From the Minne-Apple to the Big Apple

Pace changes for U alum Dewing with promotion, move in 'Big Eight' firm

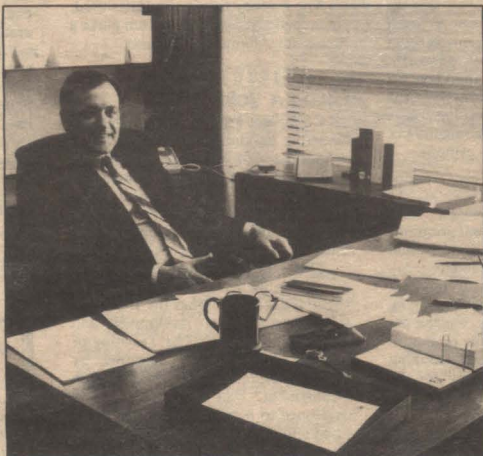

Merlin Dewing, who became a civic hero in Minneapolis after he headed a task force to "save the Minnesota Twins, has moved to the Big Apple.

It's New York City for Dewing, '56, '58, and a promotion to vice chairman in charge of auditing for Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., the "Big Eight" public accounting firm he has been associated with since leaving UND.

Dewing joins a growing number of UND alumni in America's most competitive and achievement-oriented city. Among the other UND-educated super stars of the New York business world profiled in the past by *Alumni Review* is Jim Olson, '50, newly elected president of AT&T.

Interviewed recently in his 38th floor Park Avenue office with the mandatory executive-style view of Manhattan, Dewing noted that the Minneapolis Tribune mentioned his Minnesota Twins involvement in its story about his departure. The

paper quoted one VIP close to the situation as saying, "Without his leadership, I don't believe the Twins would be here."

The newspaper also reported in vivid detail many of the prob-

lems Dewing faces in his job near the top of the firm. Dewing's audit division employs 7,200 of the company's more than 11,000 employees, and produces 65 percent of its income.

For example, auditing firms have come under fire in the controversy surrounding major business failures such as the Penn Square National Bank. Critics have suggested some independent auditors were careless in giving clients a clean bill of health just before financial disaster struck.

Dewing, although conceding that these legal and ethical questions are important, especially in an era of "deregulation" and emerging competition in the auditing industry, strongly defends his profession. Many of the lawsuits against auditing firms that have grabbed business page headlines recently, he says, are manifestations of the "deep pockets" philosophy of litigation — sue whoever has the most liability insurance.

Dewing began his career in 1958 with Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co. He was elected a partner in 1969, served as managing partner for audit of the Minneapolis office from 1976 to 1978, and as managing partner in charge of the Minneapolis office from 1978 until promotion to

corporate headquarters this fall.

A major difference he has found in his new job, Dewing says with a smile, is the fact a business meeting in Minneapolis lasted about 10 minutes, while in New York, a typical meeting may last from one hour to several days.

The change of pace reflects his transition from an operational to a senior management role, he says. In his new capacity, Dewing is responsible for strategic planning, client service and manpower planning as they pertain to the firm's audit business.

When the *Alumni Review* visited in December, Dewing was studying a staff report on research using artificial intelligence in auditing. Peat Marwick intends to remain on the cutting edge of technology, Dewing says. Already the company is ranked among the top 20 American businesses in the number of personal computers (more than 7,000) used by employees.

Sarah Vogel: At center of agri-legal struggles U grad led suit against FmHA

In the 1984 film "Country," Jessica Lange and Sam Shepard portray Jewell and Gil Ivy, Iowa farmers facing foreclosure and fighting the federal government in their attempt to save their farm home.

Lange and Shepard are actors, but the farm foreclosure scenario is very real for many farmers caught up in today's struggling agricultural economy. Fortunately, the happy ending to "Country" is also very real, with no small thanks to North Dakota attorney Sarah Vogel, '67.

Vogel, now a special assistant to the North Dakota attorney general dealing primarily with cases involving agriculture and farming law, gained national attention in 1984 as the attorney who led — and won — a fight against the Farmer's Home Administration's illegal lending practices in the now-famous case of Coleman vs. Block.

As a result of that class-action suit, a U.S. District Court judge ordered a moratorium on all farm foreclosures until the FmHA complied with legal requirements, which included giving borrowers adequate notice of plans for liquidation, acceleration or foreclosure of loans and allowing borrowers to apply for deferrals.

The movie "Country" is loosely based on the Coleman vs. Block lawsuit.

Lange, who co-produced "Country" in addition to her acting role, referred to Vogel as "a close family friend" in interviews with the press at the time of the film's release. Vogel had once been roommates with Lange's sister, Jane, and she served as an adviser to Lange during the filming of "Country."

Vogel takes pride in her work in the Coleman case, and is complimentary in describing "Country" and its effects.

"Now everyone's aware that there is a farm crisis," she says, calling the film "very accurate and very, very typical" of what is happening in rural areas across the nation.

"It's a situation I heard about dozens, hundreds of times," wrote Vogel in a review of "Country" published in the Grand Forks Herald. "And it's against the law."

Vogel is an alumna of the University of North Dakota, where she studied political science through the honors program to earn her undergraduate degree.

"The honors program was an incredibly exciting place at the time," Vogel remembers. "It wasn't easy to get into the program, and it wasn't easy to (see VOGEL, page 3)

stay in. But there was a whole lot of camaraderie."

The camaraderie of the program was especially evident at the Honors Lounge, which used to be located in Twamley Hall (a special Honors House on Harvard Street is now part of the UND campus). "It was really stimulating," Vogel says. "It was always crawling with people... People were always there, talking about philosophy, poetry or playing chess."

And Vogel remembers being a student in the 1960s as "enormous fun."

"In many ways it was pretty blissful," she says. "School was basically a place to have fun and to do a lot of learning."

From UND Vogel went to New York University law school in 1967, where she insists that her "good old UND education" was at least as valuable as the private school educations of some of her classmates. "The quality of my UND education was really good," she says. "The only things we (UND graduates) didn't know were how to ride the subway and things like that."

Although she acknowledges that times have changed, Vogel remembers law school as being a community of humanitarians who truly saw law as a means to better society. "I'd say 80 percent of my class wanted to go out and 'do good,'" she says.

Since her graduation from law school, Vogel has held various positions in private practice and in government service at both state and national levels. Although she currently has chosen state government as the arena for her legal efforts, she is quick to defend the value of private practice attorneys and their role in social reform.

"Private practice is the hardest thing in the world, but I think you can get

more done in public service from the outside," she says.

She points to the Coleman vs. Block case as an example. Vogel researched and presented arguments on the case while she worked for her father's law firm in Grand Forks.

"If I'd been working at the Department of Agriculture, there would have been no way" to accomplish what she did, she says. "It had to be done through private practice."

Vogel uses praise in her description of state government, and gives it high marks in comparison with the federal

government in its ability to deal with important issues like the farm crisis.

"The federal government is so removed from the grassroots that it has a very limited ability to get ideas," she says. "It's not looking at the really big problem."

"If you look back, most good ideas come from the states," she adds.

In contrast to many federal agencies, Vogel maintains, state government "pays a great deal of attention to efficiency and effectiveness."

"Everybody works together really well at the state level. We don't let

politics play a very large role," she says. "There's a lot of cooperation... and that's the way it should be."

State government is also "so much more accountable" to the people, she adds. The huge bureaucracies at the federal level "have no idea what the people want."

At the state level, she says, citizens can find out exactly what their policymakers are doing.

"If a politician doesn't implement the general will of the people" at the state level, "the people generally know it," she says.

Cora Smith:

The first Grand Forks woman to gain national prominence was Cora Smith Eaton King, who a century ago left here temporarily to enroll in a school of elocution and oratory in Philadelphia.

The daughter of Col. E. Smith, she already had gained local fame for her speaking ability. On her departure for Philadelphia, the Herald noted that she had "on numerous occasions demonstrated a rare gift, and what with bright natural talent and pleasing manner and what with the excellent course of training vouchsafed for her in that cultural city, she may be expected to return to Grand Forks with laurels crowned."

Among her early achievements was being hired, while still in what amounted to high school, as an instructor at the University of North Dakota in its first year. Most of the original students at the University had not acquired sufficient public school education to qualify for college courses. And so many signed up for classes in elementary arithmetic, geography, spelling and penmanship that Smith was hired to assist Mrs. E. S. Mott, the preceptress, in teaching those classes.

She later became a member of the first UND graduating class in 1889, the year of statehood. But she had been



called upon once more to aid the faculty before that time. She conducted daily classes in calisthenics for female students.

After graduation, she entered the medical school at Boston University,

salary," and offered "the best features of the Swedish, German, and French or Delsarte systems." This included drills, calisthenics and marching, accompanied by piano music, plus exercises with dumbbells, wands and Indian clubs.

In 1885 she also directed the first student entertainment, a show presented at the Metropolitan Theatre.

Later she left Grand Forks and became a prominent physician and women's suffragist in Boston and Los Angeles. In 1920 she was listed, along with such other UND graduates and former students as Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Maxwell Anderson, Thomas Campbell, and others, as alumni who had attained national reputations. She was the only woman on the list.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article about one of UND's most prominent graduates appeared in Grand Forks Herald Editor Emeritus Jack Hagerty's column, "That reminds me," and is reprinted with the permission of the Herald.

Smith Hall on the UND campus is named after Cora Smith, 1889.

Among Smith's distinctions not mentioned by Jack was the fact that she was the first woman to perform surgery in North Dakota and that she was a well known expert on mountain climbing. This remarkable woman was listed continuously in "Who Was Who in America" from 1897 to 1942, three years after her death.

Founders Day honors the people of UND

Celebration this year is Feb. 27

An 83-year-old tradition comes up again Feb. 27 at the University of North Dakota. Marking the signing in 1883 by the Dakota Territorial governor of the legislation establishing UND, Founders Day honors the pioneers who believed in a higher education for their sons and daughters.

The first Founders Day, held Saturday, Feb. 27, 1904, was established through the efforts of Vernon Squires, then professor of English and later dean of the liberal arts college. Louis Geiger, in his book, "University of the Northern Plains," noted that the solemn affair garnered considerable media attention.

The event began Friday evening with a debate. Opening Saturday's events was a speech by Gottfried Hult, professor of classical languages at the Agricultural College in Fargo at that time and later at UND. Student speeches and a girls basketball game followed. Speaking that evening was Bardi Skulason, class of

1895, and President Webster Merrifield, who reminisced about the opening of the University.

By 1910, Founders Day was second only to commencement in importance. The traditional festivities included the girls basketball game, a faculty-student-alumni dinner and speeches by prominent alumni, board members or state officials.

The dates of the Founders Day celebration varied slightly. Usually, it was held during the weekend closest to the 27th, the actual date of the signing of the legislation.

The Carney Sing, the inter-class song competition established by E. Claude Carney in 1910, was moved to the eve of Founders Day in 1913. Students complained that it conflicted with too many other spring activities.

Another addition to the Founders Day program was the University history lecture presented by Squires. Using a slide presentation, Squires divided the University's history into ancient, medieval, modern and contemporary times. Squires, and the lecture, died in 1930.

Events were added or changed as suited the times. In 1926, the event was used to kick off a campaign for a memorial stadium. Football sweaters were awarded as part of the program in 1927 and, in 1930, Merrifield Hall was dedicated.

The 50th anniversary of the University in 1933 was a sober event, in keeping with the effects of the Depression. By that time, the traditional events included a men's basketball series against the Agricultural College in Fargo, and students were excused from classes to attend speeches, concerts and banquets.

Adding to the significance of the 1933 Founders Day was the sudden announcement of the resignation of UND President Thomas Kane.

During the Founders Day celebration of the University's 75th anniversary, President George Starcher announced a \$1 million donation from

Chester Fritz for a library.

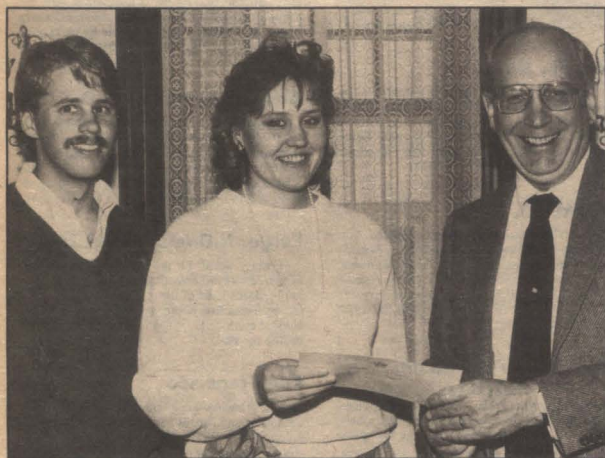
In 1939, long-time University employees were honored, but it wasn't until 1959 when the custom was firmly established. In 1960, President Starcher began his annual state of the University address.

In 1968 and 1969, Honors Day was held jointly with Founders Day, to recognize outstanding students. Outstanding faculty awards were initiated in 1967.

The UND Foundation began to offer departmental excellence awards in 1974, added faculty awards in 1978, and in 1980, increased the cash awards significantly. This year, outstanding faculty and departments will receive more than \$6,000 in stipends from the UND Foundation, in addition to other awards and sponsors.

For the 100th anniversary of the founding of UND, a particularly festive Founders Day program opened a week-long academic symposium, the first of dozens of events spanning more than a year.

Again this year, Founders Day will mark the opportunity for members of the University to gather to honor outstanding employees and to reflect on the history and the future of the University.

In Minneapolis, besides duty as chairman of the Major League Baseball Task Force, they included such distinctions as chairman of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, chairman of the Minnesota Project on Corporate Responsibility, and chairman of

the fund-raising committee of the Minnesota Orchestra Association.

And, of course, from 1976 to 1985 he served on the board of directors of the UND Alumni Association and Foundation, two years as president.

In New York, Dewing suspects he may not have as much time for external involvements, although he intends to remain on the board of the Bush Foundation of St. Paul, Minn.

One suspects, though, that if the Yankees or Mets ever get in trouble, Merlin Dewing will once again be called upon to save the day.

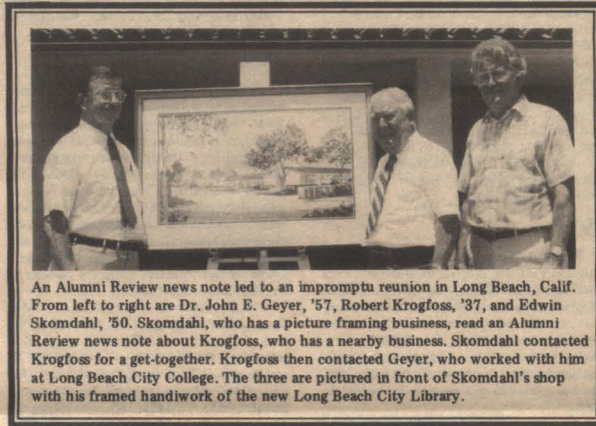
Other special reunions include the 75th anniversary of Kappa Alpha Theta

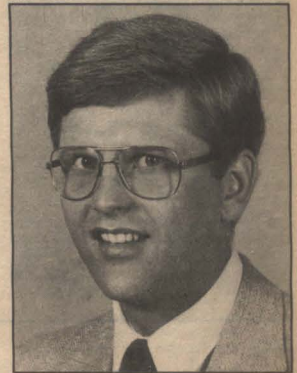

UND offers summer Aerospace Camp Pre-collegiates can sample aviation careers

The University of North Dakota and Northwest Orient Airlines have taken the poison ivy and mosquitoes out of camping with their own special brand of summer fun. It's called the International Aerospace Camp, a one-of-a-kind camping adventure during July which draws ninth, tenth, and eleventh graders each year from across North America to Grand Forks, N.D.

During their 10-day stay, teenage aviation buffs log flight time, build rockets, and learn about the past, present, and future of aviation. The sky becomes their classroom when they fly

five different aircraft — a helicopter, aerobatics plane, single-engine trainer, hot air balloon and commercial jet.

Among other things, they study aerodynamics, star gaze in an observatory, visit a U.S. Air Force base, and make a trip to Minneapolis for a cockpit-to-cargo-bay tour of Northwest Airlines.

The camp instructors are faculty at UND's Center for Aerospace Sciences. The new \$7.3 million Center, where the campers take classes, features sophisticated computer labs, a meteorological data center and a planetarium.

Seven miles from campus, campers head for the clouds at the Center's flight operations where university students log more than 45,000 flight hours annually on a fleet of 50 aircraft.

The camp's goal is to stimulate an understanding of the ever-expanding aviation industry and to give young people a pre-college glimpse at aerospace careers. The \$888 fee covers everything except pin money. Camp sessions are set for July 6-16 and July 20-30. News briefs

The papers of the late U.S. Sen. Milton R. Young were opened Friday, Jan. 3, at the University of North Dakota Chester Fritz Library.
 The papers of noted North Dakota historian and UND Professor Emeritus Elwyn B. Robinson were opened Wednesday, Jan. 1.
 Both manuscript collections are housed in the special collections department at the Chester Fritz Library.
 The Milton R. Young Collection is the single largest manuscript collection in North Dakota, occupying 995 linear feet. The collection contains Young's congressional papers, organized in three categories: constituent correspondence, legislative files and subject files such as Garrison Diversion Project.
 Young served in the U.S. Senate from 1945 until his retirement midnight Jan. 2, 1981. In an agreement with UND, Young's papers will be opened five years after his retirement from the U.S. Senate. Young died May 31, 1983.
 Robinson was a history professor at UND from 1935 to 1970, and is the author of the book "History of North Dakota." The Robinson papers include teaching materials, professional and personal correspondence, diaries and numerous photographs and slides of Grand Forks, family and friends. The collection occupies 35.75 linear feet. Robinson died March 24, 1985.

Carl Ben Eielsen, '21, pioneer aviator and one of UND's legendary alumni, continues to receive recognition nearly a half century after his death. This summer he was enshrined in the National Aviation Hall of Fame in Dayton, Ohio, in recognition for being the first man to fly non-stop over the North Pole. That feat occurred in 1928. He was killed a year later at the age of 32 in an airplane crash while attempting to rescue the crew of a ship trapped in the ice off the coast of Siberia. A U.S. Air Force base in Alaska is named in his honor.

Roger Thomas: New grid coach comes to Sioux from pro ranks

Roger Thomas, 39, was named the University of North Dakota's 23rd head football coach, replacing Pat Behrns who resigned Nov. 17.

Thomas was an assistant coach for two years with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League, where he worked with offensive backs and receivers. Thomas also was an assistant coach at UND for the 1978 and 1979 seasons.

Five new assistants named to replace former aides

Five new assistant football coaches have been appointed at the University of North Dakota. UND head coach Roger Thomas has named Rob Bollinger as offensive coordinator, Dan Dehnicke as linebacker coach, Gary Gilbertson as defensive line coach, Jeff Tesch as offensive line coach, and Tim Burke as defensive coordinator.

None of the assistant coaches under former head football coach Pat Behrns were retained. They have teaching responsibilities at UND and will be paid until the end of June, unless they find other employment. They are Dave Olson, Steve Rondeau, Darrell Kluck, Bruce Bukowski and John Richman.

Bollinger was in his first year as head coach at Northern (S.D.) State College with a 3-6-1 record. A 1973 graduate of Dickinson (N.D.) State College, Bollinger earned a master's degree from UND in 1980, where he was a graduate assistant with the Sioux from 1977-1979, and was the offensive backfield coach from 1980-83. He also was an assistant coach at Central Missouri State.

Dehnicke was the defensive coordinator at Coon Rapids (Minn.) High School, which won last year's Minnesota Class AA state championship. Dehnicke, who has been at the school since 1973, also was the girls track coach. He received undergraduate and graduate degrees from the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minn.

Gilbertson was the defensive coordinator at Central Missouri State. He is a 1979 graduate of Moorhead State University, and was an assistant coach at Berwick (La.) High School. In 1981, Gilbertson received a master's degree from UND, and was a defensive line coach at Wisconsin-Eau Claire in 1982.

Tesch was the offensive coordinator at Central Missouri State. A graduate of

Moorhead State University, Tesch earned all-conference and All-American honorable mention as a tight end. He coached at Moorhead State from 1978-79. Tesch was an assistant coach at Mason City (Iowa) High School, and an offensive line coach at UND. He received a masters degree in education from UND in 1983 and then was an offensive line coach at Montana State.

Burke was the defensive coordinator at the University of South Dakota the past four seasons. He received his undergraduate degree at Luther College in 1977. Before going to South Dakota he coached at the University of Minnesota, Gardner-Webb College and Appalachian State.

"It's really exciting for me to be back at UND. I've always had a soft spot in my heart for UND. I think we will achieve success here in trying to build the program," Thomas said at the press conference announcing his appointment by UND Athletic Director Gino Gasparini.

Thomas has been described by former players as a good communicator, a player's coach and a man with a sense of humor. He also has the reputation of being a good recruiter.

Thomas has been busy assembling a new football coaching staff. All five assistants under Behrns have been replaced.

Thomas, a Chicago native, graduated from Augustana (Ill.) College in 1969 with a major in physical education and history. He received the M.A. from the University of South Dakota in 1972.

Following his graduation from Augustana of Illinois, Thomas was a part-time assistant football coach at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S.D. He also coached the junior varsity basketball team at nearby Augustana Academy in Canton, S.D. From 1970-76, he was a full-time assistant football coach at Augustana in Sioux Falls, serving three seasons as the defensive secondary coach and three seasons as the offensive backfield coach. Thomas was promoted to offensive coordinator in January 1976. He also coached baseball at Augustana in 1973.

From 1976-78 Thomas was the head football coach at Sioux Falls (S.D.) College.

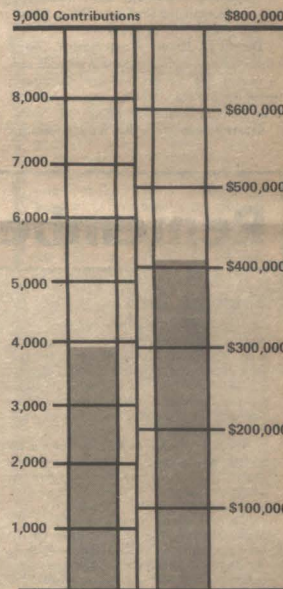
In April 1978, Thomas came to UND as the offensive coordinator under former head coach Gene Murphy. When Murphy accepted the head football coaching job at Cal State-Fullerton in January 1980, Thomas went with Murphy as the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator.

After three seasons at Fullerton, Thomas became the offensive backfield coach at the University of Minnesota in 1983. In February 1984, Thomas joined the Toronto Argonauts.

Thomas and his wife, Dorothy, have a son, Drew, 1½ years old.

Thomas will be coaching North Dakota's 90th football team. UND had a 3-8-0 record last fall.

Albert Cooley Memorial Chemical Engineering Scholarship

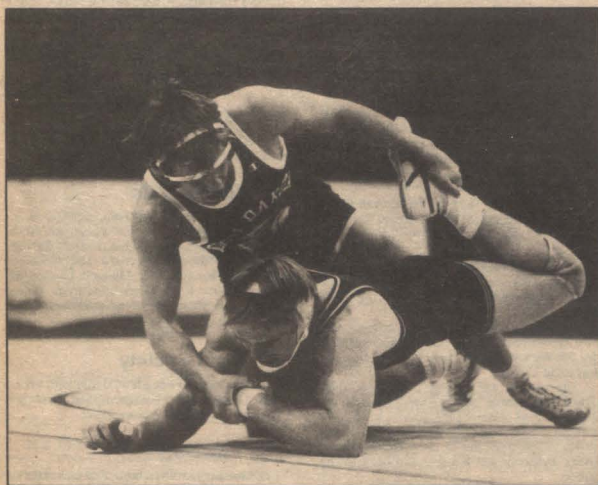
