be acted on after the ND legislative session has been concluded which may present significant issues. Also, the ConnectND issue is not looking good. Fees will probably be raised again rather than the requested elimination.

i. Senator Gallagher shared that there is a strong resistance in the legislature to the 21% higher education funding and that the ConnectND fee

will probably go up.

Annual report of the Summer Sessions Committee

The Summer Sessions Committee met on February 16, March 30, and April 27. A lack of quorum at the April meeting prevented any official action. Discussion at the first meeting centered around the role of this committee because of the creation of the Summer Program and Events Council, and what direction summer session was headed under a new Provost and Director. It was determined that this committee would be dealing strictly with the academic (for credit) side of summer, whereas the council's job is the rejuvenate summer as a whole. Because of the President's goal to increase summer enrollment, and the Provost's new initiative to reward colleges for increasing student credit hours, this committee could be very valuable.

Faculty pay was discussed, i.e., could a new system be devised for paying for readings courses, independent studies, etc. Or could summer salary schedule be based on academic year pay? Or could there be a revenue sharing model adopted?

Several ideas for increasing enrollment were discussed - - how to market to incoming freshmen, current students, and Summer Haven (senior citizens), and marketing as a whole. One idea being worked on is a collaborative effort between Integrated Studies and the American Indian Center to bring incoming freshmen American Indian students here in the summer to introduce them to campus and offer them a couple of classes in Composition, Humanites, Student Life, etc. in order to better prepare them for Fall.

A proposal from the Provost was to create a high school counselor's institute which offers this group a high caliber workshop, shows off the campus, and allows them to use the facilities in the hope that they will return to their schools with a glowing recommendation for UND to their students. There will be a workshop offered in Summer 2007 and, hopefully, an expanded experience in 2008.

Dave Marshall initiated a certificate program for publishing/editing through the English department. This is waiting approval from the Curriculum Committee.

Marketing efforts have been substantially increased both through Summer Sessions and the Summer Program and Events Council.

Summer salaries increased by 4.5% in 2006, and will increase by 3% in 2007. With the Provost's allocation model in place, some colleges will have additional dollars available to them. At this point, the money is not for salaries. However, salary continues to be discussed.

No chairperson had been elected, so the Director has assumed those duties.
