Honored Sir :-

I do not mean to be discourteous nor purposely neglectful of my correspondence, especially where my friends are concerned. I received your letter in due time. As always. I was pleased to hear from you. I have not replied. Will now reply in the order written.

Under separate cover you will get 101 names endorsement to your bill of proposed citizenship for Indians which I am hoping will be harmonious.

Under another cover a booklet was mailed to you revealing full text of why we are opposed to Garrison Dam, embodied under rivers and harbors bills.

Now, a delegation from this place are to appear before the several Committees of the Congress in the first part of September 1945. I may be anticipating too far ahead but if it is at all possible, you could attend those congressional hearings with us.

I am one of the four official delegates from this place to oppose the Garrison Dam, or you could meet me at Pittsburg, Pa., enroute via Gray Hound Bus line.
